



2018 DATE CHANGES FOR REFUSE AND RECYCLING COLLECTION

The Garbage Collection will be on Tuesday (North Shore) and Wednesday (South Shore) the following weeks due to Monday holidays.

February 19th Presidents Day

May 28th Memorial Day

September 3rd Labor Day

October 8th Columbus Day

November 12th Veterans Day

There will be no Recycling Collection on November 22nd, Thanksgiving Day and the Recycling Center will be closed on Friday November 23rd.

The year Christmas is on Tuesday December 25th and New Years on Tuesday January 1, 2019. Those weeks Garbage will be collected on Wednesday (North Shore) and Thursday (South Shore) and Recycling will be collected on Friday.

Clean Energy Communities Program

The town has been participating in a Clean Energy Communities Program sponsored through NYSERDA and administered by the Capital District Regional Planning Commission. We have adopted a uniform solar building permit application, which the state has promoted, so that solar companies may use the same application form from town to town. We have upgraded our lighting to energy efficient lights and that cost is partially paid by National Grid. Our Building Inspector, Matt Ginter is completing a course on the NYS Energy code and we recently agreed to post our electric usage on a site that can be accessed for comparison purposes. When these 4 items are complete we will be designated a Clean Energy Community and eligible for a \$50,000.00 grant for additional efficiency measures, such as solar panels or an electric or hybrid vehicle and charging station.

FEMA Reimbursement from Super Storm Stella

The town has applied for federal funds to help pay for costs incurred during Super Storm Stella in March of 2017. The paperwork has been completed and submitted. The estimated reimbursement will be \$8242.10.

Bridge NY Second Grant Applications

The second opportunity to apply for funding through Bridge NY should become available shortly. The town applied for funding last year for replacement of the bridge over Sand Creek on Military Road and the bridge over Little Hans Creek on Fox Hill Road.



Each replacement was estimated at \$800,000.00. Unfortunately, our applications were not successful. The applications were reviewed by the state and we received some suggestions on how to improve our submittal. We will be applying again this year for funding.

REMINDERS:

STAR and Enhanced STAR

Any homeowner who has not signed up for the STAR program to receive a reduction in their home's assessment and a reduced school tax bill should do so before the end of February. You do not have to sign up annually for regular STAR. Seniors who are eligible for Enhanced STAR will receive a larger assessment reduction but MUST sign up each year before the end of February. If you are signing up for the first time you must apply directly to New York State. The town assessor's office can give you the information on how to apply.

Harnessing Nature: Building Great Sacandaga

The DVD "Harnessing Nature" has been selling out and additional copies have been ordered and received. They are available at a variety of places around the lake for \$20.00 per copy. The Edinburg Historian has copies available at the Town Hall being sold by the Edinburg Historical Society.

Sacandaga Protection Committee

2017 was a great year for the lake and the SPC. The SPC continues to be successful in recommending board members for the HRBRRD, and can report

there are now three permit holders on their board. The SPC continues to vet potential board members, and encourages the Governor's office to make appointments of qualified individuals to fill all the vacant and expired board seats so the HRBRRD can do their work.

We are happy to report the legal issues facing the lake are quiet, but we are keeping our lobbyist

We're also continuing to monitor the HRBRRD assessments for the Hudson River and Black River areas, and the proposed law to eliminate the HRBRRD and put the operation of the lake and permit system under the control of the NYS Power Authority. This legislation has been dormant in the Assembly, but we know it could be brought out of committee at any time. We need to stay vigilant. You should consider the SPC as your personal "watch dog" whose primary purpose is to alert you to potential problems and actions that could cause you and your family great personal dissatisfaction if improper legislation and/or rules are passed not taking your interests into consideration.

Our constant challenge is funding our organization, and fund raising is hard work. It takes the effort of everyone on the board, plus a dedicated group of volunteers to pull it off each year. This year we had our 2nd successful raffle, and continued our traditional summer event and our autumn Red Neck event at Sport Island Pub.

We rely 100% on the generosity of the permit holders, along with other lake users and community members. We have no paid staff, and the money we raise is used to keep our lobbyist, Bolton-St. John, on contract, and to pay our attorneys at Hodgson Russ for work they perform, administration and bookkeeping, and fund raising.

This year we're asking again not only for your financial support, but to reach out to your friends and neighbors and invite them to make a donation,

The Library's award winning Local History

& Genealogy Project continues to develop and is now in its 13th year. Parts of the project can be found on the library's website under the tab "Library Activities – Genealogy".

The main part of the project has been the establishment of "Sacandaga Families", a genealogical research tool that creates family trees for

those that have lived around the Sacandaga Valley from the 1700's forward, including the Towns of Northampton, Hope, Benson, Wells, Edinburg, Day, Providence, Mayfield, and Broadalbin. The database has nearly 35,000 names and is synced to Ancestry.com, allowing it to be viewed all over the world. This is an ongoing project.

The Sacandaga Book Group will meet on Tuesday, Feb 13 at 10 am in the library's program room. Terry Frank will lead a discussion of "Road to Character" by David Brooks. Looking to some of the world's greatest thinkers and inspiring leaders, Brooks explores how, through internal struggle and a sense of their own limitations, they have built a strong inner character. He challenges the readers to rebalance their core virtues: kindness, bravery, honesty, or faithfulness.

"Story Time" will be held on Sat, Feb 10 at 10 am, coordinated by Hadley Jacobs. Bring your pre-school children for stories, snack, and craft.


to Rotarians this year as part of our annual theme.

State's Reservoirs Prevent Major Hudson River Flooding

Great Sacandaga Lake and Indian Lake
Reservoir Reduce Peak Hudson River Flow by 74%
The Great Sacandaga Lake and Indian Lake
Reservoir provided 1.93 billion cubic feet of water
storage on January 13, preventing the Hudson River
from reaching flood stage from the Town of Hadley
to Fort Edward. The State's two Hudson River
regulating reservoirs stored more than 14.37 billion
gallons of runoff on Saturday, reducing the peak
Hudson River flow by approximately 26,100 cubic
feet per second (cfs) Saturdaymorning.

Last week's rainfall and runoff from melting snow caused the Hudson River to reach a peak flow of about 9,500 cfs at Hadley and 13,000 cfs at Fort Edward on Saturday morning, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. The storage capacity of the Great Sacandaga Lake and Indian Lake Reservoir prevented the Hudson River at Fort Edward from reaching flood stage.

Without the combined storage capacity of the State's Hudson River regulating reservoirs, Hudson River flow would have peaked at more than 35,000 cfs at Corinth and 39,000 at Fort Edward. The reservoirs prevented the Hudson River from reaching a flood stage of 28.5 feet at Fort Edward, about 0.5 feet below major flood stage, on January 13. Operation of the Great Sacandaga

Lake reduced the height of flood water by more than 4.5 feet, significantly reducing potential flood damage to buildings, roads and bridges in Hadley, Corinth, South Glens Falls, Glens Falls, Hudson Falls, and Fort Edward.

If Great Sacandaga Lake had not been constructed to retain a flood event like that which occurred on Saturday then flooding and inundation of roads in Northumberland, camps in Lake Luzerne, parts of Route 9N and cellars in homes in Corinth, first floors of structures along Old Bend Road in Moreau, and numerous roads and property in the Village of Fort Edward, would have occurred.
















Happenings at Northville School

January's Northville Board of Education meeting featured a presentation by the Math Department highlighting the many beneficial

instructional changes being implemented this year. One of the most significant improvements is the addition of block-style math labs for grades 6 and 7 every other day. The labs give the students "increased opportunities for guided practice, especially for those who need re-teaching or reinforcement," according to teacher Jim Long, who led the presentation during the January 9 BOE meeting.

A 15:1 math skills class led by teacher Katie Bogart and a two-year Algebra track taught by Justin Frederick are two other important changes designed to help "fill in gaps in Algebra skills, teach Regents skills and move at the pace of the individual student," Long added.

The Math Department's innovations have been spurred by the teachers' work with educational consultant Betty Barrett over the course of the last few years. Long said Barrett's expertise and her high expectations for Northville's students and faculty have inspired him and his fellow instructors to increase their own expectations for their students and to "create a more academic atmosphere" in their classes.

Frederick said he is excited to see this year's changes pay off for NCS students next year and beyond. "To see 6th and 7th graders get 1 1/2 years of math in a school year (because of the labs) means much less re-teaching will be needed in the next grade," he said.

The NCS Math teachers assured the BOE and the public that they are continuing to plan for more improvements each year, and are considering adding grade 8 and Algebra math labs as well as working with the elementary to increase students' math skill fluency at an earlier age to help the work of all grades flow together more seamlessly. ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE

Just as our bodies change with age, so do our brains. As we get older, most people tend to notice occasional forgetfulness, a slowed thought process, or a mouth that can't always speak what the mind is thinking. However, serious forgetfulness or confusion with age can be a sign of failing brain cells. These failing brain cells may indicate the onset of Alzheimer's disease.

What is Alzheimer's disease?

According to the Alzheimer's Association. Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia, a general term used to describe a severe decline in mental ability. Due to the severity of decline, those that have the disease cannot maintain their usual day-to-day activities. Alzheimer's is a gradual, progressive disease that worsens over time, and is not a normal part of aging. In the early stages, individuals experience mild memory loss. As the disease progresses, people often lose their memory, their ability to carry on conversations, and their ability to respond to their surrounding environment.

How does Alzheimer's disease affect the brain?

Scientists are still uncertain of the exact cause and process of Alzheimer's disease, however, many believe Alzheimer's affects our brain cells and keeps them from operating correctly. seeing, smelling, and hearing. Alzheimer's disease is believed to cause backups and breakdowns between these cells and their functions, which leads to damage, cell death, and irreversible changes within the brain. As this happens, our brain can no longer perform the tasks it used to.

Who does the disease affect?

Alzheimer's disease is most common in adults over 65, but not everyone who is 65 or older gets Alzheimer's. The Alzheimer's Association states there are currently 200,000 Americans under 65 that have early onset of Alzheimer's disease.

What are the symptoms?

According to the Alzheimer's Association, the symptoms of Alzheimer's disease include:
Difficulty remembering newly learned information
Disorientation, mood and behavior changes
Confusion about events, time and place
Suspicions about others including family members, friends, or co-workers
More serious memory loss
Difficulty speaking, swallowing, or walking
What are the risk factors?

The three main risk factors for Alzheimer's disease include increasing age, family history, and genetics. As we age, we are more likely to have an increased risk of Alzheimer's. Similarly, our family history and our genetics also increase our risk of developing the disease.

How can we prevent Alzheimer's?

Age, family history, and genetics are all risk factors that we cannot control. However, the Alzheimer's Association believes that research has begun to show some risk factors that are influenced by our health.

Brain health may be linked to heart health. Therefore, if you have a disease that affects or damages the heart, you are more likely to also develop Alzheimer's disease. Be sure to visit your doctor regularly, monitor your heart health, and make good lifestyle choices to help prevent the likelihood of onset. Try to avoid alcohol and tobacco, make sure to exercise daily, and eat a nutritious, balanced diet.

There's also a strong link between head injuries & developing Alzheimer's, so it's important to wear a helmet as needed for outdoor activities and always buckle your seatbelt when in a motor vehicle to prevent injury.

While we cannot control everything that happens to us, we can choose to make lifestyle choices that promote our health and well-being, and help decrease our risk for disease.





DID YOU KNOW THAT—

Edinburgh's little hamlet of Beecher Hollow has lost a well-liked, lifetime resident, Fred Brownell who passed away December 24, 2017. Fred was born March 19, 1937 spending most of his 80 years living in the former Edinburg Methodist church parsonage located in the hill just above Barker's store and the Beecher house.

Fred's mom, the former Beulah Conklin was a registered nurse; being a school nurse for the Northville Central School for many years, coming out of retirement to be the nurse for the Edinburg Common School. She was also available to all Edinburg residents that had health questions.

Fred's dad Merrill Brownell-in his younger years- worked for the Town of Edinburg's highway department. In 1945/46 he was working for Brownell Lumber Co. as a carpenter; being one of the carpenters that built the airplane hangar at the Plateau Sky Ranch Airport on Airport road. Although a youngster-Fred remembered his dad building the hangar and

the airport that followed. He also remembered vividly when in May 1946 the B-24 bomber was flown into the airport-never to fly out.

In his teens Fred started moving lawns-not just for his parents-but for the neighbors as well.

Fred's dad also did electrical work especially repairing radios and televisions. This was before the days when our country became a "throw away" society. Fred would accompany his dad on "house calls" to many homes in town to make repairs or just to visit with their many friends. Fred paid sharp attention to the conversations his dad had with friends and associates. This became the source of many of Fred's popular stories that he loved to tell-not only to friendsbut to complete strangers he would meet at the Nellie Tyrrell Museum. They loved them! The storiesremembered decades later- were true but some not always freely broadcast about town.

Fred especially loved farms and farm animals [he kept a flock of chickens in the backyard henhouse for years]. He had a photographic memory and could probably describe every farm building in this town. His Brownell grandparents-Fred and Evelyn- had a dairy farm at Tribes Hill. Fred loved to visit them and his cousins in the Mohawk Valley whenever he had the opportunity. Fred and Evelyn Brownell moved from the Town of Day to the Mohawk Valley in 1917 when word started circulating that the Sacandaga Valley was to be dammed and flooded to make way for the Sacandaga Reservoir.

Fred's memory for detail was unbelievable. One day I was looking for the date of when a house had been torn down in the Hollow. Fred gave me the date right down to the month and day. Fred was the unofficial mayor of Beecher Hollow. He was always up on local and current events. He was a great help to Edinburg's first historian, Nellie Tyrrell, who lived in the brick house across from the Copeland covered bridge. He always lent a helping hand to other neighbors by bringing in their mail or newspapers or keeping an eye on a home



if the owners were away.

For many years Fred belonged to the Beecher Hollow Writers Club where he spent many an enjoyable evening next door at the home of his cousins Carol and Claire Lathers. They were joined by friends and neighbors Kathy and Roger Hoff. Here he freely told and even wrote some of his stories. Carol and Kathy were teachers-thus a great help to Fred.

Possibly helping out Nellie Tyrrell or simply living in the historic church parsonage grew Fred's interest in Edinburg history. When the Edinburg Bicentennial Committee was formed in 1974 Fred and his mom were some of the first people on the list. The two of them helped Nellie Tyrrell tremendously in creating Edinburg's first museum in the old Beecher Hollow school house now named the Nellie Tyrrell Museum. The museum was open to the public on Saturdays and

Sundays during the summer with Beulah and Fred tending every Saturday. Every Saturday but one that is. In late August when the community of Warrensburg had their village-wide garage sale-off would go mother and son to take advantage of the bargains! They also helped clean the museum each year getting it ready for opening. Fred was the window washer.

Fred always attended our monthly historical society meetings and our annual historic days. He was a very special person and thoroughly enjoyed chatting with museum visitors. After his mom's death Fred continued to tend the "Nellie" [as we EHS members call it] each week until just a few years ago when his hearing became so impaired that visiting with people became a hardship. He would usually still appear on our "historic days" to lend a hand to our other museum attendant, Pam Hanke.

As Fred grew older caring family members stepped in to help in whatever way they could. Fred, however

> had a stubborn streak and would not always accept the kindnesses that were offered to him.

Although he had a driver's license Fred always did a great deal of walking. He traversed the entire stretch of Beecher Hollow on foot as well as walking home from church on Sunday. He and his mom were active members of the Edinburg United Methodist Church with Beulah teaching Sunday School for many, many years. Many was the Sunday that Fred would walk on home after church service leaving Beulah with the car and her S.S. class. He walked to the museums and to the community center for EHS meetings. In later years he took daily walks-weather permitting.

Anyone who knew Fred is truly going to miss him. Somehow Edinburg history is never going to be quite the same.


month has a 5th Sunday we have a good ole' fashioned Potluck Supper.



"Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words if necessary." (Sometime, and arguably attributed to St. Francis of Assisi)

What do these have to do with Lent?

The Lenten season begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th and lasts 40 days, not including Sundays. In the Christian tradition, it is a time of prayer, repentance, and sacrifice, marking the time leading up to and culminating in Jesus' crucifixion, death and resurrection. Ash Wednesday reminds us of our mortality, noting that from ashes we came and to ashes we will return. Easter Sunday reminds us of the hope and promise of salvation.

I am not a Pastor, but simply a Christian congregant and church Elder, but I believe that

what happens in between those two Holy days is a 40 day microcosm of our lives. My personal goals for the period of Lent are to pray by doing (including, but not JUST by attending church); to repent, by making good of past faults (including, but not JUST through prayer); and to sacrifice by giving to others in need (including, but not JUST by giving something up).

The Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-12) for me, are a perfect starting place for daily reading during Lent and for transforming those words into tangible deeds whenever possible during those 40 holy days. Perhaps then the habit of doing that will stick with me more fully throughout the year.

I encourage those who seek a deeper spiritual experience this Lenten season to pursue involvement in tangible acts of prayer, repentance and sacrifice as a starting point this year. For, as our unknown Native American author wrote, involvement will lead to understanding. And as St. Francis (perhaps) said, words may be a less effective means of preaching the Word than actions. I believe we need more of both similar thoughts in this Lenten season and throughout the year.







Don't be a wimp! Brave the cold and snow for a great dinner out

Greetings from the Great Sacandaga Lake Fisheries Federation! We hope that everyone has had a chance to get out to enjoy a little ice-fishing at the GSL, and the many surrounding Adirondack lakes that formed good Ice during the past few Months. For us GSL ice-fishing enthusiasts it has been a frustrating, past couple of years having to cancel both our Contests and the Walleye challenges. These events are vital to the economy that surrounds the lake by business created by its participants. This year we assume the ice conditions to be ideal for ice anglers. We hope to see a great turn out this year, good luck to all competitors. As always, we ask that anglers and riders use caution, GSL is notorious for its dangerous ice heaves, and weak areas that are not easily seen to those walking out scouting. Every year it deeply saddens us to hear of Tragedies that claim lives because of this reason. So I know we touch on this every year, and we don't mean to be redundant, but We feel it is imperative, and helpful to include the "Rules of Ice" for safety.

IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT ICE-

New ice is usually stronger than old ice. Four inches of clear, newly formed ice may support one person on foot, while a foot or more of old, partially thawed ice may not.

Ice seldom freezes uniformly. It may be a foot thick in one location and only an inch or two just a few feet away.

Ice formed over flowing water and currents is often dangerous. This is especially true near streams, bridges and culverts. Also, the ice outside river bends is usually weaker due to the undermining effects of the faster current.

The insulating effect of snow slows down the freezing process. The extra weight also reduces how much weight the ice sheet can support. Also, ice near shore can be weaker than ice that is farther out. Booming and cracking ice isn't necessarily dangerous. It only means that the ice is expanding and contracting as the temperature changes.

FOR SNOWMOBILERS-

Schools of fish or flocks of waterfowl can also adversely affect the relative safety of ice. The

movement of fish can bring warm water up from the bottom of the lake. In the past, this has opened holes in the ice causing snowmobiles and cars to break through. Don't "overdrive" your snowmobile's headlight. At even 30 miles per hour, it can take a much longer distance to stop on ice than your headlight shines. Many fatal snowmobile through-ice accidents occur because the machine was traveling too fast for the operator to stop when the headlamp illuminated the hole in the ice.

Wear a life vest under your winter gear. Or wear one of the new flotation snowmobile suits. And it's a good idea to carry a pair of ice picks that may be homemade or purchased from most well stocked sporting goods stores that cater to winter anglers. It's amazing how difficult it can be to pull yourself back onto the surface of unbroken but wet and slippery ice while wearing a snowmobile suit weighted down with 60 lbs of water. The ice picks really help pulling yourself back onto solid ice. Caution: Do not wear a flotation device when traveling across the ice in an enclosed vehicle.


