

Economic Development Grant from Saratoga County

The Town has been approved for a grant from the county of \$14,200.00 to have the town map updated and enhanced and to have a brochure created. The updated map and brochure will show historic marker locations and other features such as the Copeland Covered Bridge.

Edinburg Town Budget

The 2023 budget has been adopted. The budget stayed within the 2% cap allowed by New York State. It includes funding for participation in the Northville/Northampton Youth Program activities. The funding for fuel and heating oil for the General and Highway funds was increased to allow for higher prices. Solid Waste disposal fees paid to Fulton County were increased by \$2.00 per ton to \$64.00 per ton for the year. The budget includes a new garbage truck and a new Highway Plow truck. Both trucks will be paid for from funds

saved for the purchases. We will need to see if they will be produced since the factories are behind on production. The town tax rate will increase slightly but the county rate will decrease in 2023.

Cemetery Closure for the Winter

Edinburg cemeteries close for burials on December 1st for the winter. Visitors may walk in but the roads are not plowed and are closed to vehicles. It is possible they could close sooner if weather conditions warrant.

Garbage, Recycling and Town Hall Holiday Schedule

The Town Hall will be closed next Wednesday at noon and Thursday and Friday for Thanksgiving. There will be no recycling collection that week and the Recycling Center will be closed on Friday November 28th.

The employees of the Recycling Center have asked for December 24th off to be able to spend time with their families on Christmas Eve. There will be recycling collection on Thursday, December 22nd. The Recycling Center will be open on Friday, December 23rd from noon until 3:00pm and then closed on Saturday December 24th and Monday, December 26th. Garbage will be collected on Tuesday and Wednesday and recycling on Thursday. The following week the Center will be closed on Monday for the New Year's holiday and garbage and recycling will be collected Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday that week.

The Town Hall will be closed for the Christmas Holiday on December 23rd and will reopen on Tuesday January 3rd. Town officials may be

> reached at their homes if needed and the phones will be checked daily for messages.

Please be sure to move garbage bins back from the roadside so that the snowplows do not damage them. Bins must be kept shoveled out and assessable so employees can empty the garbage. Also, please do no park cars along roads that will cause garbage removal and plowing problems during snow storms.

DID YOU KNOW THAT---

Doctors

Today many of us think nothing of driving forty-five minutes to an hour to get to a doctor. In the early days of Edinburgh and the surrounding communities this would have been unheard of.

Transportation was by foot, horse or horse and wagon. Every community needed its own doctor. From its very beginnings Edinburgh has either had her own doctor or shared one with the neighboring towns of Day, Fish House or Northampton. Unfortunately today there seems to be fewer doctors and more patients so that in rural areas such as ours we often have to share a doctor with several other communities.

All doctors made house calls.

The first recorded physician to serve Edinburgh (at the time, Northfield) was in 1803 when a Dr. Benham presented his bill to a town meeting. The bill \$7.75, was for "doctoring William Clark's

widow" and was probably an annual fee for doctoring the poor.

Sylvesters's "History of Saratoga County" mentions a Dr. Gaylor and a Dr. Edson being in Edinburgh prior to 1800 but no other records have ever been found of these men.

Another doctor we know little about was Benjamin Cross, MD, other than he died in his 68th year on January 24, 1812 and is buried in the Partridge Cemetery on Sinclaire Road. Also evasive was Dr. Hiram Mann. The only record we have of him is that in 1814 the town paid him \$4.25 for his services.

Between the years 1815-1818 Dr. David Wells billed the town \$11.10 ½. These bills presented to the town were charges for caring for the poor. Dr. Wells was a very active doctor in town from 1815 to August 18, 1823 when he committed suicide at the age of 33, leaving a wife and 3 children behind. He had grown up in the community of Osborn Bridge, was buried in the Osborn Bridge Cemetery from which his body was removed to the King Cemetery at Sacandaga Park due to the creation of the Sacandaga Reservoir.

Dr. Nathaniel Seaver was practicing medicine in Edinburg between the years 1812-1834. He died in 1834 at the age of 52 years. He and his wife Lydia are buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Dr. Danford Edmonds—coming from Lake Pleasant in Hamilton County—was carrying on an extensive practice in town in 1830. Obviously civic-minded, he was town clerk in 1833/34. Married three times—his first wife gave him three children: Jay, James and Mary. His second wife was Eunice Deming Barker by whom he also had three children: George B., Danford R. and Margaret. He had no children with his third wife, widow, Mary Flynn. Dr. Edmonds died c. 1860 and is buried in

the King Cemetery, Sacandaga Park.

A Dr. Almond Edmonds born in 1815 married Betsy Maria Corey in 1839. She was the daughter of Gideon Corey who lived in Clarkville on the Tennantville Road opposite the Edwards farm. Almond and Betsy moved to Albion, NY and no record has ever been found of his practicing in Edinburg.

In 1820 Dr. John Mitchell settled in Northville and is believed to be Northville's first physician. It is believed that he also served Edinburg since his name appeared in local account books in the years 1837-43. Dr. Mitchell's first wife, Melinda and their son, William are buried in the Presbyterian Church Cemetery at Fish House. His second wife Ann Eliza and his son John A. (of Melinda) are buried in the South Main Street Cemetery in Northville. Where's Dr. Mitchell buried? My guess would be next to Ann Eliza.

David Copeland was an "herb doctor" who came to the Town of Day (then Concord) in 1815. Here he kept store and practiced his herbal medicine in Day and Edinburg. He seemed to be rather accomplished at "bleeding", which was an old medical practice of leeching blood from a patient

believing that this would draw out the poison or disease. Often fatal!! He and his wife Betsey moved to Beecher's Hollow in the 1830's and spent their later years with their son, Arad who built our famous covered bridge and operated the Copeland Carriage Shop. David died December 25, 1846. He and Betsey were buried in the Coldbrook Cemetery and removed to the Edinburg Cemetery with the creation of the Sacandaga reservoir.

Alvah Wood, MD came to Fish House from Montgomery County in 1825. He practiced his entire life in the Fish House community passing away 1878. He and his wife Maria are buried in the Fish House Cemetery on the hill.

Dr. Wood served the same area at the same time as Dr. Langdon Marvin. Dr. Marvin had served as a captain and surgeon during the Civil War. When he returned home to Fish House he brought with him a young black man, Ashton Hodges. "Ash" spent the rest of his life managing the Marvin and Sinclaire farms. Dr. Marvin's wife Laura Beecher came from one of the earliest families in Fish House and Edinburg. Dr. Marvin passed away in 1869. He and Laura are also buried in the

Fish House Cemetery. Dr. Marvin was the great grandfather of the late Lucy Sinclaire Warren of Sinclaire Road.

All of these doctors also served the people of Edinburg. Prior to the Sacandaga Reservoir the roads on both sides of the Sacandaga River led from Edinburg to Fish House.

Dr. Lemuel D. Sabin appeared in Edinburg's records in 1825 when he billed the town \$15 for treating Hannah Hall and her children. In 1826 he presented a bill of \$5 for treating Mrs. Hall. In 1829 his bill was \$42.28 for caring for the poor. In 1840 Arad Copeland credited Dr. Sabin \$29.71 for medical attention against Arad's bill of \$43.98 for his services as a wheelwright and carriage



maker—the good old barter system. Dr. Sabin died in 1848 at the age of 57, having been a faithful public servant. He and his wife Relief were buried in the Beecher Hollow Cemetery and removed to the Edinburg Cemetery in the 1920's due the creation of the Reservoir.

With cash on short supply in most rural small towns it's very possible that the only real money most doctors saw was that which they collected from the town in caring for the poor.

Payments from other patients—no health insurance back then—consisted of a chicken, dozen eggs, a quarter of beef, pork or deer; bushel of potatoes or apples or trading services such as Arad Copeland did.

I had written that family cousin Susie Edwards Conkling lost 3 family members to the Flu Epidemic of 1918-19. She actually lost 5. Her father Loren Eugene Edwards(Gene) died 7-15-1918, age 59. The other four died within a week of each other. Brother Frank Edwards passed on 10-26-1918, age 17; husband George E. Conkling on 10-27-1918, age 44; brother Leamon Edwards on 10-28-1918, age 25 and Susie's 3 ½ yr. old daughter, Ruth Marion Conkling on 11-1-1918. What a heart breaking experience!

Thanks so much to Susie's granddaughter Susan Roosa Jones of Edinburg for correcting this for me. Susie was the first cousin of my late fatherin-law, Walter.

Membership in the Edinburg Historical Society is just \$5 per person and \$10 for a family. There





The EHS maintains the Sand Hill One-room Schoolhouse on Tange Road, the Copeland Covered Bridge, and the Carriage House. The Nellie Tyrrell and the Edinburg Rural Museums are owned by the town but are leased to EHS. The Nellie has exhibits and is used for the preservation of Edinburg photos and documents and the Rural has exhibits on a country kitchen and parlor. Other exhibits show rural life, logging, hunting, fishing, tools for wood working and the making of maple syrup. Visitors can see the threads, fiber and fabric exhibit that has a working loom.



1880-1930 DECLINE

By 1880, the intense logging had taken its toll. Prime timber was depleted, and the river was beginning to fill with silt washed in from the erosion of the cleared ridges.

Business declined as large scale logging left the Adirondacks for Michigan.

Tanning was changed when vegetable based tanning agents (hemlock bark) were replaced by synthesized chemicals. Tanning moved to where the hides were, not where the trees were.

In 1903, the wood products factory moved to Batchellerville, and subsequently closed.

The Whippoorwill, Conkling's 2nd steam boat tug, made its last trip in 1883.

As manufacturing left the valley, so did people. In 1875, the population of Day was 1199. In 1905, the population was 641-a 47% decline in 30 years. In 1860, Day schools enrolled 556 students. In 1888, school registration was 86.


While logging continued, economic life became primarily agriculture, but the level of agriculture was that of the family farm. The cash economy had left Day.

Spontaneous Combustion - fact or fiction?

Spontaneous Combustion is not what happens between two teenagers in love.

Nor, is it when two opposing political parties get together for a meeting.

Although that is pretty close.

Rather, Spontaneous Combustion is a fire caused without the benefit of an external source of heat. It may be the result of a chemical, biological, or physical process, that creates a spontaneous ignition. Okay, that sounds pretty complicated, but what does that have to do with me you ask. Well the Nation Fire Protection Association has estimated that fourteen thousands fires occur each year the result of Spontaneous Combustion.

The idea is really very simple, the physical properties of numerous items can change over a relatively short period of time. Vapors may collect, heat from a reaction could be generated, but can not be sufficiently expelled. A tipping point is reached and the fire erupts.



There are some surprising sources of Spontaneous Combustion to include: mulch, leaf piles, rags soaked with cooking oils, hay bales. If you have ever broken a bale of green hay and put your hand inside, it is really surprising how warm the bale has gotten over time. Particularly dangerous items are rags soaked with Linseed oil.

There are a few practical things you can do to lessen your risk factors. First, keep ventilation in mind, whatever your activity. Fumes can easily build up from flammable liquids. Even too much saw dust in the air of an enclosed space can become an issue.

If you are using rags to stain furniture spread them outside individually to dry, away from direct sunlight. Let them become hard and brittle. If this is not a possibility seal them in a metal container with water and something like Dawn detergent, which will act to break down some of the oils.

There is nothing wrong with being spontaneous. Just make sure it's your personality and not the garage on fire.

Flower Talk

"Kiss me baby-Nothing makes me sick" An oldie but a goodie from Steve Lucas.

But Steve must have not known about Mistletoe, which can do both. Let me explain. Mistletoe is a semi-parasitic plant that produces small white berries and grows almost exclusively in trees. It finds its home like many seeds do – through bird droppings. As the seed begins to grow, the plant attaches itself to the "host" tree. Its roots work their way into the bark to steal water and essential nutrients that it needs to survive, killing the tree over time. Mistletoe is capable of creating its own food source through photosynthesis, like other plants, but it seems lazy and prefers to feed from a host source. The origin of the name itself is fairly unattractive for a plant with such history. It's derived from two Anglo



Saxon words "Mistel" meaning dung, and "Tan" meaning stick or branch. However, it didn't go unrecognized, capturing the attention of people for centuries.

Greek mythology contains references to mistletoe. They thought of mistletoe as a lifegiving plant, a symbol of sexuality. They used it during their special holiday of Saturnalia, a winter holiday which also coincided with the Druidic Winter Solstice. Later on, because mistletoe was thought to impart fertility, it was used as part of the ancient Greek marriage rites.

First century AD, the Celtic Druids, an ancient

civilization of people who lived on the British Isles, (what is now Ireland and Scotland) came to prize mistletoe as a symbol of vitality, fertility and good health, incorporating it into religious ceremonies. Mistletoe grows on two types of trees: apple and oak. Because it's more rare on oaks and retains its green color and blooms during the harsh winters the Druids revered mistletoe growing on the oak. According to legend, the mistletoe on the oak trees represented the oak's heart or soul. The Druids would slice off the mistletoe during a special ceremony held twice a year. The ceremony was held on the Winter Solstice, the shortest day of the year, and the Summer Solstice, the longest day.

They initiated the custom of hanging it over their door around the winter solstice to protect against evil and bring good tidings. It soon became a central focus of the 'Ritual of Oak and Mistletoe', a ceremony that led the Romans to call the Druids 'barbarians.'

In Norse culture, the Mistletoe plant was a sign of love and peace. The story goes that the goddess, Figg lost her son, the god Baldur, to an arrow made of mistletoe. After his death, she vowed that Mistletoe would kiss anyone who passed beneath so long as it was never again used as a weapon. It also meant reconciliation in which enemies would lay their troubles to the side for a truce, or spouses undergoing hardship could kiss and make up.

This leads us to the tradition that we know and love today, known as the kissing plant. Starting with the serving class in 18th or 19th-century. According to the rules of the day, any man was able to kiss any woman standing under the mistletoe. It was considered bad luck to refuse the kiss and good

luck to accept. With each kiss, a berry would be plucked until there were none remaining. In 1820, Washington Irving wrote of mistletoe in 'Christmas Eve' contributing to the festive feel. Shortly after, Charles Dickens made mention of the romantic herb again in 'The Pickwick Papers'. The tradition spread quickly throughout the world. It Began as a custom among the lower classes and made its way to all classes, becoming a universal holiday ritual.

It has been also used as an herbal remedy in Europe and among Native Americans extending back to ancient times. Native Americans brewed it into a liquid and people suffering from headaches bathed their heads in the tincture. It's believed to have medicinal value and supposedly alleviate

conditions such as arthritis, hypertension, epilepsy, and infertility. Ironically, its association is with love, it became known as a heart tonic. Its action as a stimulant nicely ties in the myth with reality. Processed mistletoe has an unusual effect on the heart and has been used to treat angina and heart ailments. Researchers have isolated a chemical called phoratoxin that causes changes in heartbeat. In Germany, researchers studying mistletoe believe it may contain compounds useful to fight cancer. One compound, galactose-specific lectin, may improve the quality of life and treatment outcomes for people undergoing chemotherapy. However, mistletoe's laboratory and clinical trials demonstrate mixed results. Many varieties are poisonous and raw consumption could lead to sickness or even death. So leave the elixirs, and tonics to the professionals.

So, Next time you find yourself puckering up under the Mistletoe, remember that it all started with bird droppings, a parasite, barbarians, and a Norse goddess. At the same time, the beauty of mistletoe is truly within and what it allows us to do: to move the confines of the social norm to the side in the name of something much more noble—love.



This edition has some local flavor to it as it highlights a couple on Lake George and their '1971 wooden Lyman runabout' which marked ten years of business on the Lake. It is well worth a reading! However, apart from the local flavor, the issue provides an interesting review of U.S. Coast Guard data on boat accidents during the pandemic as well as marketing updates. It also moved me to look at the local numbers on the same topic. Here is a quick dive into both sets of information, one at the national level (Boating Boom Leads to More Accidents and Fatalities) and one at the State

level (2021 New York State Recreational Boating Report).

Increase in Boating Accidents During the Pandemic

The U.S. Coast Guard Chief of Boating Safety, Verne Gifford, reported that the period from July to August 2020 was the 'highest number of accidents for the 23 years we have on record'. (Remember that the 'prepandemic' year was 2019.)

Numbers can sometimes be confusing but it seems easier to understand if we plot the numbers by year. The number of boating deaths were: 2019 (613 deaths); 2020 (767 deaths); 2021 (658 deaths). Of course, the question which the authors attempt to solve is 'WHY?'.

Boats, Boats and Not Enough Boats

This is a quick quiz. Question #1: Where would you think people go during a pandemic to 'be socially distanced and relax'? Question #2: Where would you think people go during a pandemic 'to make memories and connect with nature'? Answer for Both Questions: Boating.

Matt Gruhn who is the President of the Marine Retailers Association of the Americas (MRAA) was quoted in the BoatU.S. Magazine to report an incredible observation. He noted: "Dealers sold everything they could get their hands on. Their showrooms were literally empty at times." The article notes that the number of powerboats purchased by first-time boat buyers increased from 31% in 2019 to 35% in 2020 and decreased only slightly to 34% in 2021.

There is a memorable quote in the article from Captain Timothy Dunleavy of the New Hampshire State Police Marine Patrol, "We see inexperienced operators getting into trouble, not being as familiar with the hazards on our lakes ... violating routine navigation laws ... people were lost, didn't know where they were, needed directions. Those are all signs of an inexperienced boater."

Accidents in Rental Boats

We asked an earlier question about the likelihood of boaters taking to the water to find a quiet beautiful place. Here is another Question: What would you do if the, boats were all sold and you still wanted to go boating? Answer: I would rent a boat! Of course, this is the answer and as a result, the rental deaths increased by 98% in 2020.

National Summary

The article in the BoatU.S. Magazine is



excellent and concise. Their conclusion on the national level is that boaters increased during the pandemic year with an overlap into the latest year. They also note by quoting from both Federal and State sources that the best way to make boating safe is to have a strong boater safety program!

There is only one more question which remains unanswered on this issue. What about the figures for New York State?

New York State Boat Registrations, Fatalities/Injuries, and Boater Safety Education

The data in the 2021 New York State Recreational Boating Report do not track the specific sales information provided in the BoatU.S. Magazine article. New York State reported an increase of 6051 registrations in 2021 wth a total of 431,229 registration of recreational vessels. However, the report indicates a significant decrease in fatalities compared to the 2020 year.

New York State Boat Fatalities/Injuries

In 2021, the boating report noted a total of 17 fatalities with 5 recorded each for Cabin Motorboats and Kayaks, 3 for Canoes, 2 reported for Open Motorboats and 1 each for Pontoon Boats and Standup Paddleboards. In the same year,





there were 112 injuries. A total of 48 injuries were recorded for Open Motorboats, 25 for Personal Watercraft, 20 for Cabin Motorboats, 7 for Pontoon Boats, 5 for Unknown Vessels, 3 for Sail Only, 2 for Kayaks, and 1 each for Auxiliary Sail and Standup Paddleboards.

Available 2021 data indicate that boat operators who are older than 60 years of age account for the most recorded injuries or fatalities (17%) followed by age 50-60 (15%), age 41-50 (12%), age 31-40 (10%), age 21-30 (9%), and under age 21 (6%). The age data are not available for 31% of the injuries or fatalities. The State report summarizes its findings by stating that "New York had fewer total reported accidents (192) and injuries (118) in 2021, compared to 2020."

For those readers who have the interest, the State has provided an extensive review of the types of accidents and the identification of the vessels who have been involved in mishaps on the water.

New York State Boater Safety Instruction

Don't forget that New York State has begun a phase-in process which will require that all boat operators will be required to hold a Boater Safety Certificate by 2025. Currently, boat operators born after January 1, 1993 are required to hold a Boater Safety Certificate.

The 2021 New York State Recreational Boating Report provides data on the boater safety program since 2000. The number of students enrolled in the online option has outpaced those who were involved in classroom instruction!

Instruction was modified to include an online option in 2015. Instruction provided through the online option grew from 8904 in 2015 to 38,016 in 2020 and was reduced slightly to 31,464 in 2021. Classroom instruction recorded the following attendance over the same period: 12,635 (2015), 2113 (2020) and 4243 (2021). The largest yearly cumulative age group for 2021 classroom instruction was 1400 for students under the age of

19 and the largest number for online instruction was 6804 for students between the ages of 36-55.

New York State Report Overview

I highlighted only a small amount of information in the New York State 2021 Recreational Boating Report. Although we didn't provide data, the report could help future and current boaters in acquainting themselves to long term trends as well as the most recent shifts in accidents by season, month, and boat type. It certainly allows boaters to chart safety performance.

At this point the clouds are moving in, it might be better to stay off of the icy highways and take a detailed look at:




Life on the Great Sacandaga Lake really slows down this time of year. But some activities around the lake continue, and some are perfectly informal and unplanned.

For example, a woman was recently telling me about her experience as a child visiting her grandparents' house on the lake, roughly 40 years ago. In late autumn, when the lake level was low but ice and snow had not yet come, she and some local friends would walk the water's edge to see what the receding waters had revealed. They often came upon the foundations of the homes that once stood, before their residents were forced out and their homes flooded when the Sacandaga River was dammed. The displaced residents left a lot behind. Broken plates and bowls were common finds for the kids, but most sought after were the cobalt medicine bottles, with their blue glass that

would glisten once dipped in the cold lake water and rubbed clean. Of course, the kids' hands got cold and wet, but it was worth it for the shiny blue treasure they had found.

She also told me that she and her friends once found an intact, 1940s era Virgin Mermaid fishing lure. An internet search reveals that the Virgin Mermaid, made by Stream-Eze in South Bend, Indiana "lures both men and fish." The anatomically correct lure apparently was crafted on the questionable premise that fishermen and fish had similar interests. It surely was an amusing find for a group of kids on the shores of the Sacandaga in late fall four decades ago.





Sacandaga Valley Arts Network



We can put up our outside lights and decorations in less than an hour. It is amazing what you can do without the bitter wind stinging your face and freezing your fingers off. I was pretty sad for a few weeks though. This year, I will not be putting up my usual, if any, decorations. We will be away two out of the four weeks in December. It makes no sense, to me, to do all that work for a few days of enjoyment. The more I thought about it, the sadder I got. A few days ago, my perspective suddenly changed. Big Hoss (our fur baby)and I went out for a walk. He loves walking along the sea wall where he can check for fish and other sea creatures. He gets the bonus of seeing many people. This day, there were not a lot of tourists. We talked to mostly local people on their way to work and a few homeless people that love to pet and talk to Hoss. On this particular day, Hoss chased four large iguanas off the sea wall into the mangroves. On our return home, after he chased the last iguana, people riding a three wheel bicycle passed us, on the sidewalk. A man was peddling the bike with an older woman,

(Adapted from a Nordicware recipe)

INGREDIENTS:

Scant 4 cups flour

- 1 Tbsp cocoa
- 1 Tbsp ginger
- 1 1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 3 tsp cinnamon
- 1 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup butter, room temperature
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 large egg
- ½ cup molasses

Sugar or sparkling sugar for rolling

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Whisk together first six ingredients in a medium bowl and set aside. In another bowl cream butter and sugar till light and creamy. Add the egg and mix well; then add the molasses and blend in. Thoroughly mix wet ingredients into dry. Refrigerate 2-23 hours.

Roll into golf ball sized balls and roll in sugar. Press with stamp till flat but not too thin and bake 10-14 minutes.

Makes about 2 dozen cookies.
