



Military Road Culvert/Bridge Replacement

The large culvert/bridge carrying Military Road over Sand Creek it has been closed by NYS DOT to begin the replacement of the bridge. This project is being done with funding from the BridgeNY program. The replacement is expected to be

completed by approximately July 15, 2022. During the closure traffic will be directed to a signed detour route from Shields Road to North Shore Road to Snow Road and back to Military Road.

THE HARRINGTONS OF COUNTY CORK – COPPER MINERS TO MONUMENT BUILDERS

The Edinburg Historical Society's first meeting of the year will be held on Tuesday, May 17 at 7 p.m. at the Sand Hill One-room Schoolhouse on Tange Road. EHS members and snowbirds back from their winter homes are anxious to end the two-year hiatus due to Covid and renew acquaintances.

Jodi Boyd will be speaking on "The Harringtons of County Cork- Copper Miners to Monument Builders". Jodi is a retired high school English teacher who has been researching her family history since about 1990. Her mother was a Harrington and her family settled in Saratoga Springs in the early 1850s. They used their connections with the Vermont marble industry to establish generations of Harringtons who worked in the marble and granite business, supplying homes and hotels as well as creating monuments for cemeteries and historic memorials. Coffee and baked goods will follow.

Northville Rotary Grows "Service Above Self"

The Northville Rotary is proud to introduce the two Featured Artists who will be at our Woodworking and Fine Arts Show July 15-17. Diane Castle Babcock creates intricate and realistic landscapes from linoleum lock prints. Neil Pedersen designs and produces one of a kind art pieces from wood and steel.

Diane has created linoleum block prints for more than 40 years. She is a native of Spencerport, NY and studied printmaking at Nazareth College where she received a B.S in Studio Art and certification in Art Education. She earned her Masters from Binghamton University. Recently she moved back to the Rochester area, but makes frequent trips to the Adirondacks. She combines her love of the outdoors and craft to create beautiful impressionistic landscapes. Her images are based on her experiences in parks and trails near her previous home in Boonville, NY and images of the Finger Lakes of NYS.

"I choose to work from nature because I walk daily with my dog Lilly, and my friends. I find

that this is often the most enjoyable part of my day. While being outdoors I have come to experience peace with myself and harmony with creation. My goal is





to create work that is constantly moving, changing, and growing – just as nature evolves. I invite the viewer to come into the landscape and be part of the experience."

Diane begins each print with a drawing from nature. The drawing is transferred onto battleship linoleum. Using a variety of v-shaped gouges, she carves into the linoleum to create the image. She then inks the raised or uncut area of the block and hand presses it onto Japanese rice paper. Each color is carved and printed separately. Using a variety of cutting and printing techniques, nuances of texture, light and depth are created.

In the past, she has owned her own picture framing business and worked in galleries and museums including the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, DC. Her work has been exhibited in galleries and arts festivals in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York. She has received awards at many outdoor festivals, including the Cornhill Arts Festival, Clothesline Festival and Colorscape Chenango. Diane worked as a visiting artist affiliated with Young Audiences of Rochester and taught art at the Adirondack High School in Booneville. She was a Roycroft Artisan from 2010 to 2014, and is currently a member of the Roycroft Arts and Craftsmens' Guild in East Aurora.

Next month we will highlight our second Featured Artist Neil Pedersen. Come visit them this July at our Woodworking and Fine Arts Weekend – Friday, July 15 5-8:00, Saturday 9-4:00 and Sunday 10-3:00. There will be over 50 other varied artists, raffles, Silent Auction and food from a number of vendors. Proceeds from this event will be used by the Northville Rotary throughout the year to provide scholarships to students, support community organizations, and projects of Rotary International.

Members Lost

In the short time frame of August 30, 2021 to January 25, 2022 the Edinburg Historical Society lost two more dedicated members.

Cheryl McCleery passed away August 30, 2021. She was born April 17, 1949 in Rochester, Pennsylvania, the oldest daughter of Robert Jr. and Dorothy Symons who are still living in Aliquippa, PA.

I had the privilege of meeting this lovely couple in 2019 at Cheryl and George's 50th wedding anniversary celebration.

Cheryl graduated high school in PA. in 1967 and the Adirondack Bible College on Fox Hill Road in 1970. She married fellow classmate George McCleery on August 9, 1969.

After serving two other churches in Pennsylvania and New York State Cheryl and George returned to the Edinburg Evangelical Wesleyan Church and the Adirondack Bible College on Fox Hill Road.

Her duties at the college included being a buyer for the kitchen, a cook, part-time instructor, dean of women plus the home schooling of their three daughters, Carol, Laura and Mary.

After the college permanently closed the McCleery's had a little more time on their hands and joined the Edinburg Historical Society in or about 2009. What a plus for our society!

Whenever we had an event they were there to lend a hand wherever needed. Whatever job she started Cheryl stayed with it to the end.

She became known as our "pie lady", making delicious pies for all of our food sales. I don't mean one or two pies-I mean ten or twelve or more! Customers would be waiting in line the day of the sale for her arrival with pies.

Cheryl was a gentle soul, fun to visit with and steadfast in her beliefs.

She is greatly missed!

John Ordyk of Broadalbin, formerly of Edinburg, passed away January 25, 2022. He was born in Amsterdam July 14, 1945 to the late Marjan and Mary Supinski Ordyk, graduating from Broadalbin High School in 1963. He also attended Clarkson University.

John was an expert machinist at one time owning his own business in Gloversville reconditioning machinery for area businesses.



The early settlers - an origin story.

David Johnson, a Revolutionary War vet, was living in Salisbury, Vermont. In 1796 or 1797, he and his family decided to return to the "Genesee Country" where he had served during the war. They loaded up the sled with their belongings and started off, perhaps following part of the "Tory Rock" trail. When they arrived in what is now Day, the snow melted, stranding them. They decided to stay, and after a failed real estate deal on land closer to Day Center, he purchased 300 acres not far from where the dam at Conklingville is today.

While David Johnson may very well have been the 1st permanent resident, he was 1st in a steady stream of new residents. Family names like Huxley, Grove, and Hayden appear, as do the names Jonas Bond and Phineas Austin. – Revolutionary War vets.

1799 David "Indian" Hines and Nicholas Flansburgh. The Bradford's, from Galway, Ireland, build a place that served as a tavern and inn. Samuel Rogers arrives in Day Center.

1801 Henry Paul arrives and builds a grist/saw mill on what is now the creek named after him.

1802 David Allen, and his wife, Amey, buy a 100 acre farm. They came from Providence, RI. via Providence, NY. Descendants of David and Amey qualify for membership in The Sons & Daughters of the Mayflower, and of the American Revolution. Mathew Flansburg arrives in Day Center, and Philp Fraker, another Rev War vet, appears.

1804 Wm. Woolley appears. Thomas Yates, comes from Birmingham, England via Schenectady. He was a brass metallurgist, and educated enough to teach school in Day – our 1st teacher.

1805 Eliphaz Day arrives in 1805. Day bought or leased large tracts of timber land – one report says 20,000 acres. Peter Van Vleck comes to Day Centre.

1815 David Copeland arrives in Day.

1817 Walter, George, and Ziba Hunt come to West Day. George builds a store. Amos, his son, starts Hunt's Tavern. In 1835 West Day becomes known as "Huntsville."

1822. Luke, Willard, Daniel, Ranselier, and Polly Kathan.

1830 - The population of Day is 758.

Tuesday, May 17 is voting day for the Northville Public Library. The library's Board of Trustees has worked to develop a responsible budget with the least impact on our local taxpayers. The 2022-2023 budget will have no increase in the tax levy. This

is the fifth year with no increase. Voting on one Trustee seat will be held.

For the year July 2020 - June 2021(still under Covid mandates), the library saw nearly 11,000 visitors, using 17,588 items, including digital resources as well.

The library's computers and wireless network were accessed nearly 2,400 times, and the library handled about 6,300 transfers, sharing items between area libraries. 27 programs were held with 412 participants.

The Sacandaga Book Club will meet on Tuesday, May 10 at 10 am in the library's program room. Jane Borrelli will lead a discussion of "The Disappearing Earth" by Julia Phillips. On the Kamchatka peninsula at the northeastern edge of Russia, two girls go missing. In the ensuing weeks, then months, the police investigation turns up nothing. We are transported to vistas of rugged beauty--densely wooded forests, open expanses of tundra, soaring volcanoes, and the glassy seas that border Japan and Alaska--and into a region as complex as it is alluring, where social and ethnic tensions have long simmered, and where outsiders are often the first to be accused.

The art reception for Regional Light Styles will be held on Tues May 3, 6-8 pm, in the library gallery.

Your safety is our number one priority

Each year we like to take a brief look back at our calls for the previous year.

One hundred and twenty calls for assistance in 2021 is just about an average year. Volunteers gave eight hundred and sixty three hours of service, not including training.

The Edinburg Fire District is unique in that it is bisected by a large body of water. That dictates greatly regarding how we have to operate. We have responsibility not only for the more traditional needs of a community such as responding to structure fires and motor vehicle accidents, but also any combination of needs occurring on the water and ice on the Great Sacandaga. This requires our Fire Company to

have various apparatus you just don't necessarily find in a city or suburban department. We have a snowmobile, rescue sled, and two boats. All of which of which may be called to any portion of the lake to offer assistance. We also man a County Fire Service purchased light tower that can be requested at the scene by any department.

Here is a sampling of a portion of our alarm statistics for 2021:



Flower Talk

Alstroemeria, known as 'The Peruvian Lily' or 'Lily of the Incas'. It is native to Chile, Brazil and Peru and was discovered by Baron Clause VonAlstomer in the 1700's while exploring the Incas and then on to Spain to collect seeds for his teacher's botanical garden. His teacher. Carl Linneaus, a Swedish botanical scientist. was the first European to study the plant. In appreciation for the Baron's efforts and discovery, Linnaeus named the plant after his student, who also went on to become a noted scientist himself. Alstroemeria was soon introduced to Europe and took off quickly since they were well-adapted to the hothouse culture already available at that time. Not long after this the flower found great popularity around the world.

It's not clear what the Ancient Incans thought of Alstroemeria flowers because there are minimal references to these blooms. While they were sure to run across them during



their travels across the cool mountain ranges of Brazil and Chile, they didn't play a major role in any drawings or symbolic representation found in that area. I personally have to believe they were an adored flower, they are so beautiful and unique.

Alstroemeria is often mistaken for miniature lilies; it is an eye-catching flower with an average of four to five trumpet-shaped blossoms that appear in a cluster at the top of the stem. The leaves on the stem grow upside down with no definitive explanation as to why this is. Unlike their look alike flower, the lily, Alstoemeria does not have a fragrance. There are around 50 species of the plant today with many hybrids created in labs - up to 190 cultivars (selective breeding of the species). They come in a variety of colors like orange, pink, rose, purple, red, yellow and white. The flower is able to stand in a vase for a full two weeks or longer (sometimes a month) without wilting. For this reason it is known to symbolize longevity, good health and often referred to as the friendship flower.

During 1998 & 1999 two major exhibitions were staged at John Van Alstine's Studio Gallery & Sculpture Park in Wells. Featured artists included Judith Plotner, fiber artist; John Van Alstine, sculptor; Holly Hallman, painter; Constance Dodge, painter and educator; and Anne Miller, painter. The public was invited to Artist Talks and the musical duo called Magpie performed a concert. In the meantime, David Cook contacted artists in the region to show at the Northville and Hadley libraries.

Like every venture there was a need for money to support programing. Judith Plotner introduced a major fundraiser of Adirondack Quilt raffles that became an annual occurrence between 1999 and 2004. Each quilt, the result of many dedicated hands, traveled to concerts for display and ticket

sales, finally to be awarded to a lucky ticket holder.

As with all volunteer organizations, SVAN experienced some years of struggle. In 2004 the following people stepped forward to save the organization: Frank Casler, President; Anne Miller, Vice President; Mary Ann Evans, Treasurer; Marilyn Sargent, Secretary; Constance Dodge, Robin Gaiser, Janet Marie Yeates, and John Scunziano trustees.

In December of 2014 SVAN became an official 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization. This tax exempt status gave SVAN the opportunity to qualify for grants. The Northville Post Office houses a painting of the intersection of Bridge Street and Main Street by Anne Miller, made possible by a Decentralization grant written by Janet Marie Yeates. Art Trails, an initiative started in 2014, developed by Constance Dodge and Marilyn Sargent was, and continues to be grant supported.



MAY 2022

Didjaknow (Part 2)?

Last month we started on the first part of a 'DIDJAKNOW?' (Did You Know?) list to share with your friends or to post on the refrigerator door. The idea was to prepare for the new boating season with a pre-launch information list.

Last month's installment contained: (1) Where are we? (2) What is the Hudson River-Black River Regulating District? (3) Why is the Hudson River-Black River Regulating District important to visitors to the Great Sacandaga Lake? (4) How is the weather going to be on the lake?

As we described it last month, our plan was to offer installments featuring information on the latest safety and certificate information provided by New York State Parks and Recreation, boat handling and eventually, boater destinations. Well,

the weather is looking better so let's not waste any time!

First, a warning. No one should ever be accused of providing only 'half of a story'. Be warned that our information is just a first step in the 'learning cycle'. We have tried to be faithful to the State guidelines but have space limitations. However, our information can be easily found in an 'extended' version in the New York State Boater's Guide (2021)

Required Boat Operator Credentials

New York State has been slowly phasing in a requirement for everyone to complete the New York State Safe Boating Course in order to legally operate a boat on New York State waters. As indicated below, individuals

who were born after January 1, 1988 (34 years of age) must currently hold a valid New York State Boating Certificate. The requirement is crafted to require a certificate for everyone in 2025.

Individuals born on or after January 1, 1988 must have their certificate NOW! The remaining age requirements are: Born on or after January 1, 1983 will need a certificate beginning in 2023 and born on or after January 1, 1978 will need a certificate in 2024!

Details on the regulations regarding the operation of vessels, personal watercraft and deadlines for the certificate requirements can be found at: https://parks.ny.gov/recreation/boating/education.aspx

Boaters can take a course either in person or online. Specific information on the availability of boater safety courses statewide including dates, locations and instructor charges, if any, is available at: https://parks.gov/recreation/boating/safety-courses.aspx This location also contains access to 'online' instruction including a FREE course! The price is right and the time is right so take a course! There might be a lot of people

delaying their coursework so it is a great time for you to step up for the FREE online course!

Boat Registration

Motorized pleasure vessels used for commercial or recreational purposes must be registered. The bottom line is that a vessel that is propelled by a motor (either electric or fuel-driven) must hold current registration. The process is handled through the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (NYSDMV) and results in a registration document and requires the display of registration numbers on the forward part of the bow on both the port and starboard sides along with a three-year validation sticker which must also be displayed. Check with the NYSDMV for more detail on the entire process including the boat title, possible USCG Boat documentation and the importance of the hull identification number.

Required Equipment

There is obvious equipment which you should never leave behind! Our information is only meant to be introductory, YOU must secure or download a copy of the latest New York State Boater's Guide

to ensure that you understand the requirements!

Below is information on Personal Flotation Devices, Visual Distress Signals, Fire Extinguishers, Sound Signaling Devices, and Anchors and Lines.

(1) Personal Flotation Device: Don't forget that you need a wearable Personal Flotation Device (PFD) for each passenger which is approved by the USCG on 'every pleasure boat floating or sailing in New York State waters'. The PFD is not going to be helpful if it is hidden on your vessel, does not fit the passenger or the person who is supposed to wear it has never tried it on!


The law requires that PFDs be worn by "children under the age of 12 aboard pleasure vessels less than 65 feet in length, canoes, kayaks or rowboats unless in a totally enclosed cabin being towed (wakeboarding, water skiing, tubing, etc.) ... aboard pleasure vessels less than 21 feet in length, including rowboats, canoes, and kayaks, while underway between November 1st and May 1st ... aboard a Personal Watercraft."

Please, please read the best practices for having infants on board. The State warns that the USCG "recommends that infants should not be on board watercraft until they are of a size that they can wear an appropriate PFD."

- (2) Visual Distress Signals: Signals include flares (parachute, hand-held or meteor) and distress flags. The requirements for vessels depend on the time of day, the size and type of the vessel. Don't forget that PWC (Personal Watercraft) are required to carry a "fluorescent-orange distress flag ... a minimum of one foot square or other appropriate USCG approved daytime VDS."
- (3) Fire Extinguishers: The USCG requires approved fire extinguishers on "boats where a fire hazard could be expected from the motors or the fuel system."

In our March, 2022 article, we provided a detailed account of the new fire extinguisher rules for recreational boaters which went into effect on April 20, 2022. Please take a quick look at the italicized excerpt from our article below and the references.

The United States Coast Guard (USCG) is





getting ready for the summer! On February 9, 2022, the USCG announced in their electronic COAST GUARD MARITIME COMMONS: THE COAST GUARD BLOG FOR MARITIME PROFESSIONALS, that "NEW FIRE EXTINGUISHER RULES FOR RECREATIONAL BOATERS GO INTO EFFECT APRIL 20, 2022". Additional information was provided in a series of frequently asked questions (FAQ) display as well.

Let's take a moment to understand the changes. It is important that the vessel owner take the time to read additional material on this regulatory change to determine the specific requirements for his/her vessel. We have presented a few sources produced by the USCG but it is important to continue YOUR education on the requirements and the needed implementation. Our article will alert you to some of the changes but YOU are the CAPTAIN and responsible for your vessel, crew and passengers!

The two main sources which we believe will start you on your way are: Fire Extinguisher Requirements for the Recreational Boater FAQ (https:// uscgboating.org/ recreationalboaters/fireextinguisher-faq. php) and New fire extinguisher rules for recreational boaters go into effect April 20,

(4) Sound

Signaling Devices: All boats must carry a sound signaling device ranging from a whistle for boats less than 39 feet in length to larger vessels which carry 'a sound producing mechanical appliance'! In both cases, the sound must be heard for at least one-half mile. Bells are required for vessels larger than 65 feet. These devices are used to signal navigation moves, distress or location in restricted visibility.

(5) Anchor and Line: Motorized boats must carry an anchor and line which is strong enough 'to provide the boat with safe anchorage'.

Navigation Lights

Navigation lights do not appear in the NYS Boater Safety materials under the equipment section but are referenced under Navigation Lights. A key phrase notes that 'All boats underway (not tied to the dock or at anchor)


must display their navigation lights at all times between sunset and sunrise, and during periods of restricted visibility.' There are very specific requirements for masthead, side light, stern and all-round lights.

Please take a look at the NYS Boater Safety materials. We provide a more detailed explanation of 'navigation lights' and other requirements in our next installment!


We hope this newsletter finds our families and community well! How can we possibly have only 9 weeks of school left? We cannot believe how fast the school year has gone by.




