

# Seasonal Homes and Visitors on the Sacandaga

Continued from August issue

Interestingly enough in the past 3 years I have received inquiries from several different families who have had seasonal homes on the Sacandaga Reservoir/Great Sacandaga Lake area for several generations.

In the late 1920's the Edinburg Cold Brook School No. 5 on North Shore Rd. was moved up from the basin of the coming reservoir by the Torrey family. This Torrey -also a Henry- was I believe the grandson of the Henry Torrey I spoke of in last month's article who was the original owner of Hatetoquitit camp property on South Shore Rd.

In 1933 Mr. and Mrs. Edward H. Mills of Gloversville purchased the schoolhouse from Mr. Torrey. Since that time the Cold Brook School has served as the Mills/Vine summer camp for at least

A couple of years ago I was contacted by family member and part owner Beth Rebbecchi of New Jersey with inquiries about their camp and we shared information. Beth told me that the camp hasn't changed a great deal since it was purchased in 1933.

An interesting story related to the Mills/Vine camp—

Our Nellie Tyrrell Museum was originally Edinburg School No. 1 or the Beecher Hollow School. It closed in 1930-31 when students from the one-room schools were moved into the new 2-room school on Sinclaire Rd. The Town of Edinburg purchased the Beecher Hollow School to be used as the town's first town hall. In the late 1970's the school became our first museum when a new town hall and highway barn were constructed on Military Rd.

At some point after 1980 the bell tower on the museum was torn down-probably due to poor conditions- and the bell was given to the Edinburg Bible Chapel at the Four Corners. In 1992 Mrs. Meredith Mills Vine and Dr. Terry Mills, DVM generously donated the bell from their Cold Brook school/camp to the old Beecher Hollow school/museum. A new bell tower was constructed in 1995 and the bell installed. Visitors to our Nellie Tyrrell Museum are encouraged to ring the bell.

Isaac Sr. and Sally Haven Noyes settled in Edinburg on the east side of the Sacandaga River in 1806. Their descendants were still living in Edinburg in 1930 when the reservoir was filling. Large farm property owned jointly by two Noyes brothers was divided by the new North Shore Rd. One brother kept his property on the upper side of the new highway.

His brother on the lower side of the road divided his property into 50' lots, selling them for \$50, per lot. The development was called "Homeland".

Many folks know my friend Pam Hanke from the Husted/Hanke camp just off N. Shore Rd. There are now five generations that have been connected with the family camp since it was built from the lots of Noyes' Homestead development.

Pam's grandfather, dad and his brothers lived in Alplaus near Schenectady and often fished in the Sacandaga River before the reservoir was created. Her dad was a Boy Scout leader and often camped on South Shore. The Husteds knew the Noyes brothers and became aware of the lots for sale in 1935 and purchased six lots soon after.

The original Husted/Hanke camp was very primitive-according to today's standards- when first built in the 1930's as were most early camps. A camp was considered just that-a camp! The building consisted of a long rectangular room which formed a dining-living area, an open front porch facing the lake and a back section with two bedrooms and tiny kitchen. No running water, electricity or telephone!

No one knows for sure when electricity arrived but a well was drilled in 1966 and a phone line acquired in 1971/72 with a party line which means there were at least a dozen other households on it and your chances of using the line were nil. A bathroom, kitchen extension and bunkhouse were added in 1967; thus making life a little easier. Repairs and improvements have been added as necessary but it's still a wonderful camp.

I've spent many pleasant hours over the years sitting at the table or on the front porch conversing with many wonderful family members and friends. Even though Ohio is home to Pam the rest of the year Edinburg is home for the summer.

Another phone inquiry brought back fond memories for yours truly.

In 1948 a family from the Schenectady area bought a small piece-.77 acres- of land on the Military Rd. I remember Mrs. Vedder driving about town, always with a bandana about her head like a gypsy. She often stopped at my inlaws farm to purchase eggs, milk or butter or even maple syrup. I think she was loved by everyone who met her.

The camp was small and simple and for 30+ years after it was purchased it became a very busy place of activity each summer. However as often

happens life takes us on different paths and the Vedder camp was quiet most of the time.

How pleased I was to get that phone call and find the camp on Military is still in the family and being cared for by a granddaughter, Waldine Wade. May it remain a family camp for many years to come.





# 1830-1880 MANUFACTURING Leather Tanning

Tanneries used the hemlock bark to create tannic acid. Two large tanneries existed in the

area. The Lynwood tannery was technically in Hadley, but it drove a good deal of the valley's economy all the way to Batchellerville. The Lynwood Tannery produced 50,000 hides a year. The Croweville Tannery was a smaller operation, employing 20. It used 8000 hides/year and produced 140 tons of shoe sole leather.

Raw hides were imported from as far away as Mexico, tanned, and exported.

In order to service the tannery, Conklin ran 2 steam boats between Batchellerville and Conklingville towing barges that carried bark, and hides, as well as wooden mill products and other supplies.


#### **Wood Products**

Factories producing everything from clothes pins and washing boards to barrel staves and axe handles, existed in Day. The largest ones were in Conklingville, the industrial center of the Sacandaga Valley.

These factories located here because of water power, and the availability of cheap hardwoods. Products were exported to markets in the US and Europe.

#### Local Manufacturing

In addition to the export industries of leather tanning and wood products, Day was host to all the manufacturing required for local consumption – black smith shops, foundries, cooperages, grist mills and saw mills could be found in every hamlet, and on every stream.

# When you need us most, we'll be there.

Each Fall we return to the topic of home safety as it relates to burning combustibles within your home as a heat source. This can take many forms.


The one we seem to talk the most about is heating with a wood stove. Wood in this part of the country is a very attractive heating source primarily due to its competitive cost. Yet, there are some drawbacks, chief among them the need to keep your chimney in good working order throughout the season.

However even some of the cleaner burning heat sources require your attention. Pellet type stoves be they wood or corn operated, still require regular maintenance. The frequency of cleaning often varies by make and manufacturer. The type of wood pellet you burn and their moisture

content is a significant factor. I don't really know how this relates specifically with regard to corn, yet it too has a moisture content. And I will have to assume some brands of corn to be more efficient than others.

Natural gas and propane, while considered much cleaner heating sources, still require at least annual maintenance of the heating unit by a professional technician to maintain maximum efficiency and reduce the chances of any type of fire.

No heating system is not without some degree of upkeep and investment. Be sure that you don't treat your heating units the way you might approach the batteries in your smoke detectors this Fall. Better to see us at our Fund Drive, than find us in your driveway.

### **Flower Talk**

Sally Peck, of the Flower Barn

The Sunflower name comes from its tendency to reposition itself to face the sun. Its genus, Helianthus (Greek), "helios" meaning sun and "anthos" meaning flower.

An ancient Greek myth tells of Clytie, a nymph who adored Apollo. At first, he loved her back, but soon he fell in love with Leucothoe. Because of her jealousy, Clytie told Leucothoe's father of the relationship and he punished her by burying her alive. In anger, Apollo turned her into a flower, but even in flower form she still loved him and would spend her days watching him as he moved the sun across the sky in his chariot, just like sunflowers move to face the sun. Because of this story, the sunflower means adoration and loyalty (that is why they are the flower for 3rd Anniversaries).

In China it is associated with good fortune and long life because the plant has a full bloom phase for months and can withstand the hottest weather, so to enhance their lifespan, the Chinese



royal family consumed the flower. The Incas used sunflowers to symbolize the Sun God. To the Native Americans it represents harvest and bounty. In ancient Christian belief, the sunflower reflects God's love and stands for unwavering faith in Him with the desire to seek light and truth.

Countless artists have portrayed the sunflower, the most well-known is Van Gogh's Sunflower series.

The Sunflower originates from North America. They were picked by hunter gatherers as a natural source of fat to supplement meat. The seeds could be ground up and mixed with flour to make bread much like the pita variety we eat today. Around five thousand years ago people began to farm them in the south-western parts of North America in what is now Mexico. It is said to be one of the first crops to be grown in the Americas and was domesticated before corn. As they were cultivated over generations the plants produced bigger and

more seeds. The sunflower we have now bears no resemblance to how it started out. It was during this time that the Native Americans also began to farm sunflowers. They too made bread, but was not a food source only. They created a purple dye used for clothing, painting bodies and objects. Other parts of the plants were used to make medicinal remedies for snake bites, wounds, kidney & heart pain. The seed oil was used to lubricate hair and skin. Ancient societies could not afford to waste anything so stalks were dried and used as a building material.

Then came the discovery of the New World. The Europeans saw the benefits and transported seeds across the Atlantic in the 16th century to the Old World (Spain). It was mostly ornamental because of its beauty and size. In England, 1716, a patent was given for squeezing the oil out of the sunflower.

It was not until the 18th century the sunflower gained popularity as a cultivated plant. Surprisingly, Peter the Great of Russia was in Holland and became so enamored of the giant flower that he took seeds back to Russia. The people weren't overly impressed...until the season of Lent. You see, the Russian Orthodox Church forbade consuming oil during lent. However, sunflower oil was not on the prohibited list and the Russian people jumped on Peter's bandwagon wholeheartedly. By the early 19th century Russia had invested into research on breeding the flower and was growing over 2 million acres a year. Sunflower oil was manufactured in Russia on a lucrative commercial scale. They identified two types, one for oil production (small black seeds) and one for consumption (larger seeds

with a thicker hull). By 1830 it was time for the sunflower to make a triumphant return to America.

It took awhile for Americans to take advantage of the sunflower as a cash crop and used mostly as silo feed for chickens. Then in 1926 the Missouri Sunflower Growers Association started processing sunflower seeds into oil, about the same time as the Canadians. In both countries the breeding material (the seeds) came from members of the Russian Mennonite community. Today Sunflower oil is used for cooking, beauty products, to improve heart health and lower cholesterol.

Having gone full circle, the American sunflower is back home for good.

Periodically members notice foam floating on the Great Sacandaga Lake and question where it comes from and should we be concerned about it.

Q. Why do we see foam on our lakes and streams?

A. Foam is a natural phenomenon that occurs on many lakes and streams. Foam is produced when organic matter decomposes and releases fatty acids that act as surfactants or surface-active agents that reduce the surface tension of the water much like soap. Think of it as vegetable oil that you use in cooking. Smaller amounts of dissolved organic matter are also released from living organisms. These foam producing molecules have one end that repels water and another end that attracts

water and work to reduce the surface tension on the water surface. These fatty acids are lighter than water, so it floats on the surface of the water as a thin film. Turbulence from waves or currents cause the fatty acids to entrain small bubbles that constitute the foam. In lakes and large rivers, the wind causes the foam to form into parallel streaks, due to wind induced surface currents. Large amounts of foam will accumulate on downwind beaches and coves, in stream eddies or against docks, logs, and other floating objects.

Q. Where does the organic matter that makes the foam come from?

A. The organic matter in surface waters comes mostly from decomposing vegetation such as algae and terrestrial plants but could also include other natural sources such as dead fish. Some sources of organic matter can come from human activity, including sewage, agriculture, and other organic discharges. During spring, melting and refilling of the lake, causes a lot of foam as decomposed vegetation (i.e., leaves and needles) are washed out of backchannels and small streams. On the Great Sacandaga Lake we find large beds of pond weeds.

The stem of the weeds can be ten or more feet long and have small leaves attached to the stem. During the summer, as the lake level is lowered the weeds float near the surface and are cut and sometimes wind around the boat propellers. This decaying organic matter increases the amount of foam found around the lake during the summer.

Q. Is the foam natural or man-made?

A. While it is possible that humans are to blame, it is more likely the foam is just a natural phenomenon. Natural foam is generally white, breaks down relatively quickly and smells like fish or earth. If there is a lot of soil erosion the foam may be a dirty brown and contain small bits of organic matter. During periods of high pollen release from the pine trees in the spring, the foam maybe yellow. If the source of the foam is from detergents or other personal care products, then the foam may have a sweet or perfume smell. Whether the organic matter is from natural or man-made sources the main foam constituents are the same. To identify man-made sources of organics, some form of tracer compound would need to be sampled, such as chlorinated compounds or the musks used as scents. Man-made foam should accumulate near its source, not over large areas, will not persist, will dissipate quickly (once the discharge stops) and is generally not associated with rainstorms.

How do I get the longitude and latitude location of the weed patch?

With your smartphone while over the vegetation bed, open the Google Map app.

Zoom in on your current location.

Drop a pin on your current location by putting your finger on the current location icon on the map. The app will provide the longitude and latitude for the pin.



# A Century of Service for the Hudson River Regulating District

On August 2, 1922, the Hudson River Regulating District was formed! The Water Control Commission held the second of two hearings (the first having been held on July 25) following its receipt of a petition it had received on July 8, granting the petition at the conclusion of the hearing and entering a final order creating the Regulating District.

Momentum toward legislation which would allow for the creation of river regulating districts had increased significantly in New York State following devastating flooding in the spring of 1913. Damming the Sacandaga River to create a storage reservoir had been proposed as early as 1907, but the proposal did not gain traction. But following the unprecedented damage and public health impacts related to the Great Flood of 1913 in cities like Albany, consensus began to develop around a Legislative proposal to address the issues of flooding, as well as

maintaining stable river flows during the drier, summer months.

The Machold Storage Law was enacted by the New York State Legislature through Chapter 622

of the Laws of 1915. This law provided for the creation of river regulating districts, with powers to construct, maintain and operate reservoirs therein for the purpose of regulating downstream flows for flood protection, and for flow augmentation during the typically drier summer months for sanitary and hydropower benefits.


The Black River Regulating
District was formed in 1919, and
the Hudson River Regulating
District on this date in 1922. (The
two entities were combined by the
New York State Legislature in
1959 to create the Hudson River –
Black River Regulating District.)

The only major project constructed by the Hudson River Regulating District was the Conklingville Dam, which formed what is now known as the Great Sacandaga Lake by damming the Sacandaga River at the hamlet of Conklingville. The story of the dam's construction and the creation of the resulting storage reservoir is depicted in the documentary film: **Harnessing Nature: Building the Great Sacandaga**.

We are immensely proud of our century of service, particularly as we celebrate 100 years in the Hudson River Area. Thanks to a \$40 million commitment from Governor Hochul and the New York State Legislature, in the next few years



the Conklingville Dam will receive the necessary capital investment it will require for another century of service to the people in the region.







#### Lake Safety: Changeover?

Time flies when you are having fun. As a matter of fact, it seems that time flies even if you are not having fun! Either way, our calendar is changing to another month and we have to plan for the time ahead.

I didn't track the weather every day of the summer but it seemed WARM, if not HOT. In watching the weather reports on TV, I learned that we probably wished for a warm summer without knowing that sometimes we can be overrun with hot weather and daily warnings to stay inside away from the sun!

This summer also forced me to expand my vocabulary. I hope I am not the only person in our area who can never remember hearing the the term 'splash pad'. But now that I do, I have to share the wikipedia definition that it is a recreation area in a public park for water play "that has little or no standing water. This is said to eliminate the need for lifeguards or other supervision, as there is little risk of drawning." However, just to

is little risk of drowning." However, just to defend myself and others who might also be challenged by this new concept ... take heart, it sounds like an improvement over the water play gadget in our back yard which was called a 'water hose'!

Sorry for the distraction. This month, I am setting myself up to monitor our future weather and also to offer some recommendations for your approach to the changing weather expected for the Great Sacandaga and beyond. First, let's take an early look at the season to come.

# Keep an Eye to the Sky: The National Weather Service Winter Outlook

Hopefully, everyone will have more of an opportunity this year to explore our local surroundings as well as the country at large. We thought we would identify a few resources that should help to sort out possible winter travel destinations if that is in your plans. The first information source is from the National Weather Service's Climate Prediction Center and provides a nationwide snapshot for the season which is updated as the season progresses.

This source provides 3 month overlapping projections for 2022-2023 for both temperature and precipitation. (Footnote: In July, 2022, this resource projected that there would be above average precipitation for the eastern seaboard during the months of August-October 2022.) This type data are particularly useful in providing on-going snapshots of future weather patterns. The web address is: (www.cpc.ncep.noaa.gov/products/predictions/long\_range/two\_class.php/)

The above source provides information for the entire year but there is another display of the data for a one month and a three month forecast which provides more detailed up-to-date information. The web address is: (www.weather.gov/mhx/longtermoutlook). The data for the months of August/September/October, 2022 indicate above average temperatures and precipitation for our area!

In summary, these two references from the National Weather Service provide a nationwide forecast for both temperature and precipitation which should be helpful as YOU look at travel and

winter vacation plans.

Don't forget that a local forecast from the National Weather Service can be found by accessing: www.weather.gov and entering the location for which you want the forecast in the locator box on the left top of the screen! (i.e. Northville, NY, etc)

# The Change of Season on the Great Sacandaga Lake

The fall is a great time on the lake but there are some changes which might be useful to remember. The FIRST important fact is that the Great Sacandaga Lake is a reservoir which collects and releases water. The SECOND important fact is that there are obstructions under the water which surface as the water is released from the reservoir. The THIRD important fact is that the Hudson River Black River Regulating District (HRBRRD) maintains a system to provide the Great Sacandaga Lake users with an up-to-date status and projection for the water level on the lake.

The FOURTH important fact is that there are


fewer people on the lake and lakeshore available to offer assistance if you are in need in the fall!

Now, that is the reality but there is a solution. BE PREPARED! Here are some tips for fall boating.

Tip #1: Check the HRBRRD water level site (https://waterdata.usgs.gov/ny/nwis/uv?01323500). You might want to open the water level information box: '7 Day Reservoir Release Schedule' for the latest water level projections.

Prepare for your boating trip by making sure you have a JIMAPCO Great Sacandaga Lake Map and you have charted your boating adventure before leaving shore! However, if you are on the lake into the fall, make sure that your realize that some of the buoys may have been pulled for the season! Most importantly, prepare a float plan which details your 'adventure' and leave it with a friend along with the expected time of departure and return so that assistance can be sought if you are delayed on the water.

Tip #2: Check your boat to ensure that your equipment is in great working condition. Make sure that your safety equipment is adequate for the crew and passengers and your communication equipment (cell phone, marine radio) functions and

is appropriate for use on the lake!

Tip #3: Although it is probably obvious, as you prepare for your trip remember that the lake is a reservoir and the lake you sail on in the fall is not the lake that you sailed on in the summer! Areas marked by buoys during the summer may not have buoys in the fall but they are most likely more shallow than in the summer.

REMEMBER to call the person with whom you left your float plan to report your RETURN! There is no reason to have everyone looking for you when you are already home!

#### Life Jacket Requirements

Although it is a little early for the required seasonal change in life jacket usage, it doesn't hurt to be safe on the water.

New York State requires life jackets for: "Everyone aboard pleasure vessels less than 21 feet in length, including rowboats, canoes, and kayaks, while underway between November 1st and May 1st."





time to 'pull the docks and the boats'. It is really important to begin to think about it because of the amount of work involving docks and winterizing. This is not only an issue for boaters but it is an issue for homeowners who are preparing their property near the lake front.

The source which will START you thinking is the latest version of the New York Safe Boating course materials. They caution that "Hypothermia and death can result if the boat capsizes and its occupants are immersed in the cold water." You can access this document at: https://parks.ny.gov/ recreation/boating. As a homeowner on the lake, you should also think about the danger of swimming to a boat on a mooring when the water cools or removing docks from the water!

Catch you next month. Be SAFE in the Spring, Summer, Fall and Winter!

#### Northville Rotary Foundation Smoke Alarm Project

The Northville Rotary Foundation and Northville Rotary Club are developing a pilot program in conjunction with the Northville and Edinburg Fire Departments to provide smoke alarms to senior citizens and families in need in the Northville and Edinburg Area. By providing these alarms we want to emphasize and reiterate the importance of fire safety in the community. Some manufacturers recommend replacing their older units after 7 years of service given the

warranties are typically only for 5 years.

The Northville **Rotary Foundation** will underwrite the pilot program and will seek financial support from local businesses as well as members of the community. The roll out of the program is expected to commence during Fire Prevention week the 2nd week of October. The club will coordinate with Fire Departments and Senior organizations to identify individuals in the community in need of this service.

The Foundation would like to provide the combination smoke and carbon monoxide detectors with built in batteries that last 10 years. The Fire Departments will help with the identification of potential users as well as the installation phase of the program. In the first phase of the program, we will be allocating up to 50 alarms serving around 25 families.

## Patriot Day - United States Holiday

Patriot day, a holiday observed in the United States on September 11 to commemorate the lives of those who died in the 2001 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City and the Pentagon in Virginia and those who perished when the hijacked United Airlines Flight 93 crashed in Pennsylvania. The holiday also recognizes those who died attempting to rescue people trapped by the attacks.

By a joint resolution of the U.S. Congress on Dec. 18, 2001, September 11 was designated as Patriot Day. The resolution calls for the president of the United States to issue a yearly proclamation requesting that all U.S. flags be flown at half-staff. Further, Americans are asked to honour the dead with a moment of silence beginning at 8:46 am, Eastern Standard Time, the time that the first airplane struck the World Trade Center, and to respect the ceremonies of remembrance when they are conducted. Prior to passage of the resolution, several other names had been proposed for the day, such as the National Day of Remembrance and the National Day of Prayer and Remembrance.





## We're All Polluting the Lake!

Regrettably, the statement is true, although I believe that most people using the lake have no idea that they are polluting the lake. It's unfortunate and although it's not on purpose, it is a fact. Whether you're a homeowner, a gardener, a boater, or the avid fisherman trolling for the trophy catch, you're polluting the lake. It's impossible not to pollute the lake but taking time to think about your actions can help reduce the amounts of pollution you are contributing to the lake. So, how are you polluting it? What pollutants are you contributing to the lake? How can you do your part to curtail your contribution? Well, hopefully, this article will help. The following activities result in polluting the lake, do you do any of these?

#### From Inside Your Home

• Cleaning Products - Everyone wants a clean home, but many cleaners and detergents are harmful and pollute the lake. The cleaning products when washed down the drain find their way into the lake as they leach out of the house's septic tank.

- What can you do? Look for eco-friendly cleaning products to minimize the problem
- Medications Avoid flushing your unused medication down the toilet, just like cleaning products the medication leaches into the lake.
- What can you do? Contact your pharmacy or Police Department for drug take-back programs; if a take-back program is not available crush the medication and place it in with your household garbage for commercial disposal

#### From Your Yard, Garden, and Driveway

- Fertilizing Fertilizers are very harmful to the lake. Fertilizers affect not only the fish but also the plant life in and around the lake. Although there are eco-friendly fertilizers, they are still harmful to the lake as they promote growth in vegetation. The vegetation and algae use up the water's oxygen and make it uninhabitable for aquatic life.
- What can you do? When you do fertilize, take a moment to think about the conditions and if they are right for fertilizing, is the ground thawed, and is the soil aerated? Use less fertilizer than you think you need. Your plants and grass will







not absorb fertilizers if they are already full of nutrients.

- Commercial Pesticides There are no good commercial pesticides. Pesticides include insecticides, herbicides, rodenticides, and fungicides. All pesticides contain poisons that kill off both lake plants and fish. The chemicals in pesticides also contaminate fish making them unhealthy to eat.
- What can you do? Some safe natural insecticides can be used to help protect your garden and not harm the environment, but they too should be used at a minimum. Remember it's all about the circle of life. The plants and fish work in conjunction to keep the lake clean. The fish also feed off of the bugs you are trying to kill. There are a few natural pesticides such as Neem Oil and Diatomaceous Earth that can be used to help with pesky insects
- Salts During the winter salt is often used to melt the snow and ice from walkways and driveways. As the snow and ice melt, the water takes its natural path into the run-offs and then the lake. When the salt enters the lake, it breaks down and releases Chloride. Chloride is toxic to both the fish and plant life in the lake. In addition to being harmful directly to the plants and fish in the lake, due to the density of the salt over time, it will form a cap over the bottom of the lake. This

- cap reduces the natural mixing of the lake's soil and in turn reduces the lake's ability to produce oxygen, no oxygen, no plants or fish
- What can you do? The easiest and least expensive is to drive to the town facility and help yourself to the sand that they provide at no cost to the town residents. If you're in need of something more than sand look for the following products made by Gaia Enterprises, Safe Thaw, and Safe Paw (pet friendly). Although the chemical compound for these products is not available to the public the NYSDEC has tested and approved Safe Thaw and Safe Paw products as safe for our water system.
- Your lawn When mowing your lawn grass clippings find their way into the lake. If you have used fertilizers or pesticides, they have hitchhiked their way to the lake via the grass clippings. An unkempt lawn when mowed can cause damming at the culverts. The damming can lead to stagnant, polluted water and a home to Mosquitos.
- What can you do? For starters keep your grass well maintained, if you live lakeside plant a buffer strip of native plants along the bank. Aerating your lawn once a year will allow for the rain and watering to get down to the roots and help to promote a healthy lawn. Raking and collecting your clippings for compost are ways to help protect against contaminating the lake.

#### **Boating and Fishing**

- Launching your boat There are so many contaminants during this process. Where do we start? First, your trailer goes in the water, then your boat goes in, and then the rear end of your truck is in the lake. You have added axle grease from the trailer, the soap residue from cleaning your boat, and all the road dirt and wax from your truck.
- What can you do? It's not the cure-all but before waiting in line at the Day Center Launch take your set up to one of the self-car washes and power wash your trailer, boat, and truck, and don't use soap!
- Boating Anyone who boats on the lake enjoys everything from tying up to cruising to their favorite spot or restaurant. Your engine is spewing gas and if it's a 2-stroke oil, the suntan lotion is getting washed off the swimmers, and what was that that just flew off the boat?
- What can you do? For starters when selecting a boat choose a 4-Stroke and keep your engine clean and maintained. When purchasing sunscreen

look for products that are eco-friendly and Reef Safe. And to prevent unwanted trash in the water keep a garbage container onboard.

- Fishing Fishing is fun and if fishing off a boat we already covered the environmental impact. But just the act of fishing can also lead to polluting the lake. The two biggest issues are lead weights and the fishing line.
- What can you do? Discard lead weights and opt for weights made from stone and biodegradable materials. Before fishing, visually inspect your fishing line. Trim off the frail line and discard in your recycling bin. If you're catching and releasing, make sure to remove the hook before replacing the fish back in the water.
- Carry In, Carry Out Hopefully this does not require an explanation but if you bring "IT" to the lake take "IT" back with you!

There are so many more pollutants entering the lake and we will never solve them all but hopefully, you get something out of this article and make the change. We all want and deserve to enjoy a clean lake and our lives do depend on it!

In addition to the voluntary actions, NYS has

implemented an Invasive Species Inspection law. The new law went into effect on June 8, 2022. The law places Boat Stewards at boat launches to inspect motorized boats and watercrafts prior to launching and at their removal. Motorized Boaters and watercraft users are required to have a Certification form on their watercraft. If there is no Steward at your boat launch, you are required to perform a self-inspection. This form can be downloaded from the NYSDEP website Self-Issued Certificate for Watercraft Prior to Launch (ny.gov)

The Form should be filled out and stored on your vessel.



Finally, there is the reality that we are all




