2015 Highway Dodge Pick Up Truck Sold

The 2015 Dodge pickup truck has been sold through the online auction service of Auctions International. The high bid was \$26,100.00 for the truck. The sander and plow were not included in the sale. The town pays no fee to sell the vehicle, the purchaser pays the fee to Auctions International. The new truck was purchased through state bid for just over \$30,000.00 and we paid cash to the dealer.

Wheel Loader Grant Funds

The town has received the check for \$100,000.00 for the grant for the new Wheel Loader. This winter the loader was really helpful and we appreciate the grant arranged by Senator Tedisco.

Town Insurance Renewal

The town has submitted the application for renewal of the town insurance to the New York Municipal Insurance Reciprocal. This is an insurance company formed by municipal governments to provide affordable insurance to its members. The town has been a member for the last 6 years. This coming year they announced the premiums would remain the same as the prior year and increases in prior years have been minimal.

DID YOU KNOW THAT—

How many remember the following?

When each family only had one vehicle-if mom needed the car she took dad to work in the morning and picked him up at night [] Businesses only had one work shift per day-roughly 7am-4pm. Most stores were closed on Sundays [Drivers courteously dimmed their headlights [] Men removed their hats and caps when going indoors [] Churches never had to lock their doors [] Vacation Bible School was held in every community each summer. Lots of fun! [People said "Thank You" [Younger folks showed respect for their elders even if their beliefs were different Wooden rulers were inscribed with the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have others do unto you" [] The Lord's Prayer was recited in school every morning with the Flag Salute which had the new phrase added "One Nation Under God" [Local newspapers hired reporters to cover local towns-even crossing county lines to include Edinburg \(\) Women set their hair in pin curls or rollers; tied a scarf on their head and ran errands There was only one type of Oreo-no double stuff or strange flavors and colorings [] The young man at the grocery store would help you out with your groceries [] Grocers stacked boxes of fruits and vegetables in front of their stores to entice customers [] On the week-end we took our garbage to the town dump on Fox Hill Rd-yes, it was a dump-with no attendant- but a great place to shoot rats []

Remember When?

Someone passed away in the community a neighbor would take up a door to door collection to purchase a flower arrangement from all the neighbors [] Folks went fishing. As a kid I fished in the creek with a hardwood sapling for a pole with a piece of fishline and a hook. When a teenager I was given a bamboo pole that John Shufelt sold at his store at the 4-Corners. After I was married I acquired a fiberglass pole with a Zebco reel. Although I caught some 'yummie" bullheads with that pole I probably could have done as well with the old sapling [] The days before the "sexual revolution" and "all about me" generations of the 1960's and 70's [] Peacefulness before social media [] A power outage before the days of generators. If we had any idea the power might go out we'd fill jugs and pails with water. Kerosene lamps were used for lighting inside; lanterns and flashlights, outside. Some homes still had a wood stove for heat and cooking. If not, go to a neighbors' that did. [] Churches held delicious "fund-raiser" meals and Everyone Came [] Most kids worked each summer, you didn't just "hang out". If you didn't work away from home you worked at home-parents were great at coming up with projects. By the time September came many were happy to go back to school []

Or When?

The national news media reported the news as it really was and not with a bias [S & H Green Stamps and Popular and Signet Shopping clubs. In the early years of our marriage I acquired a lot of things for our home in this way [] Baby showers were held after the bridal showers [] Bridal and baby showers were simply held at a friend's home or church hall for a couple of hours on an afternoon or evening with simple desserts served. I still have and use 2 sets of Pyrex mixing /baking bowls that I received 60 years ago. Everyone was always





happy and thankful for whatever they received [] Round & Square dances at the firehouse when our firehouse was new. Dances were held there on a regular basis especially in the winter. It was a fun event for local folks to attend if you didn't want to go to a Bar & Grill. The late Cliff Canfield called most of the squares [] Silly Putty []

Remember any of these?

The family's "good set of dishes" was always used for holidays and special events-now more and more folks use paper plates [] Family rides on Sunday [] Weekly family get-togethers to catch up on the latest news [Dinner was the mid-day meal and supper was the evening meal-at least for country folks. Supper was the same time every night with everyone seated at the kitchen or dining room table. One needed a darn good excuse not to show up for supper. There was one variety of meal served and unless you had an extreme allergy-and hardly anyone did-everyone ate the same thing [] Parents made the choices and clothed their young children with what was appropriate for the time and place. In winter, especially, the adult in charge didn't let us out the door without being properly dressed. Even as teen-agers our parents had the last word [] It was best not to get into trouble at

school or on the bus as the punishment at home was worse than that at school [] The phrase "bullying" didn't exist yet but most of us took care of the problem on our own [] Many homes did not have indoor plumbing-just the little house out back [] The gas station attendant that checked your oil and washed your windshield while pumping your gas. One of the most pleasant attendants was the late "Skip" Wilson in Northville. Their motto should have been "we'll give you a smile today and send you on your way" [Young men converting old cars or trucks into jalopies to be re-used—some road-worthy and some off-the-road [] Young men "dressing up" a vehicle with extra lights, mud flaps, hubcaps, etc. Once in awhile we see this yet. My grandson has "dressed up" his late grandfather's pickup [Folks whistled a lot-not so much anymore [] only cuss words were heard from men and some women-not the vulgar language we hear today [Encyclopedias [Kids played all kinds of games outside even in the dark of night □ There were only 5 or 6 makes of cars manufactured and we could identify each one [] The B-24 bomber that flew into Plateau Sky Ranch Airport that locals called Brownell's Airport.

> Her program "Glove Capital of the World" will explore the history of the county's glove making from the early 18th century through today. Free tickets for limited seating will be available on a first come first served basis.


NCS Pre-K students have scheduled their annual visit to the library for May

Flower Talk by Sally Peck

Will the Real Lily Flower please stand up? If you get that line, then I know how old you are not.:) There are hundreds of different true Lilies that all fall under the same Lilium genus. Any flowers called Lilies that don't fit in this group, such as the day lily or water lily, are not considered a true Lily. Lilium is a Latin term, derived from the Greek term leirion, which traces back through numerous civilizations to one of the first words for flower! This shows the importance of the Lily Flower through the centuries.

The Lilium Longiflorum is also called the Easter Lily because in Christianity it is a symbol of the resurrection of Christ. Also, according to legend, after Jesus' death and resurrection, these flowers were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus went to pray the night before His crucifixion. Legend also has it that these flowers sprung up where drops of Jesus' sweat fell as he prayed.

Roman mythology links it to Juno, the queen of the gods. The story goes that while Juno was nursing her son Hercules, excess milk fell from the sky. Although part of it remained above the earth (creating the group of stars known as the Milky Way), the remainder fell to the earth, creating Lilies. Across religions, these lovely white flowers symbolize purity and grace.

Before the 1940's, Lily bulbs were mostly imported from Japan. The supply of bulbs was suddenly cut off after the attack on Pearl Harbor and Easter lilies became extremely valuable in the USA. Currently, nearly all Easter lily bulbs used in America are grown in Calif., Oregon as well as Canada.

All Lilies emerge from a humble bulb, but old-fashioned and heirloom Lilies produce true seeds you can share with loved ones and friends to spread the beauty around.

When you get your potted Lily home, remove the anthers (the pollen / the tip of the stems that grow from the center of the bloom). In the flower business we call that "Picking their Noses". This can extend the life of the flower and prevent pollen

from staining the petals. Find a bright spot for it to grow (not intense sunlight) and avoid overwatering. Once your lily has survived the colder days of Spring, you can plant it outside and enjoy it throughout summer! Plant the bulb to the same depth it was in the pot, then add a few inches of mulch around the roots. Be sure to water thoroughly at the beginning and during periods of growth. Be patient, you may have to wait until the next summer to see a second bloom on some plants. Like the Lily, you can take a regal stance and embrace your own power. Remember that renewal is just around the corner and the end of one thing heralds the beginning of another.

Floriography: White Lilies are a symbol of purity, hope and life. The striped pink Lily known as the Stargazer means ambition and encouragement when faced with a difficult challenge. Yellow Lilies commonly symbolize good health and healing, while red blooms speak of passion. Remember, Trust your Local Florist, contact them direct. Avoid the impersonal Order Gatherers, (E-Commerce 'flower' dealers) with their middleman and added fee\$.

PICKLE IN THE PARK



Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in the USA. The game is played with a whiffle ball and a paddle, on a court half the size of a tennis court. It is usually played doubles (4 players). It is easy to learn, social, intergenerational and fun to play and watch. All you need are court shoes and a paddle. There are pickleball videos on YouTube.

Pickle in the Park is a membership club in Sacandaga Park. Access to the courts and parking is off Rt30. We have 6 courts, about 30 members and play most summer days — weather permitting. 



The Fire Company has been kept busy over the course of the first few months of the year, with a

total of thirty-two calls as of March ninth.

Many of our calls were to provide mutual-aid to our neighboring fire departments, with eight calls to Northville and seven for Providence.

Some of the additional calls included: one rescue, three power lines, two structure fires, two EMS lifting assistance.

We would like to take this time to send a thank you out to those motorists whom make our job just a little easier by yielding the right-of-way when we are responding to emergencies. Our driver's have a lot on their minds when responding to a call. Your attention and cooperation is always appreciated.

One of the least discussed and perhaps most preventable residential fires, is the result of clothes dryers over heating. Your dryer may be susceptible to over heating if you do not clean out the lint trap after every single load. Much like a chimney, it is also important to determine there is no lint buildup in the vent piping leading out of the house and that the vent opening is not partially blocked where it leaves your home.

Recognize that any appliance which generates some form of significant heat, is a potential ignition source. Never leave it running when you are away from your house. Hopefully you wouldn't leave your stove going yet how many of us start the dishwasher (heat cycle) and think nothing of it, then head out for some activity or to work.

A little common sense will go a long way to keeping your home safe for years to come.





GO FOR WHOLE GRAINS

Brush up on your knowledge of what healthy eating really means! According to the United States Department of Agriculture, a healthy diet involves eating all five food groups including fruits, vegetables, grains, protein and dairy.

The 2015-2020 Dietary Guidelines For Americans recommends adults consume a variety of fruits and vegetables, switch to non-fat or low-fat dairy products, limit added sugars and saturated fats, and shift towards eating more whole grain foods. Specifically, about half of all grains consumed should be whole grains.

So, what's the difference between a whole grain or a refined (also called processed) grain? A whole grain contains the entire grain kernel and is made up of three layers including the bran or outer layer, the endosperm or middle layer, and the germ or inner layer. According to the Dietary Guidelines For Americans, the outer layer is rich in fiber and contains B vitamins and trace minerals, the middle layer contains carbohydrates and some proteins, and the inner layer is filled with many nutrients including antioxidants, Vitamin E, B vitamins and healthy fats.

Unlike a whole grain, a refined grain is processed, meaning parts of the grain are removed. A refined grain only contains the endosperm, or middle layer, so much of the nutrients that benefit your body are taken away when grains are processed.

Eating whole grains along with a healthy diet can help reduce the risk for developing some chronic diseases like heart disease or diabetes. To add more whole grains to your diet, the United States Department of Agriculture recommends these tips:

Make Simple Shifts – Try choosing 100% whole grain bread, bagels, or pasta instead of white bread, bagels or pasta. Change one or two things at a time until you've made half of your grains whole grains. Check The Label – Read the ingredients list to be sure you're choosing whole grain foods. Foods that are 100% whole grain usually list whole grains as the first ingredient or the second ingredient, after water.

Have A Whole Grain Snack – Popcorn is a healthy whole grain snack when made with little salt and no butter. Other whole grain snack options include whole wheat or rye crackers and brown rice cakes.

Modify Your Baking Recipes – Try substituting buckwheat or oat flour in your favorite pancake or waffle recipes in place of white flour.



Northville kicking off waterfront revitalization plan with state grant

Recently the Village of Northville was notified it was the recipient of a \$72,000 grant from the Department of State for the creation of a Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan (LWRP).

The basis of the grant application is the revitalization of Hunter Lake, also known as the Northville Little Lake. Additional renovations include: the creation of a walkway across the village spillway located on South Main Street between Hunter Lake and the Great Sacandaga


Lake; the dredging of Hunter Lake to remove years of build-up silt; and the creation of a linear park adjacent to Water Street. Each of these projects were identified in Northville's recently created comprehensive plan.

"We are very excited to be getting started on this very important project. The creation of the LWRP is a vital step in the development of the village," states Northville Mayor John Spaeth. "The Waterfront Revitalization will only help build upon the unique destination Northville truly in in the southern Adirondacks and enable us to continue growing as a tourist destination hot spot. Ultimately, it will help create a more sustainable economy within the village, town and county."

The village of Northville has contracted Elan Planning, Devine and Architecture of Saratoga to write the LWRP. The creation of the plan will be overseen by an advisory committee made up of community members and officials from various agencies that will be involved in the process. This committee will begin its work on Monday, March 11 when they hold their initial meeting. This team will determine the full scope of the plan and projects that will be included.

Greetings from the GSLFF!

As March winds down and the walleye and pike season closes, we can look back and see that the Great Sacandaga Lake (GSL) has produced some great fish this winter. Big pike and perch were once again are the highlights of many of the contests and outings. The GSL produces some of the biggest pike and yellow perch in New York and we are blessed to have this fishery right here in our backyards. Even though ice fishing has been exceptional, when the weather cooperated, I know a lot of anglers are looking forward to open water fishing and getting their boats out, me included.

A little recap of some of the various contests: the Walleye Challenge and concurrent GSLFF (Federation) contest were both huge success's with the weather being just about perfect. The Federation had 375 adult and 18 youth entrants and the Walleye Challenge sold out with 1,750 entrants quickly. Anglers from 10 states and 42 New York counties participated, that's pretty impressive! First place winners for the GSLFF contest were Cam Oathout with a 40 7/8" pike, Josh Rigo with a 20 1/8" brown trout, and Dom Demaria with a 14 3/8" yellow perch. The Fuel-N-Food 3-Day contest saw perfect weather for any type of outdoor activity. The lake was full of anglers and some great fish were brought in. The next GSLFF open-water contest will be held on May 4th. This coincides with opening day of walleye and pike. The trout bite should be good too. Something new and exciting this year, the Federation will be holding its 1st Annual Bass (only) contest on July 20, 2019. The rules will follow all other bass tournaments with prize money being paid out for the "total weight" of fish. Several places will be paid and we are looking into a youth division as well. The weigh-in location will be at Sport Island Pub.

\$1,000.00 toward walleye stocking this fall. The contests have also generated thousands of dollars toward fish stocking, which will include both walleve and trout. The spring trout stocking will be held around the end of April at various locations around the lake to spread the fish out. Keep in mind that tagged trout are worth \$500 during the May contest to GSLFF members and \$750 to members on the day of the contests. I always run rigs specifically for trout with hopes of getting a tagged fish.

My opinion based on the water levels this month is that we are going to have great walleye and pike spawning conditions this spring. The creeks will be running high from the deep snow pack in the mountains and the shallow edges of the lake will be inundated and are perfect for pike. We have been seeing a lot more weed growth in protected shallow bays and lots of bait throughout the summer. Bait fish at Cranberry Cove were found under the docks all summer and it made for great fishing along the shoreline. Some bait fish such as fatheads, will spawn several times throughout the summer. The abundance of bait in the lake is a win-win for the fish and the fishermen. Having a variety of forage fish will keep the bigger fish healthy and fat.



Living an hour's drive away, I sometimes miss Sunday services at

my beloved Northville Presbyterian Church, and instead, I wind up worshiping nearer to home at my wife's church in Schenectady's Stockade neighborhood. For me, (someone who looks for the positive side of everything) this presents the blessing of belonging to two diverse, wonderful extended families of faith.

However, one unfortunate result is my missing some awesome services that can only be experienced through the subsequent excited descriptions from my Northville friends. One example is our Pastor Becca's presentation of the Children's Sermon during a recent Sunday service. The promise of new life was celebrated by Becca leading the children in a seed planting exercise... culminated by "planting" paper cutouts of the word Hallelujah in the planting pots. Several significant dates and events are notable this year, as in the past, concerning our Church's celebration of the death and resurrection of Christ. Maundy Thursday, (Maundy means washing) represents the day Jesus emphasized and demonstrated humility by washing the feet of his disciples. It also marks the celebration of the Jewish Passover meal, during which the Christian Last Supper began and continues as a celebration of Communion with the Lord through recognizing the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus' body and blood.

While there will be no services on Maundy Thursday this year, but on Good Friday, April 19th, a combined Maundy Thursday and Good Friday service will be held at 7pm at Northville's First United Methodist Church. The rising Northville sun fulfilling "God's re-creation of the new day" as Eleanor Farjeon's beautiful 1931 hymn, "Morning Has Broken" observes. This year it is planned for sunrise (roughly 6am) but please check either Pastor Becca or Pastor Amy for the exact time and location as plans are finalized.

Please join us, along with good people of all religious faiths and denominations, in praying for peace and reconciliation of all peoples of the world, this Easter season and beyond.





Tedisco Helps Launch "Send It HDR III App" to **Enhance Safety on Great** Sacandaga Lake

Honor Henry D. Ross III Memorial Fund Senator Tedisco presents NYS Senate Citation to Mayfield family whose son tragically died in a snowmobile accident, and in whose memory "Send It HDR III App" was created

Mayfield-Senator Jim Tedisco (R,C,I,REF-Glenville) today at Lanzi's on the Lake in Mayfield, joined with local officials and members of the community to help support the launch of "Send It HDR III App" to enhance safety on the Great Sacandaga Lake.

The "Send It HDR III App", is named for the late Henry D. Ross III of Mayfield, who tragically lost his life in December 2016 in a snowmobile accident on the Great Sacandaga Lake. The "Send It HDR III App," which uses GPS technology, allows mobile phone users to alert each other of hazards on the lake and eventually for offroad snowmobile activities. The "Send It HDR III App" is available in the Apple Store and for Android phones. It was made possible thanks to the fundraising efforts of the Henry D Ross III Memorial fund and with support of the community.

Tedisco presented a New York State Senate citation to Henry D Ross III's parents Maria and Henry (nicknamed Beaver) in recognition of their outstanding efforts to make the 49thSenate District a safer place and ensure that what happened to their son does not happen to others.

"The 'Send It HDR III App' will help make snowmobiling and outdoor recreational activities safer for users who enjoy winter activities on the Great Sacandaga Lake. 





There are many businesses around the lake who supply excellent skilled labor. They want to do a good job because they live in this community too. No matter where you live, do your homework!
