

Seasonal Homes and Visitors on the Sacandaga

As the Sacandaga Reservoir (now Great Sacandaga Lake) project progressed in the 1920's many Valley families packed their belongings and left town, knowing their home property would be underwater by 1930.

Many families moved to near-by towns or cities but their hearts were still in the Valley. Eventually some bought property near the shore lines of the new reservoir and in time would build a small camp on this property so they might at least bring their families here for a short time in the summer.

They would often drive up just for the day and fish.

Shortly after the gates closed on the Conklingville Dam in 1930 several reservoir shore-line property owners were making plans to make money by establishing camp grounds and boat rental sites to attract out-of-towners.

The Lewis Frasier family of Edinburg was one of those families. Lew, his wife, Bessie, son Gordon and 3 daughters Marjorie, Geneive and Charlene lived on a large farm on Sinclaire Road. The farm which included much acreage ran all the way east to the reservoir and north to the new road from the 4-corners to the new Batchellerville Bridge. Locals still call this road "bridge hill". On the right, a short distance up from the bridge Lew built three cabins which were rented out on three lots that were for sale—front lots sold for \$500. each.

A tenting area was also established with each site having a fireplace and tables. There were also 20 plus flat bottomed row boats- built by Lew- for rent on the beach.

Today as one approaches the bridge from the Edinburg side and looks to the right you can see 3 camps quite close together. These were the 3 tenting lots that Lew Frasier set up in 1930.

One of the Frasier daughters, Marjorie, purchased one of the cabin lots and had Edinburg blacksmith/carpenter, LeGrande Dimick build a cabin on the lot. Marjorie owned the cabin until she married Willard Hopkins in 1939. At this time she sold the property for enough money to purchase their home on Mechanic Street in Northville.

Lew and Bessie built a store with a small dining

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area attached in which they sold soda, hot dogs, sandwiches, salads and Dake's ice cream which was the forerunner of today's Stewart's ice cream.

The Frasier family remembered an out-oftown family with a black maid that would stop at their store. This family would not allow the maid to accompany them into the dining area of the store. Mrs. Frasier would quietly take the maid to the small back porch of the store, make her comfortable and serve her lunch.

Sad to say Lew's wife, Bessie, passed away of a heart attack while working in the store in August 1940 at the age of 53.

One wonders how many of the visitors to the Frasier's store might have become seasonal residents.

One also wonders how many seasonal residents eventually became year-round residents.

One of the very earliest Edinburg year-round families that became seasonal and still own their property on the Reservoir are the Bennett and Eisenberg families on South Shore Road north of Batchellerville on property long known as the HATETOQUITIT camp.

I had the privilege of meeting the current members and property owners of this family, Carol Guptill Eisenberg and her sister Susan Guptill Bennett (the Guptill family was from the Albany area) a few years ago when they came to my office with their spouses. They graciously shared old photos and other information on the HATETOQUITIT camps. Two years ago the Eisenberg family gave the historian's office a wonderfully put-together history, including maps, photos etc. of the property which I truly appreciated.

Henry Miller Torrey (1800-1874) and his wife,



Jane Beecher (1803-1888) came from Vermont to the Sacandaga area in 1827. They settled in the Gordon district of town north of Batchellerville. Henry M. became involved in town politics, being Justice of the Peace in 1840 and Edinburg Town Supervisor in 1847.

Henry was apparently wealthy enough that he purchased several parcels of land in Edinburg. In 1849 Henry M. paid John Fay \$950. for the property that would become the site of their new farm and many years later the HATETOQUITIT camp. John Fay was a very prominent businessman in the Fayville/Fish House area.

Henry M. and Jane Torrey were the great, great grandparents of Carol Eisenberg and Susan Bennett. The property has descended down through the family by way of Jane Beecher Torrey to Emily Jane Torrey to Mary Torrey Mason to Emily Mason Guptill to Mason Hoyt Guptill to Carol Guptill Eisenberg and Susan Guptill Bennett. Strong women, indeed!

The old Torrey farm became a camp at about the time of Sacandaga Reservoir creation. The Eisenbergs built a new HATETOQUITIT camp in 1984 on the lakeside of South Shore Road, selling the original camp. In 2020 Susan and Keith Bennett started a new camp on their part of the old Torrey property, completing it in 2022.

May this family continue to call HATETOQUITIT and the Great Sacandaga seasonally home for many years to come.

1830-1880 Timber

Eliphaz Day, our 1st timber baron, logged the river flats for white pine, and rafted it to New York City via the Sacandaga and Hudson Rivers. It is reported that he had the logging rights to 20,000 acres of timber.

The timber industry had 3 markets: raw timber, tanning, and wood products manufacture.

Soft logs like pine, cedar, spruce, and hemlock were felled year round. In the winter, they were skidded to the side of a creek or the river, and staged to await the spring floods when they were floated to mills everywhere from Luzerne to New York City.

Hemlock was attractive as its bark was used in leather tanning. Hemlocks were felled in spring, and peeled. The bark was shipped to tanneries in Day, and elsewhere. The hemlock logs were then cut to market size, staged, and floated the next spring.


Before about 1850, hard woods like maple, oak, cherry, and chestnut were trash. They didn't float, so there was no easy way to get them to mills.

They weren't harvested unless the land was to be used for farm land. In that case, they were either used locally, or burned. Logging projects could take several years to complete. Logging camps had a large shanty to house the workers, a barn for the teams, and a blacksmith shop. The crews included choppers who felled the trees, and cut them to market size. Hemlocks required trimmers, ringers, splitters, and spudders for harvesting bark. Skidders got the logs to the river. River drovers took the logs "the final mile." Some of these men were local, but many were transients who moved from job to job.








Mayfield Historical Society Program on The Great Sacandaga Lake Museum/ Interpretive Center

Yikes, that meant I had to holding my breath run back in and unplug the refrigerator. Fortunately I have a small cottage type home. As they say, it pays to really read the directions.



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Flower Talk

"He loves me, he loves me not", (a cliché originating in the Victorian era). The Daisy, with around 4000 species varying in size, shape and color, can be found on all continents except Antarctica. It Belongs to the Asteraceae family which includes asters, ragweed and sunflowers and is biennial which means that its life cycle ends after two years. The Anglo Saxon word "Daes Eage" which means "Day's Eyes" gave Daisy its name because the flower opens at dawn and closes at night.

Although I refer to the Daisy as 'a' flower', it's actually two types of flowers in one. Each type makes numerous flowers known as Florets. The petals form one type, the Ray Floret. Yes, each petal is a flower. The Disc Floret is the center and consists of tiny petals, each one small flowers. Together it gives the appearance of a single flower. The Daisy represents true love so well, for the 'two become one'.

The most popular types of daisies are Marguerite, Shasta, Gerber and English daisies. The English Daisy is found in every American Lawn and is considered a serious weed, a welcome weed in my yard. The Gerber or Gerbera Jamesonii is named after Robert Jameson who discovered them in 1878 and are native to South Africa. The Shasta daisy was created by American horticulturist Luther Burbank in 1901. After years of painstaking effort, he introduced the 'perfect white daisy' with a yellow center. Since then there have been more than 100 varieties of the Shasta daisy.

Drawings of daisies have been discovered in stone carvings dating back to 3,000 BC. In ancient Egypt, daisies were grown along with other flowers for aesthetic and medicinal uses. In Rome, daisy oils (juice) were extracted for use as an astringent and to soak bandages to improve healing.

In Norse mythology daisies are the symbol for the goddess of love, Freya. Christians have historically viewed the flower as a representation of the innocence of the Virgin Mary. In some Renaissance paintings, the flower replaced the traditionally used lily to symbolize Christ and was considered more virtuous and simple than the glamorous lily.



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In the Middle Ages soldiers took an oath to their Mater that ensured their life long service, known as the Oath of Fealty (fidelity). The daisy was used as a symbol of that fidelity. Henry VIII, although athletic in his younger years, used daisies in his older years to treat stomach pain and the effects of gout.

Today, the daisy is still used in homeopathy to accelerate healing after surgical procedures. It's also used to alleviate back aches, which is why it is known as the gardener's friend. Used in teas, Daisies relieve cough, improve digestion and slow bleeding. It is also rich in vitamin C. With its pleasant taste it can be used as a part of salads, soups and sandwiches. Both the flower and leaves are edible (only consume flowers grown without pesticide). You may want to think twice before ridding your yard of daisies



A tradition of making daisy chains started thousands of years ago. They are mentioned in the Bible and in many historical works of poetry and fiction (i.e. Alice in Wonderland). They are made by tying the end of one stem near the bloom of another and continuing until a garland, crown or bracelet is complete.

The word "Daisy" also

became a slang word for something of excellent quality, as shown in books printed in the early 1800s. Over the generations, "that's a daisy" became changed to "that's a doozy

It's good to know that there are no negative meanings attached to the Daisy. It is said to be the perfect symbol of innocence and purity, an elegant silence to confess love.

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NY State has passed a new law to try to prevent the spread of invasive species among the lakes in the Adirondack Park.

The rule applies not only within the Adirondack Park but also within 10 miles of the "Blue Line", which I presume to the be Adirondack Park boundary.

All watercraft will have to have a certificate attesting that the boat, boat bilges and trailer (if applicable) are cleaned, drained and dry before entering the lake. There are two ways a certificate can be obtained.

1. Take your watercraft, on a trailer, to a launch that has a Lake Steward and have the boat inspected by one of the Lake Stewards. They

should be able to issue a certificate that is to be carried on the boat. If needed they will send you to a cleaning station to clean your boat.

2. Go on line and download the form at:

https://www.dec.ny.gov/ docs/lands/ forests pdf/ selfissuedcertificate1.pdf

The GSLA hopes that anybody who downloads the form will actually be certain their equipment has been cleaned, drained and dried.

As always there are exceptions to the certificate requirement. A canoe or kayak must be cleaned drained and dried when it enters Adirondack waters, but does NOT need to carry a certificate on board. So, when somebody tells you that canoes and kayaks are exempt, they are only exempt from the requirement to carry a certificate. If your watercraft is hauled during the year for service, you don't need a new inspection when it reenters the water, just keep the original certificate on the boat.

If you travel to or from other waters, your boat, bilges and trailer should be clean, drained and dry before you enter any other lake, or when returning from any other lake.

The Great Sacandaga Lake Association and its members support the DEC's efforts curb the spread of invasive species. To my knowledge, no invasive species has ever been eradicated so preventing the spread is key.

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





The August Night Sky

The Perseids are prolific meteor showers associated with the comet Swift–Tuttle. The point they appear to come from (called the radiant) is in the constellation Perseus.

The shower is visible from mid-July each year, with the peak in activity between 9 and 14 August, depending on the particular location of the stream. During the peak, the rate of meteors reaches 60 or more per hour. They can be seen all across the sky; however, because of the shower's radiant in the constellation of Perseus, the Perseids are primarily visible in the Northern Hemisphere.[8] As with many meteor showers the visible rate is greatest in the pre-dawn hours, since more meteoroids are scooped up by the side of the Earth moving forward into the stream, corresponding to local times between midnight and noon. While many meteors

arrive between dawn and noon, they are usually not visible due to daylight. Some can also be seen before midnight, often grazing the Earth's atmosphere to produce long bright trails and sometimes fireballs.


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There is nothing more important in a lake than water quality! No argument, no discussion and hopefully, great water.

In the middle of July, two emails hit my inbox. The first email was from Ed Ludlum who is the President of the Great Sacandaga Lake Association (GSLA) and the second was from David Smail who is the Co-chair of the Property Owners Association of Day and also Vice-President of the Great Sacandaga Lake Association. (In full disclosure, both are great friends and shared the GSLA Board when I was GSLA President!)

Our topic for today will focus on the way Ed and David are 'co-writing' this article through their inspiration!


Message to the Great Sacandaga Lake Association Members Concerning Invasive Species

Ed Ludlum's message to GSLA members announced that 'NY State has passed a new law to try to prevent the spread of invasive species among the lakes in the Adirondack Park.' In his comment to the members, he states that the new law is in effect for the Adirondack Park and also within '10 miles of the "Blue Line" ..." He indicates that all '... watercraft will have to have a certificate attesting that the boat, boat bilges and trailer (if applicable) are cleaned, drained and dry before entering the lake.' According to the mailing, vessels may be inspected by a Lake Steward or the owner may self-sign for the inspection.

Let's take a little closer look at the new Aquatic Invasive Species Requirements for Motorized Boats in Adirondack Waters which went into effect on June 8, 2022. The bottom line according to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is that the '... new law requires all operators of motorized watercraft to obtain certification that they have cleaned, drained, and dried boats and equipment each time they launch into a new waterbody in the Adirondack Park and within 10 miles of the Blue Line. When an aquatic invasive species inspection station adjacent to the public waterbody is open for operation, watercraft operators can receive a watercraft inspection certificate from a boat steward by accepting a free boat inspection or decontamination. Alternately, boaters may follow Clean, Drain, Dry steps on their own and fill out a self-issued certificate available on DEC's website before launching.' In brief summary, a boat steward can inspect your motor boat and issue a watercraft inspection certificate or you may inspect your own boat!

Paul Smith's College has been our contact for years. We thought that the best way to provide accurate information on the entire process was to share information from Paul Smith's College Adirondack Watershed Institute. They provide

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access to DEC materials, a video on the process and also short written answers to a multitude of questions including the frequency of boat washing, use of a boat in the same lake and applicability to self-powered vessels. Message to the Property Owners Association of Day Members Concerning Lake Pollution

David Smail provided an article to the Property Owners Association of Day members written by Ed Connors in which Ed wrote extensively that he believes that '... most people using the lake have no idea that they are polluting the lake ...' He offers insightful comments on the problems and solutions for homeowners, gardeners, boaters and fishermen. He cites problems with cleaning products, medications, lawn fertilizers, commercial pesticides and winter road salt. Among his boating targets are trailer axle grease, road dirt and truck wax as well as '2-stroke oil, the suntan lotion is getting washed off the swimmers, and what was that that just flew off the boat?' He notes that the 'act of fishing' can also cause pollution from lead weights and fishing line! He suggests 'Discard lead weights and opt for weights made from stone and biodegradable materials.'

The article is an eye opener and a cause for attention. It presents a great series of recommendations on how to safeguard the future of the lake! To quote Ed Connors, '... most people using the lake have no idea that they are polluting the lake ...'

Great Sacandaga Lake Association (GSLA) Lake Coliform Monitoring 2022 First Interim Report While we are talking about polluting the lake, don't you ever wonder what 'polluting the lake' means? Did you wonder if anyone has their eyes on the water quality of the Great Sacandaga Lake? Well, the GSLA has been doing that for years! Just a flash notice, the lake is doing well and the GSLA has had their eyes on the water for quite some time!

GSLA Vice-President provided a copy of the Great Sacandaga Lake Coliform Monitoring Program - 2022 First Interim Report. David prepared the report on Coliform sampling which was started by the Association in 1991. Previous sampling had been conducted by the Darrin Fresh Water Institute in Bolton Landing. The sampling and analysis for this report were conducted by the Capital Region Environmental Laboratory in Rensselaer. The report which is the first of two conducted during the summer samples Fecal Coliform and E. coli. 'Public bathing beaches, recreational areas and feeder streams were the primary focus. Sixteen shoreline locations were sampled in July. Additional samples are scheduled to be taken in August.'

The report notes that the NYS Department of Health has determined the 'maximum allowable bacterial levels for contact recreation (swimming, wading, etc.). When samples on beaches exceed allowable levels the New York State Health Department is notified. The Department of Health is empowered to close the location to bathing until the problem or problems are corrected.'

The sites for the first 2022 sampling included: the Towns of Day, Edinburg, Northampton, Mayfield, Broadalbin and Providence. Only one site exceeded the allowable Coliform Bacteria Standards on one day but when resampled on the following day were substantially below the Standard! It was presumed that 'there were many bass feeding on a school of minnows. The stirring up of the water may have



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contributed to the high concentrations of coliform.'

Great report results and great commitment by the GSLA for the commitment to the Coliform Monitoring Program!

A New and Improved Look to NYS Information on Boating

NYS Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation digital information has a new look that I hadn't seen before. Of course, it is summer and there are more things to do outside, so that could be the reason I missed the changes!

The Office has changed their information pages by providing easy access and picture-friendly posters to: Boating Education, Registrations, Motorized Boats, Personal Watercraft, Non-Motorized Boats, Law Enforcement, Commercial Vessels, Forms and Contacts. Boating Certificate

New York State has been slowly phasing in a requirement for everyone to complete the New York State Safe Boating Course in order to legally operate a boat on New York State waters. Individuals who were born after January 1, 1988 (34 years of age) must currently hold a valid New York State Boating Certificate. The requirement is crafted to require a certificate for everyone in 2025. See: https://parks.ny.gov/recreation/boating/ education.aspx

Catch you next month. Be SAFE in the Spring, Summer, Fall and Winter!

Peter M. Byron who holds a New York State Public Vessel license has taught NYS Boater Safety Classes and USCG courses on the Great Sacandaga and in the Capital District for many years.

New regulations on topics such as **Fire Extinguishers** are available under Motorized Boats as well as standard poster information on Required Safety Equipment and Carbon Monoxide Poisoning. The Personal Watercraft tab introduces boaters to new varieties of boats such as the personal submarines, Jetovators and Flyboards. The Law Enforcement tab includes an Alcohol **Consumption Chart** for different body weight groups as well as examples of **Reckless** Operation. Take a look and enjoy!



Sandy Hill Arts Exhibit



Searching for Answers

These days it seems that we are bombarded by individuals proclaiming they have the answer to our problems. Complicating matters even more as we struggle to decide whose answers to accept is the vilification of those who have a different answer. Others are not only wrong, but they are also the enemy and cause of all of our problems. In this war of conflicting answers, it seems as if nothing gets solved.

I believe that in the stories of people of faith there is a series of principles that can help us as we seek to find solutions to our problems. First and foremost, I believe that God created a world that at its core is a balanced structure. I believe that many of today's problems are a result of our disturbing that balance. Efforts to preserve animal species and specific ecological structures such as wetlands help us preserve that delicate balance of this world God has entrusted to our care.

A second related principle is that we human beings are intended to be partners not competitors. In the Christian faith we have the story of the event that happened at the Jewish festival of Pentecost when individuals from a multitude of nations heard followers of Jesus speaking to them in their native language, languages foreign to these former fishermen. God was through this miraculous event calling upon us to break down barriers that separate us. Later the Apostle Paul would proclaim that each of us have been endowed by our Creator with the ability to make a positive contribution to the community.

As Christianity began to reach out to those beyond the Hebrew community within which it was born; they became a question of whether those desiring to be part of this movement needed to convert and adopt the laws and tradition of Judaism. The ultimate answer was that the teaching of Jesus was not tied to the culture of the Hebrew people. It was permissible for the teachings of Jesus to be adapted to another culture. Like the Christian movement we need to be willing to adapt to new and different ways of applying core values. We need to ask ourselves whether our ideas and laws are based on foundational principles that help preserve the intricate balance of our world and speak of a true desire to embrace the foundational principle of not just Christianity but all world religions that we called to love God and love one another.






