



Tuesday, May 21 is voting day for the Northville Public Library. The library's Board of Trustees has worked to develop a responsible budget

with the least impact on our local taxpayers. The 2019-2020 budget will have no increase in the tax levy. Voting on two Trustee seats will be held.

Nearly 17,000 visitors passed through the library in the last year,

using 29,000 items, including digital resources as well. The library's computers and wireless network were accessed over 3,300 times, and the library handled about 8,000 transfers, sharing items between area libraries. Nearly 85 programs were held with 1,200 participants from Pre-school children through senior citizens.



Flower Talk by Sally Peck

Tulips are clearly an intriguing flower with a rich history. The beautiful flowers are actually related to the lily and perfectly symetrical. The Liliaceae family contains lilies, tulips, onions, garlic and asparagus. Named for their shape, 'Tulipa' (Latin for tulip) is derived from a Persian word "Tulipan" which means turban, because the original tulip resembled a turban. There about 150 species, but there are more than 3,000 naturally occurring and genetically cultivated varieties worldwide. New varieties of tulips are regularly created, but it takes each one at least 20 years to go from the beginning stages of cultivation to your local florist's shop!

The Turkish people who originally bred the flower considered it a symbol of paradise on earth, making it a part of many poems and art pieces. The Ottoman empire planted the bulbs to remind them of heaven and eternal life, while the Dutch considered it a reminder of how brief life can be. The link to love and passion developed primarily in the 20th century. In 1980, the tulip was made the symbol of the Parkinson's Disease Foundation. A Dutch horticulturist who had PD, developed

a red and white tulip and named it 'Dr. James Parkinson', the doctor for which the degenerative disease is named. Originally, the tulip came from the Far East with cultivation beginning in Persia around the 10th century. The Turkish Sultan loved them so much, he imported 300,000 bulbs for his gardens in Istanbul. In the 16th century, an Austrian (Halsburg) ambassador was given some bulbs to take back to Vienna by the Turkish sultan and they were rapidly introduced to Europe. It is believed the first tulips in the USA were grown in Lynn and Salem, Massachusetts in the mid 1800's by Richard Sullivan Fay, one of Lynn's wealthiest men. Mr. Fay imported many different trees and plants from all parts of the world and planted them among the meadows of the Fay Estate.

In the 1600's, tulips were the most expensive flower, in fact, they were more valuable than most people's homes or even diamonds and cost almost 10 times what an average working-class man earned in a year! In the 1630's, the enthusiasm for the new flowers in Holland triggered a frenzy now known as 'tulip mania' that eventually led to the collapse of the market three years later. Tulip bulbs had become so expensive that they were treated as a

form of currency, forcing the Dutch government to introduce trading restrictions on the bulbs.

Like many other flowers, tulips are edible! In fact, during World War II, tulips and tulip breads were often eaten by those who couldn't afford other foods. The flowers can be used to replace onions in many recipes and are even used to make wine. (Remember to use only organic, free of pesticides).

> When arranging tulips and other flowers in a vase do NOT add daffodils. Daffodil's release a sap that clogs up the steps of other cut flowers-particularly delicate tulips.

Floriography: tulips are said to symbolize love and signal spring's arrival. Red tulips represent true love, white tulips say "I'm sorry," and purple tulips

symbolize royalty.

TESTICULAR CANCER AWARENESS

What Is Testicular Cancer?

According to the American Cancer Society, testicular cancer occurs when cells in the testicles begin to grow out of control. The testicles are made up of many different kinds of cells, all of which can develop into one or more forms of cancer. Therefore, it's important to know the type of cell testicular cancer begins in as well as the type of cancer.

There are multiple types of testicular cancer. However, the most common type is a germ cell tumor. The American Cancer Society categorizes germ cell tumors into two different forms including seminomas and non-seminomas.

Seminomas are more likely to occur in men ages 30-50 and usually grow and spread more slowly than non-seminomas. Non-seminomas are more likely to occur in men anytime from their late teens into their early 30's and usually grow and spread more rapidly than seminomas. Other less common forms of testicular

What Are The Risk Factors For Testicular Cancer?

A risk factor is anything that changes your chance of developing a disease – some risk factors can be controlled like diet and lifestyle, while others, like age or family history, cannot. A few risk factors that make men more likely to develop testicular cancer include:

An undescended testicle – when one or both testicles fail to move from the belly into the scrotum before birth.

Family history of testicular cancer – having a father or brother with testicular cancer.

HIV infection.

Carcinoma in situ of the testicle – a condition in which cells look abnormal under a microscope but have not spread outside of where they are formed.

Having previously had testicular cancer. Age – about half of all testicular cancers occur in men

ages 20 – 34. Certain races/ethnicities – testicular cancer is four to five times more common in white men than African-American or Asian-American men.

Signs & Symptoms

Some men have no signs and symptoms of testicular cancer, but others may experience:

A lump on the testicle

A swollen testicle or an increase in size of the testicle

Pain

Heaviness or aching in the lower belly or scrotum Sore breasts or an increase in breast size

There are a number of non-cancerous conditions that cause similar signs and symptoms of testicular cancer. If you experience any of the symptoms noted, schedule an appointment with your healthcare provider.

Prognosis & Prevention

A prognosis is the chance of recovery or outcome of a health condition. The prognosis for testicular cancer depends on the type of testicular cancer and the stage it is in. Fortunately, testicular cancer can usually be cured with treatment.

In general, the sooner you diagnose cancer, the better the outcome. Be sure to visit your healthcare provider on a regular basis and contact them if you experience any signs or symptoms of testicular cancer.



Many of Edinburgh's earliest settlers came from established communities in New England into an unknown wilderness here in the Sacandaga Valley. What went through the mind of Abijah Stark in 1787 as he loaded his wife Elizabeth and two children into their wagon to head West into the wilderness of "York" State? Coleraine, Massachusetts is several miles southeast of Bennington, Vermont and many miles east of the New York State border.

Was there a knot in the pit of Abijah's stomach wondering what lay ahead? Would they pack all that they needed? There would be NO stores to run to---

The wagon probably contained bags of beans and corn for planting and eating, traps, guns, skinning knife, blacksmith and farming tools, Elizabeth's spinning wheel and Bible, a years's supply of clothing, linens, bedding [feather ticks, quilts, coverlets], sewing and knitting supplies, medicinal herbs, staples[flour, lard, maple syrup, honey, salt, cornmeal], dishes, cooking utensils, crocks, beds, candles and maybe just maybe if Elizabeth were fortunate enough---a favorite possession from their old home—such as a rocking chair or hutch to store her dishes in. Tied onto the wagon was a crate of chickens, with horses or oxen to pull the wagon and the family milk cow trailing along behind.

There would be no roof over their heads in this new land until he built one and then this new home would be very small—a two-room log house not much bigger than 20'X 24' with a loft and large fireplace. Then imagine some of these homes packed with eight to a dozen children stacked like cordwood in the loft at night. Did Abijah consider turning back?

There were very few wagon roads from New England into New York State in the 1780's so the Starks probably headed northwest to Bennington, this road being familiar to Abijah since he fought here during the Revolutionary War. From Bennington they headed west passing into NYS, then on through Balls-Town [Ballston] and on to the Sacandaga River, settling on the east side of the river near the west line of Lot 23 of the Northampton Patent just north of Sir Wm. Johnson's little settlement of Fish House. It makes sense that other families may have traveled with the Stark family for protection, moral support and to help each other clear the land and build their homes.


Why did these people have itchy feet? The Revolutionary War certainly had a great deal to do with it. Many of these men had seen military service and quite possibly had marched through the valley several years before. There possibly was a scattering of folks here during or right after the war but no records have been found prior to the Stark family's arrival in 1787. Perhaps these families heard the

> same rumor that Samuel Downing had heard in Antrim, NH—" better living for less work and cheap land in the Sacandaga Valley". Land promoters throughout the ages have told the same story—the grass is always greener just over the next hill—but then again some people are naturally restless.

> For whatever the reason the Stark, Bass, Anderson, Westcott and Randall families set to work creating a settlement which would later be known as the Anderson Schoolhouse District.



Here is some exciting news! There are 25 trout with an orange tags in them from the stocking this spring. Each trout is worth \$750 during the contest and \$500 from May 5th through Labor Day 2019. To collect prize money, the tags must be physically attached to the trout when entered at Jim's Bait Shop in Mayfield, or brought to a GSLFF officer. We'd all like to thank the following sponsors of the tagged trout program: Frank & Sons Auto Body, Lanzi's on The Lake, Sport Island Pub, Lakeside Tavern, Partners Pub, Cranberry Cove Marina, the Raindancer Restaurant, Jim's Bait, Allwater Guide Service, Brownell Lumber, and Grandview Marina.

Now, if you didn't think be a GSLFF membership was worth it, these cash payouts are for members only! So, that \$10 membership is sounding more appealing, isn't it? The GSLFF strives to be an organization to represent and protect the rights of the fisherman on the lake while enhancing the fishery.

The GSLFF's First Annual Bass Fishing Contest is scheduled for July 20th from 6:00 AM - 3:00 PM. The weighing station will be at Sport Island Pub and weighing is from noon - 3 PM. All fish must be brought in alive to be released back into the lake! Cash prizes will be awarded for 1st through 5th place (total weight of 5 live fish). This is new event for the federation and we know it will be a huge success. Smallmouth bass fishing on the GSL is fantastic.

The Adirondack Watershed Institute Stewardship Program just released their Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) 2018 Final Report. The 193 page report summarizes to efforts and results from those "nosey kids at the boat launch." Well, those kids are part of a statewide study and invasive species prevention program, and they are helping all of our lakes. There were 152 Watershed and Decontamination Stewards, 27 decontamination stations, and 72 boat launches manned. I have not had the time to go through the entire document, but here are a few highlights: 191,493 people were greeted and educated at public

boat launches, 98,216 boats inspected, 4,617 AIS intercepted, and 3.7% of boats were carrying AIS. Statewide, the Stewards found 2,192 boats with Eurasion watermilfoil, 655 with zebra mussels, 259 with water chestnut, 268 with variable-leaf milfoil, 2 with Eurpoean frogbit, 23 with brittle naiad, 23 with spiny waterflea, and 1,183 with curly leaf pondweed. Just on the GSL, they inspected 13,967 boats and had 2.9% fail inspection and intercepted 62 AIS's. The GSL already is home to Eurasion watermilfoil, spiny waterflea and brittle naiad. I believe curly pondweed is here too. The Stewards intercepted and prevented the accidental introduction of water chestnut

and zebra mussels into the lake. We all need to thank those Stewards at the boat launch next time we see them, they are doing extremely valuable work.

The federation welcomes and encourages new members. If you



May is a quite special month around the world. It is the month of Mother's Day, May Day and the

beautiful flowers of May which the showers of April bring. While there are a number of differing customs of celebration of May Day and Mother's Day, there are also differing accounts of the origins of the two days. My personal choice for the authentic founding of Mother's Day in the United States relates to a very special American Woman: Julia Ward Howe.

Ms. Howe is remembered and revered as a prominent American abolitionist, feminist, and poet. She is, perhaps, most commonly remembered as the author of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." Peace was one of the defining elements of her life and her life's work, along with her patriotism, her faith in God and in God's justice, as the first prayerful verses of her famous hymn proclaim:

"Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord, He is trampling out the vintage where the

grapes of wrath are stored, He hath loosed the fateful lightning of His terrible swift sword, His truth is marching on, Glory! Glory ! Hallelujah! Glory! Glory! Hallelujah Glory! Glory ! Hallelujah! His truth is marching on"

As part of her life's work, Julia nursed the wounded during the American Civil War, and further spread her compassion amongst the widows and orphans of both Union and Confederate soldiers. In doing so, she saw that the devastating effects of war go far beyond maiming and loss of the soldiers in battle. This realization inspired Julia to issue a proclamation, calling for women to arise and unite for peaceful purposes and celebrate a "Mother's Day" dedicated to peace. In 1870 then, (several decades before it became an official U.S. holiday in 1914) Julia Ward Howe issued her Mother's Day Proclamation, which begins:

"Arise, then... women of this day!

Arise, all women who have hearts, whether our baptism be that of water or of tears! Say firmly:

We will not have great questions decided by irrelevant agencies.

Our husbands shall not come to us, reeking with carnage, for caresses and applause.

Our sons shall not be taken from us to unlearn all that we have been able to teach them of charity, mercy and patience.

We, women of one country, will be too tender of those of



another country to allow our sons to be trained to injure theirs.

From the bosom of the devastated earth a voice goes up with our own. It says: Disarm, Disarm! The sword of murder is not the balance of justice. Blood does not wipe out dishonor, nor violence vindicate possession. As men have often forsaken the plough and the anvil at the summons of war, let women now leave all that may be left of home for a great and earnest day of council.

Let them meet first, as women, to bewail and commemorate the dead. Let them then solemnly take council with each other as to the means whereby the great human family can live in peace, each bearing after his own kind the sacred impress, not of Caesar, but of God.

In the name of womanhood and of humanity, I earnestly ask that a general congress of women, without limit of nationality, may be appointed and held at some place deemed most convenient, and at the earliest period consistent with its objects, to promote the alliance of the different nationalities, the amicable settlement of international questions, the great and general interests of peace."

Julia Ward Howe

I urge readers to remember Ms. Howe's Mother's Day proclamation and understand the need to temper the defense of homeland and freedom with the need to continually support the efforts to spread peace, understanding, sisterhood and brotherhood throughout God's creation. For "Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God." (Matthew 5:9)

While honoring each of our mothers this Mother's Day, please join us, along with good people of all religious faiths and denominations, in praying for peace, praying for and supporting our servicewomen and service men, their mothers and all family members, and to pray daily for reconciliation of all peoples of the world, this day, this month and beyond.

28th Annual Saratoga Horse Symposium


