

DID YOU KNOW THAT---

Slavery Part 2 and Conclusion

Various blacks lived in Edinburgh in the mid 1800's but not necessarily as slaves. Ely and Diadama Beecher had a black servant named Mary Jones. The Beechers came from Fish House to Edinburgh in or about 1802. Mary, fondly thought of by the Beecher family, died in 1876 at the age of 68 and is buried with the Beecher family in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Damie Copeland Fuller- a daughter of covered bridge builder, Arad Copeland- adopted a black child named Anna that was born in or about 1866 and raised her as her own. Anna grew into a fine young woman, moved to Gloversville for employment and married a man by the name of Clauson.



Damie's niece Emma Tyrrell, the same age as Anna, also lived in Gloversville with her family. Anna and her family would sometimes visit Emma and her family. Two of Emma's daughters, Nellie and Sylvia lived in Arad's brick house across from the Copeland Covered bridge in their later years. Sylvia told me that she and her mother attended Anna's funeral when she passed away in Gloversville, possibly in 1912 0r 1913.

At Fish House another "champion of the oppressed", Doctor Langdon Marvin- a captain in the Civil War- returned home from the Civil War with a young black man by the name of Ashton Hodges. It's quite possible this was a fake name to protect him from any previous owners in the south. Fondly called "Ash' by family members, Hodges spent the rest of his life at Fish House as overseer in charge of the Marvin family farm and is buried in the family plot.

In 1845 there were two black families by the names of Parker and Mott living in Edinburgh. In 1850 the Mott, Teabout and Fitch families were here. By 1855 only the Teabouts were here and in 1860 only a family by the name of Cutter were living here. Mr. Mott died in or about 1865 and his wife and son moved to Gloversville.

All of the above families were listed as being born in New York State but one wonders if they would have dared to admit otherwise? The above mentioned Henry Fitch with his wife and many children established a home on the mountain near Efnor Lake in Corinth very near the Edinburgh-Day-Corinth town lines. He is believed to have helped many slaves over the "tracks" of the Underground Railroad. Could he have possibly brought some of them over the mountain, down to the Sacandaga River bank, across the

President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. Many people thought this a rather strange document as it only freed the slaves in the Confederate states not yet occupied by Union troops. From this came the 13th Amendment in 1865, abolishing slavery, the 14th Amendment in 1868, for the protection of Citizens Rights and the 15th Amendment in 1870, giving Black men the right to vote. All three of these amendments were a direct result of the Civil War.

When folks think of slavery they usually just think of the United States and what many do not realize is that during that time period in our history the entire world was involved in slavery! What is even stranger is that the country of Africa was very involved in slave holdings. Slavery in West Africa did not legally end until 1875 but unofficially continued until World War 1.

Today we think of slavery as being very far removed from our northern homes but in the mid-1800's slavery was much closer to us here in Edinburgh than we could ever imagine.

The Edinburg Emergency Squad

The Edinburg Emergency Squad was founded in 1962 by Elwin Ginter, Edward Ashcroft, Turk St. Onge and Elmer Kenyon to serve the Edinburg community

They are the only all-volunteer service in Saratoga County and they cover around 150 calls annually with 22 volunteers, nine of which

are EMTs. They boast a 95% response rate! There are 1,292 people living in the area year-round. However, every summer that number increases with vacationers visiting the beaches, boat launches and camps in the area.

The Edinburg Emergency
Squad is no stranger to
community outreach. During
COVID-19 they organized
multiple mass distributions of
PPE and recruited nurses to join
with them and the department of
public health and ran dozens of
community and at home clinics
delivering one of the highest number
of COVID-19 vaccine doses in the
county, they also provided the entire
community with home testing kits.

The Edinburg Emergency squad is an all volunteer, nimble, dynamic selfless service organization that has consistently embraced change, delivered the highest quality EMS coupled with enhanced services to their citizens and their community. They

provided high-level care, going above and beyond during the COVID-19 pandemic.

You might know that they are a volunteer agency that does not bill. What many of you may not know is they run all of their operations by donations only, they are not on the town's tax roll.

So what makes this new ambulance even

more exciting...They were able to pay for it in full! (Which was just a little over \$250k) From their dedicated volunteers doing endless fundraisers, coin drops, fund drive letters and more.

So we want to give a HUGE SHOUT OUT OF THANK YOUS to all of the people who have supported them throughout the past few years to make this possible, without your generous donations they wouldn't be able to operate.

Northville School Donates Flag to FDNY Ten House of Heroes

Students and teachers from MS/HS Northville Central School, Northville, upstate NY., on Friday, June 9, donated a school-designed 9/11 Memorial American Flag to the FDNY firehouse that is home to Ladder Company 10 and Engine Company 10, known as FDNY Ten House of Heroes at 124 Liberty Street.

The FDNY Ten House of Heroes is the firehouse closest to the World Trade Center. It is located directly across from where the South Tower of the World Trade Center stood. It is adjacent to the St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in downtown New York City.

The 10 X 12-foot Star-Spangled Banner gift to the firehouse was in commemoration of the 20th anniversary of 9/11, observed two years ago.

Students created the flag using their handprints to sketch the stars and stripes of it.

MS/HS Northville Central School principal Sam Ratti said coming to the firehouse and presenting the flag enables them to connect and engage with first responders, some of whom witnessed and were engaged in the incident that happened on September 11, 2001.

"Even though our students learn in school about what happened on 9/11, they want to keep history alive and show appreciation to the men and women who put their lives on the line for the good of others.

Ladder 10 Company Capt. Brody received the flag on behalf of the firehouse. The captain

Flower Talk

Born to the Mediterranean then moved to Great Britain in the late 1500's, the Larkspur was finding its place in culture and horticulture with quite a tale to tell. It's appearance with five petals, one being elongated that gave this flower its name. Larkspur is derived from this elongated petal. Because it resembles the shape of silver prick spurs on riding boots of medieval knights. Which explains its earliest nickname, Knights Spur. More than likely, it is named after the hind claw of a lark bird. John Gerard, author/horticulturist made these notes about the Larkspur, "that in England the plant is known as larkspur, larks heel, larks toes, larks claw and munkeshoode." Eventually the name Larkspur settled in and was seen along roadsides and in cornfields throughout

Great Britain and Europe. As a relation to the Buttercup, it was once considered to be a member of the Delphinium family. However, it is an annual, therefore has been reclassified with the Ranunculus.

Its first tale is in Greek legend. The story goes that Achilles' mother requested that her son's armor be given to the bravest warrior during the Battle of Troy. To the dismay of the brave warrior Ajax, the armor was

awarded to Ulysses. This upset Ajax so much that he threw himself on his sword and where the blood pooled, it is told, there grew the first Larkspur.

But it's alluring looks of this flower and tales didn't stop with the Greeks. According to Native American folklore, the birth of the Larkspur goes to a celestial figure who was curious about the Earth. This celestial figure tore open the evening sky and used a piece of the sky to create a spike so that she could climb down to the Earth. The spike had small blue pieces of sky attached to it. The sun dried out the spike,

which disintegrated into small pieces that were scattered on the Earth that became the Larkspur.

In 1859 the tales continues as an early American legend. During the time of the goldrush, two Crane brothers wanted to 'strike it rich'. These mischievous youths were heading out from their midwest home to California to strike it rich. Along the way, they encountered countless poisonous snakes. To combat snake attacks, they used the tall larkspur as a guardian device and defense tool while they rested. This is an easy to believe story. Perhaps the Crane brothers may have known about the mild poison in the flower which was used throughout ancient

times to ward off scorpions, venomous snakes and kill lice. The poisonous alkaloids in the plant are an antidote to poisonous stings. Interestingly, one 'poison' cures another. The toxin is strongest in the seed and weakens into the flower as it grows and matures. Keep in mind they are toxic to humans and livestock, but not to pollinators or domestic sheep. The toxins, are used as an insecticide in the UK since the 1700's.

Both the Native Americans and the European settlers used Larkspur to make blue dye. Although Larkspur bloom in many colors, The blue in Larkspur is simply beautiful and is a great color for cheering someone up. Blue is calming and a lovely way to remind them to take a breather when things get too troublesome. Celebrate July birthdays with the Larkspur, the flower of July and of devotion and sincerity. Make it America's birthday flower by adding a little red and white for a patriotic bouquet. Happy 4th of July and God Bless America.

BACKYARD WILDLIFE

The clouds were hanging low in the grey sky, the summer season turning to fall as I walked along the lake. I spotted a large brown duck in the road. She was having trouble walking so I scooped her up thinking she was injured. She nestled into my arms and leaned close. I started home thinking "what am I going to do with her? The lake was right there maybe I should just let her go into the water". I slowly approached the water stepping carefully over the rocks. As soon as I was 5 feet from the lake she perked up, struggled against me and then did an amazing swan dive into the water. She swam several yards under water before breaking the surface. After some research I discovered that she was a diving

and unmistakable "tremolo" laughing calls, they are easily identifiable (although I have mistaken them for common mergansers from a distance).

Loons are like the proverbial canary in the coal mine as early predictors of environmental and ecosystem quality on lakes. Although they have been doing well due to biologist's efforts they are still at risk due to lake disturbances, lead sinkers, and pollution. Like my rescued brown duck, loons are sometimes stranded on late lake iceovers and wet pavement during migration.

While kayaking recently on a local lake I spotted an eagle on a branch. I was watching it completely unaware that a loon had come up behind me about 6 feet from the kayak. His "tremelo" call startled me and when I spun around I saw it. His mate was sitting on their nest and as I was approching he needed to get my attention. I already had momentum moving toward it and she lunged off

the nest wings held high and then circled my little boat. Often you will see photos of loons wings held high rising out of the water as they defend their territory. I immediately changed course but was able to spot the large brown egg on the nest. Once I was out of their danger zone I watched as they started to "fish" dropping their heads and eyes under the shallow water looking for fish then diving underwater only to surface many yards away.

Loons can live up to 20



duck possibly a female canvasback that became disoriented in the greyness as to what was water and what was road. Diving waterfowl are amazing swimmers torpedoing underwater after fish and other aquatics. They have powerful webbed feet for thrust but the disadvantage is that they have trouble walking on land as their feet are set far back on their bodies. They have to "run" on the water to take off in flight sometimes taking almost ¼ of a mile to become airborne.

In our Northern Forest Region the most popular diving waterfowl is the Common Loon. With their distinctive black and white plumage, large size,





years or more in good conditions raising one or two chicks each season, which are swimming within days of hatching and riding on their parents backs! The haunting sound of the loon's "laughing" calls are alarm calls or sometimes together with other loons a nighttime chorus. Many consider it the call of the wilderness, their likeness and image representing that very sense of the wild.

Recipes for You!

Air Fryer Pork Tenderloin with Roasted Butternut Squash

Ingredients:

- 4-5 cups of peeled, seeded and cubed (3/4") squash
- 1 Tbsp butter, melted Salt and pepper to taste
- 3 tsps. molasses
- 1 tsp paprika, preferably smoked
- 1 minced garlic clove
- 1 (1 pound) pork tenderloin, trimmed and cut in half crosswise

Instructions:

Toss the squash with half the melted butter and salt and pepper. Transfer to the air fryer and cook for 8 minutes at 350 degrees, tossing hallway through.

Meanwhile microwave the molasses with the paprika, garlic, salt and pepper until fragrant, about 30 seconds, stirring halfway through. Pat the pork dry and add to the molasses mixture, tossing to coat. Stir the squash and lay the tenderloin pieces on top, tucking under any thin ends of the pork. Return the basket to the air fryer and cook 16 to 20 minutes, until the pork registers 140 degrees. Flip and rotate the pork partway through the cooking to ensure it is evenly done. Transfer the meat to a platter and slice it ½ inch thick. Add squash to the platter and serve.



Sufficiency

Milkweed offers gifts. Glimpsing monarchs tilting on the breeze isn't the only thing to enjoy. It's true that if you give it a foot it might take your whole yard - but it is so easy to contain. Any stems that grow out of bounds can be pulled with minimal effort. As a bonus they can be part of a meal within minutes. You are probably skeptical. The top 5 or 6 inches, whether in leaf bud or flower bud, are tender and exquisitely flavored provided you boil them once and throw out the water. Reboil, then drain and enjoy as you would asparagus.

Fortunately the monarch caterpillars that require milkweed rely on the vegetation,

not the flowers, so by taking tips you're not jeopardizing the monarch nursery. I only harvest them because I grow them and a quick harvest keeps them within bounds.

A milkweed plant I once allowed into a flower patch, sensing opportunity, gradually colonized the entire thing. Then, moving towards sunnier spaces, steadily advanced onward. At first we stood back and watched, unwilling to disrupt this life-support system for monarch caterpillars. When we are without

milkweed, we will be without monarchs skittering through the sky.

Do we need monarchs? I don't know.

I just revert to some words that jumped off a brochure at me once: The first rule of intelligent tinkering is to SAVE ALL THE PARTS.

Let's test that:

Do we need blackflies? I learned while guiding, tempting as it may be to devise the demise of those airborne bloodsuckers, something out there absolutely requires the calories they provide to carry them through a season. A fly fisherman working one of the Raquette Lake tributaries noticed that the

bellies of brookies he caught during weekends in May were absolutely stuffed with blackfly larvae. It was over 95% of their diet that time of year, carrying them over till the next food source emerged.

Speaking of the great web of life, an even more surprising thing that some trout rely on is wolves. Sounds farfetched, doesn't it? Biologists who studied the return of wolves to Yellowstone noted that the presence of wolves changed the browsing habits of elk and deer which affected the stream-side vegetation. Browsers had become brazen.

With no predators on the premises and no need to hide, they spent more time in the open and on riverbanks polishing off alders and other shrubs that shaded stream beds, keeping the water cool and trout friendly. The return of wolf packs made browsers return to their natural behaviors: go for a drink then run for cover, back to the woods. Thus river banks recovered and trout returned.

So as I muse over my patch of milkweed I wonder if it sustains, indirectly, some other sequence of life that I know nothing of - a sanctuary for some bug that sustains bluebirds, bats or bumblebees? When you wave a wand of milkweed seeds over a sunny backyard or back road many marvelous meals can follow.



The Mayfield Historical Society is thrilled to announce the recent acquisition of an 1843 oil painting of Mr. Oliver Rice, the owner and builder of the 1810 Rice Homestead and his 1790 homesteading cabin at 328 Riceville Road in Mayfield. The related buildings and grounds now serve as a museum which is listed on both the State and National Historical Registries.

The Mayfield Historical Society did not know the portrait existed. A year ago, on May 8, 2022, Ms. Jennifer Lanagan-Robison of Palm Harbor, Florida, contacted the Mayfield Historical Society through the Society's



Facebook page after doing a web search on the name "Oliver Rice", which was written on the back of the painting. After careful examination of the handwriting, info on the back, and the face in the portrait along with Oliver's birthdate of 1768, it was determined that this was indeed a portrait of Oliver Rice of The Rice Homestead. She very graciously decided to donate the painting to the Mayfield Historical Society feeling that the best place for it was back in Mayfield, New York, in Oliver Rice's home where many visitors to the museum would enjoy it for years to come.

Thanks to Ms. Lanagan-Robison, the painting will be on display at The Rice Homestead beginning with the first Mayfield Historical Society event of the summer season, the 40th Annual Strawberry Festival, which was Saturday, June 10th. The Rice Homestead is open through Labor Day Weekend on Wednesdays and Saturdays noon to 4 pm and by appointment by calling 518-332-0538. Admission is free; donations accepted. 






We look forward to sharing our Nuggets of History from then as well as what's happening now. Nugget for July. As most know, Hadley and Lake Luzerne lie in two different counties, Saratoga and Warren respectively. But did you know it's the Bridge of Hope that brings them together to share the view of the "Mighty Hudson River. Looking north from the Bridge you see the thrilling picturesque beauty of Rockwell Falls and the extreme narrowing of the river. Crossing the southside you'll see the rush of rapids and dangerous whirlpools, the remains of the Nu Era Paper Company, and just beyond the visible confluence of the Sacandaga River meeting the Hudson then into "The Tiosaronda Bay". The 4-H Market Auction is a unique program for 4-H youth who are participating in market animal projects to raise various farm animals for the purpose of sale to the public. The project is intended to give youth the chance to be responsible for their animals but also to receive the monies from the sale. They'll use some of the funds to offset the costs incurred from caring for their animals and then be given the freedom to use any profits for themselves. Most individuals will use



their funds to begin the process of raising another animal or put it towards saving for their secondary education endeavors.

All animals must be paid for, IN FULL, at the end of the auction. The animals will be delivered to a processor, on Sunday, after the auction. The processor may be contacted directly for a specific

cut sheet and the processing costs are separate from the auction purchase. The meat will be delivered personally by each 4-H'er, or a pick-up may be arranged. Purchases can also be signed back to the 4-H'er with the original purchase price benefitting the 4-H member and the secondary sale furthering educational materials and supplies for the Saratoga County 4-H Livestock Program.

Bid as an individual, a business, or collaborate with a partner and go in as a share, by proxy options available as well.
