

Many years ago we had a column titled Don Bowman Remembers. It was written by a gentleman who lived in this area for many years, and worked on the dam and bridge. He lived in a bygone area of simpler times and strong resourceful people. We have access to many stories of the time and have decided to start printing them in our publication again.

I hope you enjoy them as much as we do.

Survival

We all called Shelby a hero. Like some other happenings on the project.

Why does a man rush into a burning building to save a child who means nothing to him?

Why does another leap into the frothing river to save another from certain death?

Why did Shelby risk his own life to freely throw his arms around Alexander at his own risk - on that beam of the powerhouse when the holding chain slipped and saved Alex from the long fall?

I'll tell you why those things are done. - There's an instinct within us greater than fear or the instinct for personal survival.

The instinct to help others!

"It was wuth it"

It took place in the store at Beechers. Ozzie stepped up to Big Elliot and said, "Elliot, I want you to leave my wife Myrna alone."

Big Elliot looked at Little Ozzie, laughed and said, "Iffen a man can't keep his wife at home I don't know why I should worry."

Ozzie, small as he was hit Big Elliot a blow to the mouth, followed with a good punch to the jaw. Then walked out of the store.

Big Elliot asked the Constable to arrest Ozzie for assault.

The Justice of the Peace asked Ozzie if he hit Elliot.

Ozzie answered the J.P., "I sure did Your Honor."

"That will be ten dollars or ten days," ruled the J.P.

"Here's the ten bucks Your Honor and it was wuth it."

Valley Indians

Many years ago there was a small Indian camp or settlement up-river toward the Osborn Bridge. Also one near Munsonville.

I found a good-sized stone, shaped like the head of a bird of prey - eagle or a buzzard. It had a shaped beak and even had two holes bored for eyes. the neck portion had been slimed down and shaped so as to have been placed in a piece of split ash or some other hardwood, then bound with rawhide. A war club or ceremonial club.

I sold it for cash money, in those days that was hard to come by. Today it would be worth a lot of money as a collectors item.

I and some other workers also found arrowheads, spear points, pieces of broken clay smoking pipes, clay pots, etc. There were even barbed frog gigs, fish spears and hooks made of hardwood or bone.

Of course those things brought in silver dollars and folding money.

HEALING POWER OF **GRATITUDE**

This is the time of year that asks us to count our blessings and to help those less fortunate. However, it is also a season which frequently brings high stress with all of the accompanying physical ailments such as headaches, fatigue, colds or even heart attacks. Those with chronic illnesses may even find their condition deteriorating under the pressures of the holidays.

There is hope for us to become happier and healthier simply by learning to have an "attitude of gratitude." Gratitude is not about "looking on the bright side" or denying reality. Gratitude goes much deeper than that, according to recent research in the emerging field of positive psychology. It's about learning from a situation, taking the good to help deal with life's challenges.

According to research at the Harvard School of Medicine, there is a very real connection between gratitude and good health. An estimated 90% of all doctor's visits are for stress-related ailments. Evidence suggests that today's biggest health challenges are heart disease, cancer and diabetes—all conditions that have

been liked to chronic stress.

Thankfully, stress is not so much a result of what is going on in our lives as it is about how we perceive those things. The good thing is that we have some control over how we look at life's challenges. Robert Emmons PhD. of the University of California, Davis wrote the first scientific study on gratitude, its causes, and potential impact on physical health. He showed conclusively that gratitude has a positive effect on reducing pain, improving digestion and strengthening the immune system.

A related study at the University of Connecticut found that gratitude can have a protective effect against heart attack. They also found that participants who had experienced one heart attack – but who saw benefits and gains from it, such as being more appreciative of life – experience a significantly lower risk of having a second heart attack.

To increase your level of gratitude, here are suggestions for getting started.

Keep a gratitude journal: Set aside time daily or even weekly to record several things you are grateful for. Typically, people list 3-5 things. This is probably the most effective strategy for improving gratitude by causing you to pay attention to the good things in your life.

Change your self-talk: Most of us are unaware of the negative things our mind focuses on each day. The first step is to pay attention to these negative thoughts and realize even if we think we are justified – the only person's health they are hurting is our own. Try reframing these thoughts by finding a more positive way to look at the situation. Instead of complaining about all the things you can no longer do, try changing that to all the things you can still do.

Gratitude will help you to be healthier and happier. It can also improve your relationships and make you feel more in control of your life. Practice being grateful, it is truly good for you!



Great job restoring; Haven't stopped by since the 90s – what an improvement – great job; Wonderful Queen Truss – thanks for preserving it; Just left a little bit of paradise. Love to all who walk through here; Great bridges and water falls; I loved this place when I first saw it before it was restored. I am pleased to have been one of the original sponsors; Our family, the Tyrrells built this bridge and I just found out about it on Ancestry. com and now we have been able to see it restored; Always loved coming here as a kid – brings good memories; We had to see the bridge since we were given a share as a wedding gift last year; Enjoyed the scenery; Such a treasure – bought a shirt with covered bridge on it at Fuller's; Great location for engagement photos.

Arad and Leonard Copeland purchased Ely Beecher's sawmill and carriage factory located along Beecher Creek. Arad Copeland and his wife Anna Trowbridge owned 32 acres below Beecher Falls. An open bridge across the creek gave access

to their pasture and garden until it was destroyed by melting spring snow and ice. In 1879 Arad decided to build a covered bridge and according to family legend local residents Melzor Manning laid the stones, Jacob Latcher hewed the timbers and Azariah Ellithorpe Jr framed the bridge. It was built strictly for Arad to get his cows to pasture. The bridge is 35 feet long and is the only New York State queen post truss bridge in Saratoga County and was placed on the NYS National Register in 1998. The queen post truss is similar to a king post truss in that the outer supports are angled towards the center of the structure. The primary difference is the horizontal extension at the center which relies on beam action to provide mechanical stability. This truss style is only suitable for relatively short spans.

In the fall of 1997, great, great grandson, Robert Tyrrell and wife Betty graciously deeded the bridge over to the Edinburg Historical Society. A new metal roof, new flooring and some side boards have been replaced.

The Copeland Site also has a carriage house believed to be built over 175 years ago and during that time was a carriage shop and then a machine shop totally powered by water. The shop was operated as a wheelwright and maker of cabinets, furniture and coffins. Upon Copeland's death his son-in-law, John Latcher, a talented machinist

> and inventor, operated the shop for over 30 years. Since Latcher's death the shop was kept in pretty good condition although much restoration work is needed. The previous owner looked into installing a water wheel and the pond restoring the site to what it used to be but the EPA nixed the idea and the Carriage House was sold to EHS. The Society is hoping to restore it so it can be open to the public promoting history, education and the arts.

> The Society is very fortunate to have Andre Garand, a specialist in historic building restoration working on our old structures. Andre uses mortise and tenon instead of nails and has just completed work on the Nellie Tyrrell Museum and posts and ceiling ties on the Carriage House.



DID YOU KNOW THAT—

No amount of sales or super bargains have ever convinced me to go shopping on Black Friday. I have always set aside this Friday after Thanksgiving to do my outdoor Christmas decorating; wrapping up the day having Thanksgiving left-overs with my family.

Plastic totes of light strings and bows come off the cellar shelves and are hauled outside. My garden cart will be filled before- hand with greens waiting to be arranged in buckets and pots or made into wreaths or swags.

As a child at home our Christmas tree came from my Grandfather Olmstead's farm a couple miles up the road. When our girls were small our tree was cut about a week and a half before Christmas. My husband would often pick out the tree during hunting season as he and the hunting gang roamed the woods on Edwards property. Other years we would have to choose one "cold turkey" which wasn't always easy-especially if the trees were loaded down from an early snow.

My husband was very fussy about his trees and many were the years he drilled holes in the trunk; adding more branches whether than simply turn the bad side into the corner of the living room. As the farm trees became scarcer we started buying our trees from a local tree farm.

As I write this in the 2nd week of Novemberalready LL Bean, drug and department stores, even Lowe's have artificial wreaths and trees for sale. In a couple of weeks real trees will be available at your big box stores too.

Sixty years ago there was very little "artificial" and your biggest stores were Sears and Montgomery Ward. Tree lots were set up in empty parking areas or at gas stations in villages, towns and cities. Who supplied the merchandise for these lots? Farmers and country folk who had plenty of balsam and spruce on their property or could make a deal with a neighbor who had trees.

During the 1950's and into the 60's the Horton Colvin family on Shields Road sold Christmas trees to supplement their income to provide for their large family. It was a family affair with the kids doing whatever job their size could handle. The larger kids were in charge of trimming boughs from the trees with brush cutters. The boughs were sold in bundles. The trees brought \$.50 for trees 4'tall and under and \$1.00 for all trees over 4'.

One year a dealer bought 1000 trees. Some buyers' employees would weave boughs through chicken wire to make "grave blankets" for cemeteries.

The entire Colvin family benefited from the tree sales. The much needed proceeds paid their annual property taxes and purchased new shoes for the children starting school each September.

The Walter Edwards family and then son Guy and his family also sold Christmas trees with an average 200-300 cut each year. One year 500

were cut and sold. Mostly cut on wet, swampy ground the trees sold for \$.75 each. Their principal buyer was Chuck Trembley who had a gas station in Nelliston where the trees were sold. A Mr. Felts who worked for ENCON also purchased trees.

Prentice Abrams who owned and operated a sawmill behind the King Cemetery in Sacandaga Park supplied large Christmas trees each year to banking institutions throughout the Mohawk Valley. For a couple of years these trees 25'-30' in height, were purchased from the Edwards family. The trees were cut and skidded out with a horse. Prentice brought his mill crew in to load the trees onto a single axle truck. Most of these trees were cut in a beaver pond. Very large trees were cut; then the 25'-30' ones were cut from the tops for the needed trees. These trees would have died anyway due to the fact their feet were wet at all times.

In the early years before tractors Christmas trees were brought from the woods with horses and wagon. Not having enough Christmas trees on their own land the Edwards family also purchased trees from neighboring landowners, Lucian Craig, DeForest Robinson and William Partridge.

One wonders how far these trees and boughs traveled and how many people enjoyed the scent of our Adirondack foothills-even for a couple of weeks. Thanks Faye and Guy for sharing these Edinburg Christmas memories.

Today many tree farms dot the landscape in our North Country and Canada supplying trees and wreaths of several kinds of evergreen other than the old stand-by balsam.

Whatever your choice of tree this year-real or artificial- May you have a very Merry Christmas and a Happy, Healthy New Year!





Anyone underway in a boat less than 21 feet in length anytime between November 1 and May 1 must wear a securely fastened life jacket (PFD). This includes canoes, kayaks, rowboats and motorboats.

We have completed our fish stocking program for this year. The total number of rainbow/brown trout stocked was 4,975. The average weight was approximately 1lb. each and the total cost was \$22,000.00. The fish were stocked in the towns of Broadalbin, Day, Edinburg, Mayfield and Northhampton.

A total of \$10,500 was spent on purchasing 6,000 walleye. These fish averaged 4-6" in length. Due to the water level at the time of stocking the fish were stocked at 3 locations: Cranberry Cove

Marina, Northville Boat Launch and Captain Nauti's at Edinburg.

Our 2016 Ice Fishing Contest will be held on Saturday, January 30, 2016 at the Sacandaga Boat Club, 129 Merriam Road, Broadalbin, NY, The hours of the contest are from 7 AM to 4 PM. Prizes this year will be given for northern pike, trout and perch. Total cash prizes this year total \$2,250. Those of you who enter both the Walleve Challenge Ice Fishing Contest and our GSLFF Ice fishing contest will be able to enter the walleyes caught at the Walleye Challenge Contest and any northern pike, trout or perch caught at our GSLFF contest. There will be 20 trout tagged with a green tag. each worth \$1000 (FOR 2016 GSLFF MEMBERS WITH PAID ENTRY good for 1/30/2016 ONLY). TAG MUST BE ATTACHED TO FISH.


Choir Rehearsals are Thursdays at 6:30 pm and we always look forward to welcoming new singers.
