BridgeNY Grant Applications

This past spring the town applied for grant funding to replace 2 bridges. We received notification that we have been awarded 2 BridgeNY grants. The grant amounts are: \$712,747.00 for the bridge over Little Hans Creek on Fox Hill Road and \$958,520.00 for the culvert on Military Road at Sand Creek.

Highway Wheel Loader

The town has taken delivery on a new John Deere 624K-11 Wheel Loader. The loader is being paid for using a \$100,000.00 grant from Senator

Tedisco, trade in value of the old Kawasaki loader and cash. It is larger than the old loader and arrived just in time to load salt and sand for the first snowfall.

Fulton County Landfill Tipping Fees

We received notice from Fulton County that our landfill tipping fees will increase by \$3.00 per ton to \$59.00 per ton 2019. Residents are encouraged to recycle everything possible so we do not have to pay \$59.00 per ton because recyclable items have been thrown in the garbage.

Edinburg Tree Lighting

The annual tree lighting will be on December 1st from 2:00-4:00 at the Firehouse and the Four Corners. The town is again providing the horse and wagon rides from 2:00 to 4:00 and there will be face painting from 2:00-4:00. Thanks to the wonderful volunteers led by Jackie and Sandy who put this day together for the children and their families and the entire community.

DON BOWMAN REMEMBERS

Tales of the Sacandaga Valley

Many years ago we had a column titled Don Bowman Remembers. It was written by a gentleman who lived in this area for many years, and worked on the dam and bridge. He lived in a bygone era of simpler times and strong resourceful people. We have access to many stories of the time and have decided to start printing them in our publication again.

I hope you enjoy them as much as we do.

The Silver Bell

In the old days the bells made for railroad locomotives were usually made of bronze, which gave them a clear tone. The F.J. & G. (Fonda, Johnstown and Gloversville) had an engine bell that was different, I was told, had a tone of class and quality apart from those on other railroads.

One prominent man and stockholder of the railroad donated fifty silver dollars which were tossed into the molten metal before the bronze bell was cast in the foundry in Troy.

The bell when cast and used, had a lovely tone. It was just beautiful to hear, so the railroad engine was called, "The Silver Bell."

I'll add here that the branch of the F.J. & G. railroad did serve part of the valley, thru the area of Cranberry Creek on to Northville. I've been told that it did not, but I worked on the removable of the tracks, while wearing hip boots, for the waters were rising because the gates of the dam had been closed down at Conklinville.

The F.J. & G. RR had a great interest in the Sacandaga Park on the river. There was even a natural island in the river which was part of the resort. Famous in the years 18 and 80's into the 1900's.

Most all of that was flooded, even the island, when the dam went in. The branch line ended at Northville, then trains returned.

The Art Subject


The visitor to the valley, an artist, saw a splendid looking old man sitting fishing from an overhanging river bank.

DID YOU KNOW THAT—

Most families in the Sacandaga Valley had Christmas trees in their homes by the first half of the 20th century. Trimmings were very simple, some homemade and edible such as apples, strings of cranberries and popcorn, nuts or cookies in various shapes. Tinsel and scrap paper creations were also very common. From the 1870's to 1910 Germany shipped to the United States reusable ornaments made from paper, cotton, papiermache', wax, tinsel, cardboard, wood, china; including the beautiful hand-blown glass balls. Exporting these decorations into our country was due in part to businessman F. W. Woolworth who sold them successfully in his many 5&10 cent stores.

Exports from Germany ended with the start of WWI. Businessman Max Eckhardt decided to correct this problem and started his own company here in America. He convinced Corning Glass to produce machine-made glass balls which Eckhardt then had his employees in his plants silver and hand decorate the balls. By the end of WWII Shiny Brite was the largest glass ornament manufacturer in the world.

Strings of electric lights on Valley trees were not common until the 1930's-40's. Many roads in our area did not receive electricity until the late 1940's after the end of WWII. Instead small tin clips which held 3/8-1/2 inch candles were placed on the very tips of branches. The candles were very dangerous and only lit for short periods with someone in the room at all times with a bucket of water handy.



In the 1940's our mom made the star for the tree cut from cardboard, covered with foil and the edges trimmed with foil rope. We always cut and shaped tissue paper pinwheels which were pinned to the very tips of the branches with a straight pin. Our tree was always covered with tinsel which was the last step in decorating and done by an adult, strand by strand, not tossing them on the tree. Very time consuming!! I think our dad had a real fondness for ribbon candy as he always made sure there was plenty in the house to snack on.

Part of the excitement of Christmas was getting ready for the programs which were always held at churches and schools.

By the late 1940's the 2-room school on Sinclaire Road had grown into a 3-room school with a cafeteria/auditorium room located under the third room addition. A decorated tree stood in this room but none in the classrooms. A stage with a curtain would be set up on which the programs were held with parents and guests seated in front of the stage. As a child it seemed like a huge space—as an adult I often wondered how there could possibly have been room for everyone.

Programs were always held at night and were so exciting with all the singing, plays and recitations. Each child received a gift from his or her teacher which usually included a pencil with the child's name on it. Santa Claus handed out a box of hard candy with possibly an apple, an orange and a candy cane.

The old church on Edinburg Hill had many children taking part in Christmas programs in the 1940's. We had many recitations and parts to

learn for church also. Practice was loads of fun and I loved singing the old carols over and over in the weeks leading up to the actual performance. When the final program was held depicting the true meaning of Christmas a feeling of warmth covered the entire church showing us what Christmas was all about.

Homes smelled wonderfully for weeks in advance of the holiday. Depending on your family's customs determined what was baking in the oven or simmering on top of the stove.

Most children hung their stockings on Christmas Eve to find them the next morning filled with small simple gifts. Apples were usually a winter staple in our rural homes but to find an orange or tangerine in the top of our stocking was a treat indeed.

After opening gifts at home early on Christmas morning the first 11 years of my childhood Christmases were spent a mile and half up the road at my Olmstead grandparents' farm. Except for doing the necessary farm chores everyone took the day off. A huge, decorated, balsam tree always stood in a corner of my grandparents parlor-a room seldom used the rest of the year. The large dropleaf table would be opened, all the extra leaves

added and Christmas dinner would be eaten in the parlor. My aunt would make name placards and place them by each plate. The biggest dessert treat of the day for me was the delicious vanilla ice cream that my aunt and uncles made for special occasions.



On Dec 13th, the Garden Club will hold our Annual Christmas Party at the Northville Public Library.





A Time of Reflection and Further Giving of Thanks

For me, December and November are both times of thanksgiving and reflection. Our education system, often strapped by budget cuts, less-than-wealthy tax rolls, yet typically driven by dedicated educators and wonderful, knowledge seeking kids.

The littlest of our worshippers, whose voices sometimes dominate the services with their giggles, cries, restless rants, and who are constant reminders that God wants us to "suffer the little children." They are our treasures and our future leaders, both secular and religious.

The Great Sacandaga Reservoir – a boon to the flood threatened cities of the Capital District, and playground for those rafters, boaters, swimmers, snowmobilers, and ice fisher persons among us.

The farmers and food service personnel who provide us with the best food that is available anywhere, assured by their hard work and knowledge.

And regardless of my sometimes grumbles, I do not rue the coming of Winter. I am an occasional snowshoer and ice skater, while I still have the physical ability. And If not, is there anything more lovely than sitting by a warm fire watching the snowy whiteness on the green pines?

I could go on and on and on, but I would be remiss in being MOST thankful for our freedom of religion, and the a place where we have the ability and freedom to not only silently contemplate and communicate with our God, but where we can shout out or sing songs of praise without fear of retribution. Thank you Dear God.

DIABETES

According to the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK), over 30 million Americans have diabetes with 1.5 million Americans newly diagnosed every year.

What is diabetes?

The NIDDK defines diabetes as a chronic health condition that occurs when blood glucose levels, or blood sugar, get too high. When you eat, your digestive system breaks down much of your food into glucose. Glucose is then absorbed into your blood and eventually used as energy.

However, in order for your cells to absorb glucose they must be supplied with a hormone called insulin. Insulin acts as a key to "unlock" the cells and allow glucose to enter. When the body doesn't have enough insulin or cannot use the insulin properly, glucose is unable to enter



your cells and remains in your blood. This lack of insulin results in diabetes.

Over time, diabetes can cause major health problems including heart disease, stroke, kidney disease and more. It's important to educate yourself on the different types of diabetes, the risk factors, and the steps you can take in preventing diabetes.

Type 1 and Type 2 Diabetes

The American Heart Association classifies diabetes into two main forms: type 1 diabetes and type 2 diabetes. According to the NIDDK, if you have type 1 diabetes your body does not make insulin on its own. Therefore, you must take insulin every day.

If you have type 2 diabetes your body either does not make insulin properly or does not use the insulin that is made properly. Type 2 diabetes is the most common form of diabetes and can usually be managed through diet and exercise.

Other forms of diabetes include gestational diabetes, monogenic diabetes and cystic fibrosisrelated diabetes.

Risk Factors

The National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases lists several risk factors for developing diabetes including: Being 45 years of age or older Having a family history of diabetes Being overweight Lack of physical activity

Other health problems such as high blood pressure Prevention

In order to reduce your risk for developing diabetes, the American Heart Association recommends managing weight by consuming





a heart-healthy diet that includes all five food groups and limits saturated fat, trans fat, salt and added sugars.

Aim to get at least 150 minutes of physical activity each week at a moderate intensity. Moderate intensity activities may include brisk walking, light bicycling, or water aerobics

Other preventative measures include minimizing alcohol consumption, quitting smoking, lowering blood pressure and taking medications as prescribed by your healthcare provider.

A Report from the Great Sacandaga Lake Association

by Edward Ludlum, President

As I write this, we've had our first snowfall and the snowmobile community is starting to dust off their sleds. Personally, I'm not into winter activities, I crawl in a hole right behind a groundhog and the groundhog comes out first! As part of the GSLA's Safe Lake Initiative I spoke with Lou Stutske, an experienced snowmobile operator who operates Fuel and Food in Mayfield, NY, and would like to pass along some reminders.

All snowmobiles must be registered and insured.

Ages 14-17 can operate a snowmobile on their own if they have taken an approved snowmobile operators safety course.

10-13 year olds must be accompanied by somebody at least 18 years old. That means the adult must be within 500 feet of the 10-13 year old. NY State has a 55mph speed limit for snowmobiles.

In addition, for those of you who like to snowmobile on the Great Sacandaga Lake, here are additional tips from Lou.

Changes in lake levels can cause ice heaves and drop offs. As the lake level drops, islands and rock piles can poke through the ice. A smooth area a couple of weeks ago may now have obstacles.

There are obstacles like anchors and docks along the shore line, so ride farther out on the lake.


There may be open water where tributaries flow into the lake and there is often open water around Sinclair Point. The ice is thinner if you go past "Flag Pole" point on the north end of the lake. Snowmobile in groups so there is assistance if you have an accident or breakdown.

Don't go out on the lake until the ice is thick enough.

On overcast days you can become snow blind due to a lack of contrast so slow down.

Slow down at night, it's easy to "out drive" your headlights.

Lastly, Lou mentioned three factors that should





Band members were posted at various points throughout the building to provide entertainment, and students of all ages were available in hallways and classrooms to discuss their project-based learning work. Information about the soon-to-be installed TeleHealth resource room was available, and teachers Warren Hoffman and Justin Fredericks were




