



Then Came a Change

Years ago in the ordinary way a married woman could not own property, because property passed to her husband on marriage.

Unless there was a marriage settlement where the bride's family would compel the prospective husband to set up a fund under a trust, then if he died first the fund and property became the property of the widow.

Then the women's sufragette movement came along. Women could vote, and own property.

I remember - "Votes for Women!!"

Old Christmas Trees

If you wonder what to do with an old Christmas tree - you can use it to feed winter birds as some valley residents used to do.

Use a heavy string and a big needle to string popcorn to drape on the tree. After you hang the discarded tree from a growing hardwood tree. Old popped corn is easier to string. Whole cranberries may be strung on a wire or piece of string.

Tie a string around a pine cone or two, cover the cone with peanut butter and hang on the Xmas tree.

DID YOU KNOW THAT—

In the summer of 1905 my husband's maternal great aunt, Jessie Wilbur of Osborne Bridge(now under the waters of the Sacandaga) and his paternal great grandmother, Viola Edwards of Edinburg took a 2-week trip into the Adirondacks.

At the time Jessie was 25, still single-she married the following year-and was a school teacher. She taught in several one-room schools in the Towns of Edinburgh and Northampton. Jessie's mother, Annis Olmstead Wilbur and Viola Edwards were good friends. Annis was born and raised in Beecher Hollow, the daughter of John C. and Ruamy Olmstead. Viola was originally from Baker's Mills and still had family there-quite possibly the incentive for this trip.

Jessie wrote a delightful article of their trip for a local newspaper. At times it sounds as though an

A Trip to the Adirondacks

Mrs. Albert Edwards and myself returned last Thursday, Aug. 31 from a two weeks outing at North River. Indian Lake and Blue Mountain.

Leaving Edinburg on a pleasant morning, we drove to Day, then over Hadley Hill. We reached Creek Center in the afternoon.

Rev. C.V. Wood made us welcome and we spent the night at the parsonage and attended prayer meeting that evening.

Next morning we crossed Stony Creek and drove through Thurman round old Crane Mountain's rocky sides, where high-bush cranberries grew by the roadside.

Before noon we crossed Mill creek, passed through Johnsburg Corners, visited the cemetery on the hill and reached Sodam, or Baker's Mills, the former home of Mrs. Edwards. The house being closed, we camped on the green. Many changes have been made, but the orchard her father set out and the big rock where she used to play was much the same. His blacksmith shop was closed and deserted, also the stone school house for the time. A church has been erected in this pleasant hamlet since.

Old Oven mountain, near by, has recently been found to contain garnet, and a mining plant is soon to be started there.

That afternoon we journeyed toward the seemingly distant Gore mountain, then round it, to North Creek, thence along the bank of the mighty(?) Hudson to North River, where we stopped over night.

The next day we spent at the upper village, about a mile up the "outlet of the thirteenth". We visited the new school house across the creek, and the Memorial hall built by Mr. Hooper. The M.E. and the Baptist churches are near there.

Next afternoon we left for Indian Lake. The road, the greater part of the way, is exceedingly roughover bare ledges and through mud-which a few years ago was kept smooth and in condition for the fast tally-ho that carried the mail. This part is wild country. The public highway near "Dew Drop Inn" is said to be the highest in the state. Mt. Marcy and Mt. McIntyre were in view, also Blue Mountain.

We crossed Indian River and descended the hill

where Lew Wait met his death. I also rode in the wagon in which he was riding at that time.

Indian Lake Corners contains three churches, M.E., Baptist and Catholic, a graded school with three departments, several stores and one hotel. We spent a week there. In the meantime excursions were made to Big Brook and to the Indian Lake dam and a few miles up the lake to Squaw Brook. One day was spent at Blue Mountain Lake.

On this trip we crossed Cedar River, Johnnie Mac brook and 34th flow. Most of our party enjoyed a ride on the lake steamer and regretted that we just missed an excursion to Raquette Lake, thirteen miles distant.

The cottages and hotels, excepting the Utowana or Prospect House were well filled with guests.

The place affords an Episcopal church and a Catholic church, a graded school, a library and two stores. We returned to Indian Lake at evening and met the six horse coach on its way in.

Saturday afternoon witnessed a ball game between the married and single men. The latter were victorious. I attended service at the M.E. church. Rev. Cole, formerly of Gloversville, is pastor. We returned to North River and spent a day with friends at a large farm about a mile up a hill from the village. The mountain view from this point is especially fine.

The next morning, I, with a party, equipped with a lantern, explored a cave near North River and in the afternoon we visited Barton's garnet mine about six miles up Gore mountain passing over the divide between the Hudson and Sacandaga, the highest point in the state where vegetation matures. Saw the trail of a big bear that had crossed the road and at a spring where we stopped for drink were deer tracks.

About twenty men are employed in the mine, which produces about eight tons per day, valued at \$40 per ton. The garnet is found in "pockets" surrounded by a black stone hood. The work is all

done by hand with shovel, pick and drill. The garnet is put into sacks holding 150 lbs. for shipment. After visiting the third pit we had supper at the miner's camp. Botheration flow, a branch of the Sacandaga, can be seen from there.

Hooper's mine is a large plant where rocks containing garnet are crushed and pass through a separator.

Wednesday morning our homeward journey began. After calling on friends at North Creek, we proceeded by way of Weavertown to Creek Center again remaining over night with Rev. Wood and wife. Next day we dined on Hadley Hill and soon the more familiar land marks began making their appearance. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon we reached Mrs. Edwards' home, well pleased with our vacation and hoping at no distant date to repeat our experience."

What tales Jessie had to tell her class when school started that fall. Ventures into the Adirondacks today are far different compared with what they were over 100 years ago!

ALZHEIMER'S VS. TYPICAL AGE RELATED CHANGES

According to the National Institute on Aging, there are approximately 5 million Americans living with

Alzheimer's and over 15 million people serve as their caregivers. For reasons that are not clear, about two-thirds of those living with this disease are women and Alzheimer's is more prevalent in those over 65.

Alzheimer's is a brain disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. There are early warning signs but they are often confused with typical age related changes and not reported to a physician. According to the Alzheimer's Association, the following are some of the early signs of Alzheimer's and other dementias versus typical age related changes.

Alzheimer's Signs/Symptoms:

- -Repeated poor judgment and decision making
- -Memory loss that disrupts daily life
- -Difficulty completing familiar tasks
- -Challenges in planning and problem solving
- -Misplacing frequently used things and inability to retrace steps to locate them
- -Confusion with time or place
- -Withdrawal from normal activities
- -New problems with words in speaking or writing
- -Changes in mood or personality

Typical age related changes may include but are not limited to:

- -Forgetting what day it is but remembering later
- -Missing a monthly payment occasionally
- -Sometimes forgetting which word to use
- -Losing things from time to time
- -Making a poor choice once in a while



-Feeling weary of social obligations and sometimes staying home

It is normal to fear that any of these normal changes means something worse. If you are wondering if you have a problem, it is important to discuss this with your doctor. Write down your questions and take a friend or family member with you to discuss your concerns.

The Alzheimer's Association is an excellent resource for information about the disease. They operate a 24/7 Helpline for people seeking information and support. If you call 800-272-3900 you can speak confidently with a care consultant that can help with:

- -Information about the signs of Alzheimer's and other dementias
- -Find out about local programs and services
- -Decision making support, crisis assistance and education on issues faced every day
- -Get general information about medications, other treatment options, legal, financial and care decisions
- -Information on safety services such as Lifeline and the Alzheimer's Association Safe Return program. Safe Return provides assistance when someone with the disease wanders or has a medical emergency.
- -Support and education for caregivers






A Report from the Great Sacandaga Lake Association

HAND HARVESTING OF AQUATIC PLANTS

This is a supplement to the Citizen's Guide, which provides basic information about Adirondack Park Agency regulations.

Pursuant to Section 578.3(n)(1) of Agency regulations, an Agency permit is required for the removal of soil, peat, mud, sand, or gravel, or any other excavation or dredging of a wetland. However, no permit will be required for the removal of wetland plants, including their roots, under the following specific circumstances:

- · The removal is conducted in open water less than 2 meters (6 feet) deep (Footnote 1);
- · The removal is conducted entirely by hand;

- The removal leaves at least 200 square feet of contiguous indigenous wetland in the immediate vicinity:
- The removal does not involve taking more than 1000 square feet of indigenous wetland plants:
- The removal does not involve the application of pesticides or matting;
- The removal is not part of a larger harvesting program by individuals or groups;
- No rare or endangered species are removed or

This flyer is intended to provide general information regarding Agency jurisdiction. Other provisions or restrictions may apply if an Agency permit or variance is required or if the property has previously been subject to Agency review.

review, please submit a Jurisdictional Inquiry Form (JIF). The JIF form is available on the Agency website at www.apa.ny.gov/Forms/jiform.pdf.

Footnote 1. The harvesting of aquatic plants from open water more than 2 meters deep is not regulated by the Agency. Footnote 2. The New York Natural Heritage Program works to facilitate the conservation of rare animals. The Endangered and Threatened Species provisions of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law are administered by the Department of Environmental Conservation. The DEC maintains lists of the rare animals currently being tracked by the Natural

Heritage Program and of currently protected endangered and threatened species.




Lake Luzerne Town Historian







Ice seldom freezes uniformly. It may be a foot thick in one location and only an inch or two just a few feet away.

Ice formed over flowing water and currents is often dangerous. This is especially true near streams, bridges and culverts. Also, the ice outside river bends is usually weaker due to the undermining effects of the faster current.

The insulating effect of snow slows down the freezing process. The extra weight also reduces how much weight the ice sheet can support. Also, ice near shore can be weaker than ice that is farther out.

Booming and cracking ice isn't necessarily dangerous. It only means that the ice is expanding and contracting as the temperature changes.

Schools of fish or flocks of waterfowl can also adversely affect the relative safety of ice. The movement of fish can bring warm water up from the bottom of the lake. In the past, this has opened holes in the ice causing snowmobiles and cars to break through.

RECOMMENDED MINIMUM ICE THICKNESS 2" or less - STAY OFF

4" - Ice fishing or other activities on foot

5" - Snowmobile or ATV

8" - 12" - Car or small pickup

12" - 15" - Medium truck

Note: These guidelines are for new, clear solid ice. Many factors other than thickness can cause ice to be unsafe.

White ice or "snow ice" is only about half as strong as new clear ice. Double the above thickness guidelines when traveling on white ice.

SAFETY TIPS FOR TRAVELING ON ICE

The following guidelines can help you make wise choices:

Check for known thin ice areas with a local resort or bait shop. Test the thickness yourself using an ice chisel, ice auger or even a cordless 1/4 inch drill with a long bit.

Refrain from driving on ice whenever possible. If you must drive a vehicle, be prepared to leave it in a hurry--keep windows down and have a simple emergency plan of action you have discussed with your passengers.

Stay away from alcoholic beverages. Even "just a couple of beers" are enough to cause a careless error in judgment that could cost you your life. And contrary to common belief, alcohol actually makes you colder rather than warming you up.

Don't "overdrive" your snowmobile's headlight. At even 30 miles per hour, it can take a much longer distance to stop on ice than your headlight shines. Many fatal snowmobile through-the-ice accidents occur because the machine was traveling too fast for the operator to stop when the headlamp illuminated the hole in the ice.

Wear a life vest under your winter gear. Or wear one of the new flotation snowmobile suits. And it's a good idea to carry a pair of ice picks that may be homemade or purchased from most well

stocked sporting goods stores that cater to winter anglers. It's amazing how difficult it can be to pull yourself back onto the surface of unbroken but wet and slippery ice while wearing a snowmobile suit weighted down with 60 lbs of water. The ice picks really help pulling yourself back onto solid ice. Caution: Do not wear a flotation device when traveling across the ice in an enclosed vehicle.

As I am now well into my Second Year as a Superintendent here at E.C.S., I am beginning to have more opportunities to meet with and begin to get to know members of both the Edinburg and Northville communities where I have the pleasure of living and working.

I had the chance to visit Jean Raymond at the Town Hall earlier this fall and I have found her to be an incredible wealth of information and knowledge. I have guickly come to admire this woman and hope to work with and get to know further in the coming years. I was able to attend a meeting at the Sacandaga Senior Center this past month with our Intern and Community Liaison, Michelle Ellis. I asked that the members please feel free to contact me for a sit down meeting or call me if they ever have any questions regarding the school, our budget, initiatives or just to get to know us better. I let the members know that we are truly interested in developing a partnership with the Senior Center and working together to ensure our student's needs are met in and outside of school. I have plans to meet with the Fire department and the Historical Society in the coming months so that I can share the same ideas and vision with them.

You may ask why I am mentioning this in a published newsletter. It is not for recognition, not to celebrate one group over another, my goal is simple. I want the Edinburg families and community to know that the old cliché, "It Takes a Village" is really an honest truth. It is a core belief that drives our vision at Edinburg Common School which is to work together with our families and community members to build authentic relationships. I have watched this vision evolve this year as we begin to have seniors and pastors signing up to volunteer to read to our students. I have had the opportunity to see the outpouring of assistance from the Lion's Club, Red Hat Society, Churches, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts. Four Corner's Diner, Brownell Lumber and other community members and groups who have come forward to adopt families for Christmas and/or Thanksgiving, to donate coats, school supplies, meals or other services.

The greatest outpouring of how this community comes together was something I had the chance to witness first hand today.

"An incident involving one of our students ended safely on November 17, 2016. While waiting for transportation to a program in a neighboring district, a five-year-old Edinburg student wandered away from his mother into the woods surrounding their home. When our bus arrived and the driver was told of the situation, the bus monitor quickly took action to help the mother while the driver immediately notified the school, which in turn called 911. State police, local community members and school staff immediately responded and searched for the missing child who was found safe almost two hours later, a distance from his home."

The safety of all our students is always of primary importance to everyone at Edinburg Common School. We are so grateful for the quick response and diligent search by so many of our community members and the authorities. Everyone pulled together and we are happy to report a "happy ending."

This incident shows the strength of this community and the level of care that the staff and community members have for our children. We as educators are committed to doing whatever it takes to ensure the safety and happiness of our students while they are in our care. I want to sincerely thank the local law enforcement, State Police, our Board of Trustees, Edinburg Fire Department, our staff and community for coming together quickly to find this little boy and return him safely to his family.

I would like to remind everyone as we enter this season of giving, caring and thankfulness, to take the time to remember that we need to embrace the many positives in our school and in our community and celebrate them. So often we find ourselves latching onto any negative while instead, we should offer solutions to concerns while at the same time accentuating the positives. We need to model this positivity all the time to show our children that everything starts with a positive attitude and a willingness to try and try again. Children need to learn that we all make mistakes, young and old alike; but we can also all work together collaboratively to problem solve and eliminate the negative.

Greetings from the Sixth Grade Class! The Sixth Grade class has had a very productive fall trimester. In English Language Arts we have been delving into the world of ancient myths. 
