October 21, 2017; 11 AM  $\,$ 



#### HISTORY OF THE TOWN OF DAY

On Tuesday, October 17 at 7:00 p.m the Edinburg Historical Society will hold its monthly meeting at the Edinburg Community Center on Military Road. Dave Davidson, Town of Day Historian, will talk on the town's history.

Day is a beautiful scenic town bordered by Edinburg, Hadley and Corinth. The Sacandaga enters the town of Day at its southwest corner, and flows in a northeast by east course across it. The Kayadrossera range of mountains are in the southern part of the town, and north of the river there are high hills. There are three small lakes, Mud, Sand, and Livingston. Oak and Bald mountains reach an elevation of nine hundred feet above the river. Rockwell's mountain, near Day Centre, is a stony elevation of some seven hundred feet, and affords a lovely view up the valley. From the hills back of Huntsville a beautiful view of the valley, the Mayfield Mountains, and the distant Catskills can be seen, and from other hills the Green mountains of Vermont show plainly in clear weather.



#### Letter Regarding Potential NYS Land Purchase in Edinburg

The town has received a letter from the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) dated September 8, 2017 notifying us that the state is contemplating the purchase of land owned by Voyager Advisors LLC (former Sweet property). It consists of a number of parcels off of South

Shore Road and Fox Hill Road (between Fox Hill and the Amsterdam Waterworks) totaling approximately 4300 acres. The letter states that "this purchase will first be approached as a conservation easement, if a conservation buyer is not identified then the Department will negotiate a fee ownership". The town has 90 days from the date of the letter to respond with a determination of support or opposition to the use of Environmental Protection Funds (EPF) for this project. If the town objects to the use of EPF funds for the project the DEC can still make the purchase with the use of other funds. The town has concerns about the economic impacts to the community from an easement purchase as well as a fee purchase. Will traditional uses such as timber harvesting, recreation leases, hunting, motorized access, snowmobile usage, road shoulder maintenance and the continued use of Fox Hill Road be allowed? Where will the access points be located to the land, where will parking be located and who will be responsible for the services

that this amount of public land would require? Will there be campsites? What about increased costs and strain on volunteers for fire and emergency services. What are the tax implications to the school and the town and county? The town is requesting additional information about the project before making a decision.

#### Sinclair Road Speed Limit

The NYS Department of Transportation (DOT) denied the town request for a speed limit reduction on Sinclair Road. A letter was sent to the Regional



DOT Deputy Commissioner requesting that the denial of the speed limit reduction on Sinclair Road be reversed. The Regional DOT Commissioner has denied the appeal of the decision. He said that the law currently requires the speed limit decisions be based upon engineering factors only. The public or community wishes and any other factors are not considered. The only recourse we have at this point is to request our legislators to attempt to have the law changed. There have been efforts for a number of years to give towns and counties the authority to set their own speed limits. Currently cities and village can set their own limits. These attempts have never succeeded. We are going to ask Senator Tedisco and Assemblyman Stec for legislation to allow towns the authority to reduce speed limits to as low as 40mph, without state approval, with a majority vote of the Town Board.




Town Board has voted in support. This is a Constitutional Amendment to set up a land bank of 250 acres for use by local government for utility, communication and public safety purposes, such as fiber optic placement along roads that have forest preserve on each side, bridge replacements that might require small amounts of forest preserve and other similar projects. There appear to be no groups opposed. Environmental groups, government groups, the North Country Chamber of Commerce and the Schenectady Gazette are all in favor as well as many others.

FEMA Reimbursement for Winter Storm Stella Superstorm Stella on March 14, 2017 has been determined eligible

2017 has been determined eligible for reimbursement of costs incurred by Saratoga County and our local governments. FEMA will reimburse the town for 75% of eligible expenses. There is considerable paperwork but it appears we might get back as much as \$10,000.00 depending on the hourly equipment allowances. We have begun the paperwork process with FEMA.

Our summer season on the Great Sacandaga is closing down! We thank everyone for making the season fun and enjoyable, although the weather sometimes was not the best.

#### The Lake Community in Action

Last month we reported that Fulton County Sheriff Rich Giardino called for the lake community to clean-up Sand Island. The GSLA posted a picture of the cleanup invitation along with a collage of pictures of a 'littered' Sand Island with the slogan CARRY ON ..... CARRY OFF! The pictures and collage can be viewed on www.gsla. org Share the collage!

The Sheriff also reminded boaters to boat safely and respect lake community access permit areas. At the same time, Sheriff Zurlo's lake patrol from Saratoga County reported their activities to make the Sacandaga Dam Tie-Up a safe destination.

The Great Sacandaga Lake Association followed up on the lake access permit discussion by convening a meeting of lake community organizations including the Fulton County Sheriff and the Hudson River-Black River Regulating District on August 23, 2017 to discuss other steps that can be undertaken to ensure that boaters on the Great Sacandaga understand the lake permit system.

The lake community is a great place to reside and to visit. However, it is only GREAT Sacandaga if everyone takes personal responsibility in keeping it GREAT 365 days a year.

#### Aquatic Invasive Species

GSLA Secretary Ed Ludlum and I attended a meeting in Caroga Lake on August 26, 2017 to learn how other lake communities are handling the issue of invasive species on their lakes. The meeting included representatives from the Fulton County Soil and Water Conservation District; DEC; the Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program and Paul Smith's College Adirondack Watershed Institute. A list of Adirondack Waters with Aquatic Invasive Species was distributed. This list identified the Great Sacandaga as home to Eurasian Watermilfoil, Spiny Waterflea and Brittle Naiad. We learned that the State recently enacted a regulation to address the spread of invasive species. The regulation (Section 9-1710) states that: "No person shall launch a watercraft or floating dock unless it can be demonstrated that reasonable precautions such as removal of any visible plant or animal matter, washing, draining or drying as defined by the department pursuant to rules and regulations, have been taken."

GSLA members and the lake community at large are aware that the members of the Great Sacandaga Lake Advisory Council (GSLAC) including the GSLA are long term supporters of the Paul Smith's College Lake Steward Program which provides voluntary inspections on vessels before they are launched into the Great Sacandaga.

#### SAFE LAKE INITIATIVE

This summer the Great Sacandaga Lake Association and other lake partners initiated a program to draw attention to safety on the lake both in the summer and in the winter. Initiative members were asked to post notices and share information on boater safety and safety initiatives. The GSLA provided short videos on boater safety topics to members using the GSLA e-burst which is an electronic mail system.

The initiative partners will be meeting shortly to evaluate our progress during the summer months and plan for the winter season. Information will be forthcoming!

The Great Sacandaga Lake Association is a member supported organization which actively seeks member recommendations. The lake as a community is only as strong as we make it. 

#### GUIDE TO PROTECTING KIDNEY HEALTH







light and color are learned when you paint on location. I try to paint outside as often as possible to collect information for my work. That said, I seldom look at the work I create on site as a finished piece. I seem to need the quiet and solitude of my studio to complete my work and think about the process.

The more I paint, the less I think I know. As an artist you are always trying to catch up to your idea of what your work should look like. Your objectives are always just beyond your skill level. That challenge is what keeps me going. I am now working on simplifying composition in my scenes to say more with less as well as creating greater visual harmony using neutral colors.

Creating art is a lifelong journey. There are so many elements involved - drawing, values, craftsmanship, brush techniques, composition and color. So many kinds of color - warm or cool, intense or subtle, darks and lights, transparent and opaque. The most important piece to me is the resulting poetry of the painting. It's the struggle to be able to paint something the will connect with yourself and viewers that is important to me.

My landscape paintings are small moments in time and place that I can cherish for another day. I am comforted by the order of the natural world, the constant cycle of the seasons, the beauty of the light playing on the fields and the wind in the trees. The challenge is to describe these feelings in paint and communicate it with the world. As I paint a rural meadow it merges with childhood memories of the back pasture of my grandmother's farm. When the painting is finished you might think it's that favorite field you drive by on your way home each night and how the sun is hitting it just right. We have each found something in some brush strokes and paint that communicate without words appreciation for the world around us, a universal language where words are not necessary. I am happy to have this opportunity to share my world with you."






"The Hunting Trip", part 2

Last month I started telling you about the deer hunting trip that Batchellerville native Wellington E. Gordon took with some friends in 1887. Did any of my readers notice that the trip started from Batchellerville on June 30? Todays' hunters would find this a very odd time to go deer hunting. They left for their trip on the morning of Wednesday June 30, 1887. Their guides Chet and Burr Sturges met the group in Lake Pleasant. "Gentlemen" hunters and fishermen wishing to get the "north woods experience" provided much seasonal employment to the knowledgeable residents of the North Country. Now a week into their camping experience let's get on with their story---

"July 5, Tuesday.....As George Brown of Northville, N.Y. and W.G. Snow of Montclair, N.J. were expected at Lake Pleasant today to join our



party as soon as they could get in, we sent Burr out to guide them in tomorrow. Chet, Mr. Hill and myself took a 4 mile tramp over to a place called Mud stream, where it was thought we could get a good catch of trout if no one had fished there lately. To get there we had to go up by and across Whitney Lake and then follow along a ridge to the outlet of Whitney and Pillsbury which join their waters in one stream, and then a short distance across a little ridge to Mud Stream. This stream, together with the one just mentioned, are the head waters of West Canada Creek. Mud Stream, where the trail strikes it, is about two feet deep and a rod wide. A few rods above are two deep places where trout usually lie. A rough fish pole and line with a fresh worm on the hook stood by the side of the trail near the stream and told us the place had been fished this morning or late the night before. However, by a little coaxing we caught eighteen nice trout, the largest weighing a pound. Chet took us downstream a few rods to where it empties into Mud Lake, and there on a sandy bar we saw what I never expected to see again, a place several rods square literally covered with deer tracks of all sizes from that of the smallest doe to that of the largest buck. After taking the little lunch we






had brought we started for camp and reached it in one hour and fifty minutes. On our way back we ran upon Whitney seated by the trail, rifle in hand watching for a deer in the little pond on back of Pillsbury. Batcheller was also nearby watching and had given one shot but without effect. Not long after we reached camp we heard the report of a rifle and within an hour they came in for Chet to go and dress a deer which Whitney had shot.

It had rained a little so that the bushes were wet and the traveling disagreeable, but everyone was happy for camp life with nothing but trout to eat comes to be monotonous. Chet gave us an excellent supper from the tenderloin. Just dusk we were all gladly surprised to see George Brown come rushing up the path followed by A.J. Green of Montclair, N.J. They reported that Snow and A.A. Webster of Brooklyn were at the head of the lake waiting for the guide to return for them. They had determined to come through in a day so left Northville early in the morning, taking breakfast at Samp Hosleys and dinner at Dave Sturges. Burr had not yet arrived so they got Jimmy, Burr's boy to guide them in. At Mill Brook about two miles from the lake, they met Burr. He went on to the lake to buy some coffee and other supplies and returned the next day. The boys were all pretty tired and few stories were told before dropping off to sleep.

July 6, Wednesday.....Mr. Hill and Green went up to the head of the lake to fish a spring hole and Noyes, Snow, Whitney and Batcheller went over to Whitney Lake and fished from the rocks for trout. Green and Hill caught but few, and those small but the other party caught the finest string of trout I have ever seen. They were but ten of them, but they weighed 8-3/4 pounds; the three largest weighed 5-1/4 pounds. The largest just 2 pounds. The rest of our party, now numbering ten, stayed around camp and fished at times in the lake catching a few fine trout. During the evening games were played and stories told with side splitting effects. Webster in particular is a capital story teller. Sleep came late but was very refreshing. I forgot to say that towards evening Chet and I went up to what is called the big bay and watched for deer. None appeared, however, thought they would undoubtedly have been safe as I had a rifle with me and never shot one at game in my life.

July 7, Thursday.....Allured by the success of the party at Lake Whitney yesterday, Webster, Green, Brown and Hill took Burr and fished there nearly all day. They were not as successful as the other party, and came to camp slightly depressed. Greene never got a bite but the others got one or two fair-sized trout each. In the afternoon guided by Chet; Snow, Batcheller, Noyes, Robinson and I went over to the Cedars about a mile away. On our way we met Dr. Reeve, a Presbyterian Minister from Johnstown, New York, whom we saw at Dave Sturges' and who came in to the Cedars the same day we came here with John Sturges, his guide. He was coming over to make us a visit but as we were more than half way to the Cedars, he went back with us and took us to his camp in his boat and another owned by John. The trail from our

camp over is easily followed. A little more than half way over, it crosses what seems to have been at one time a shallow lake which now is dry and filled up. The end of the trail strikes a little bay on the side of what is known as Middle Lake. From here we rowed down to the narrows and through them into the lower and largest lake. The scenery around these lakes is the most beautiful of any I have even seen in the north woods. Mountains surround them on all sides and deep bays penetrate between promontories making an irregular but very picturesque outline. The shores are rocky and but few lily pads grow along them. Several small islands add to the otherwise exquisite beauty of these watery gems. Dr. Reeve's camp is on the west shore of the lower lake back about six rods from the shore. It is not pleasantly located, being on low ground and shut out from a view of the lake by a small ridge of spruce. Most excellent springs of water are near it, however, and it is but a few steps to the spruce ridge where is an excellent lounging place, commanding a view of the entire lake and of lofty mountains to the north. We did not visit the upper lake but obtained a glance of it up through a little pass that leads to it and saw in the distance its most prominent feature, a high steep mountain peak known as the Cobble. The trail from the Cedars to Mud Stream where we fished Tuesday runs along the base of this mountain. Dr. Reeve and his guide accompanied us home and took supper with us and after supper smoked, and told stories until dusk when they left for their camp. As our meat was nearly gone Noves and Jimmy went out in the evening and got another deer. [If hunters did this today they might be facing jail time]. Batcheller, Webster and Chet had been up to the big bay in the afternoon with

no better success than I had the day before. This is the anniversary of my wedding day. How I'd like to be at home for a few hours or have them here to see and enjoy the beautiful scenery I have this day.

July 8, Friday..... Whitney and Hill went with Jimmy over to fish a spring hole about a half a mile below Sampson Lake. Brown and Batcheller accompanied them as far as the lake and fished there till they returned. Sampson is a small lake lying about a half mile south of Whitney and is considered a good lake for trout. Whitney and Hill had no luck but Brown and Batcheller caught a string of fine trout—three of them weighing four pounds. The rest of our party except myself took Burr and went over to fish on Whitney Lake and at night returned with the finest show of trout I have ever seen. Eight of the largest weighed 13-1/8 pounds.

All the party was in the best of spirits and jokes played lively around. Several of the party made a drawing of the largest trout on white birch bark to carry home with them as a souvenir. Chet and I remained around camp all day."

#### FREE & REDUCED LUNCH:

We ask that every family turn in their free and reduced lunch forms regardless of their income. This information is kept confidential and our state and federal funding are based in part on our free and reduced lunch count. If you qualify and do not apply, it actually hurts the district in that many grants require a certain number of free and reduced lunch counts in order for the district to be able to apply for the grant. We have a lot of great things happening and they will continue with or without additional grants or funding however, it is nice to ensure that the free and reduced lunch statistics are accurate which can only happen if everyone turns in their form so everyone eligible can receive this benefit.

#### SCHOOL TAXES:

This year, I sent a letter out to all Edinburg Residents stating that NBT would no longer be collecting taxes for school districts, due to size of the branch and manpower needed for the tax collection. We moved to NBT last year after a conversation with the State Comptroller's Office where they advised us that we needed to make some changes to our current process for tax collecting. Sadly this year, your only option was to mail-in your check or money order to our tax collector, Meaghan Cherry. We offered to e-mail a receipt to anyone that requested one. We did



ask for a self-addressed stamped envelope for a hard copy receipt. We continue to evaluate tax collecting each year and the board and I want to assure you that if you request a receipt you will receive one irregardless of a stamped envelope. We apologize for any inconvenience to our residents. Although paying taxes in person is a past practice, we do want our residents to know that the Superintendent and staff are sincerely interested in meeting and talking with all residents with or without school children. If you are interested at any time of the year please call 518-863-8412 to set up an appointment. Board meetings are also posted on our sign outside, our web page and in the Times Union. 

personally. It was the love, support and prayers that we received from so many of you that helped us get through this traumatic time. I cannot tell you how much your words of encouragement meant to us. We turned our concerns over to God and by his grace we were blessed. While our neighborhood sustained little damage, many people lost everything. We were fortunate, via the grape vine, we heard that our houses were still standing on Sunday night. On Tuesday morning we were able to see satellite pictures of the Keys posted by NOAA that were taken the day after the storm. We were able to pinpoint our house and see our car and our boat. Every little piece of positive information was met with a sigh of relief. It was six days before our neighbors were able to contact us and send pictures. Power was being restored, water was available on a limited basis and the sewer plant was working. We were luckier than our friends farther up the Keys. Most of them did not find out about their homes until late last week. They are now just returning to see what devastation Irma caused. We have seen pictures of cars filled with sea weed, roofs blown off, fences down, trees down, houses flattened and destroyed and vehicles and houses that burned up. These were not random pictures of homes that belonged to strangers. These were pictures of homes owned by friends. Two days ago we found out about damage that occurred two blocks away from our house. I read about it in an article from the Washington Post. The article was about the many people that have lived their lives in the Keys. They had weathered many hurricanes over the vears. These people had stories of loss and grief and tears ran down my face, as I read them. They were sad but they did not really complain. They reached out and helped each other in any way they could. The story was about every day people who are resilient with a lot of Key West pride. They are strong individuals and firmly believe that what they had will be made better than ever, over time. The motto of Key West is AOne Human Family@. Everyone is important. Everyone is here for each other. By ourselves we can accomplish a little but as a group we can accomplish anything. These people are Key West Strong. In this time of sadness and sorrow a community has come together to heal and rebuild.

Do not sensationalize or provide false news. It scares everyone and whips people into a frenzy. We all did the best we could to batten down the hatches on our homes. There were no guarantees and we had no idea if our houses would still be standing

Neither of us realized how many friends (including many lake friends) we actually had in Florida. Everyone just wanted to make sure that their friends were safe.
