#### Garbage Bins and Mailboxes


If you will be away for the winter consider moving or removing your garbage bin and mailbox from the highway right of way to avoid damage from snow plowing or snow thrown by snow plows.

## DID YOU KNOW THAT---

#### Tall Tales

According to the dictionary: "folklore is traditional legends, sayings and customs of a people" and a "folk tale is a story of legendary elements made and carried down in word among the common people." Swapping stories was very common in the old countries and followed our ancestors to the new world of America. These traditions fit well with the trappers, hunters, guides, descendants of early Indian fighters and loggers of our North Country. For many generations stories were traded at the country store, local taverns or lumber camps, giving friends and neighbors a good chuckle.

This was long before the days of electricity, telephones and all the modern conveniences we have today. That was when folks actually talked to each other instead of staring at the little box in their hand! Remember as kids we read about the great woodsman, Paul Bunyan and Babe his blue ox?

Two of the most popular "tall tales" tellers in the Sacandaga area were father and son. Abner and Bill Greenfield. Eastern New York State and the North Country were the exact places to attract these stories.

Abner, descended from Scottish immigrants, was born in Edinburg, October 3, 1802, the son of John and Esther Greenfield. He was a farmer, woodsman and hunter. He married Susanna Wadsworth in 1832, settling in West Day. Abner and Susanna had 5 children with son, Bill being the oldest.

Abner would visit the store at West Day whenever necessary supplies were needed at home that his family couldn't raise on their own land or what Abner couldn't acquire by hunting or fishing. While there he would have a ready audience of the old fellows sitting around the pot-bellied stove and before you knew it the stories would fly.

Abner took his gun one day to go hunting partridges near Mud Lake. He walked and walked until he reached the lake and decided to sit down and rest. Suddenly he spied a dozen partridges perched on a big pine limb overhanging the water. He poised his gun, ready to shoot the largest bird when an idea came to him. If he shot one bird the others would fly away; but if he shot the limb and split it, the birds' toes would be caught in the crack and he could get all twelve.

Abner shot the limb, caught all the birds by their toes then had to wade out for the limb, which had fallen into the lake. Water filled his boots and pants legs but he retrieved the limb with the captured game and wallowed toward shore. When he climbed out of the water, he found his pant legs were full of fish. The weight of the fish was so great that a button popped off his suspenders, flew forty rods and killed a rabbit.

Abner was trapping muskrats —with little luckone spring day on the Sacandaga. He couldn't get them into his traps; the little animals would simply sit and eye him with curiosity. Abner fired his gun, then grabbed the "rats" and held them in place so they could be hit by the bullets.

One other spring day Abner was fishing on Sand Lake. The trout were jumping like crazy but wouldn't take the bait. Suddenly it turned bitterly cold and a glaze of ice formed over the lake's surface. Abner found that the fish had frozen in mid-leap with their heads buried in the ice and their bodies sticking into the air. All he had to do was walk on the ice kicking off their heads to catch a nice mess of trout.

Abner was on the road to Stony Creek one day when his dog began to bark. He quickly raised his gun sighting it on a huge buck. He pulled the trigger but the gun misfired. Abner looked down the gun and saw the bullet coming. He had to get that gun barrel down fast and back on target in order to bag that deer.

One day Abner and Bill Snow were looking down on Day Center from Bill's place up on the hill. Bill said to Abner "can you see the church steeple in Day Center"? Abner replied, of course I can", "but Abner, can you see that fly on the church steeple"? Abner shaded his eyes and looked for a long, long time. Finally he drew a deep breath and sighed, "no, but I know he's there, I can hear him walking"!

A neighbor once found Abner cutting wood near Harris Lake in the Town of Hope. "Abner, tell me a good lie", the neighbor begged. "Can't", replied Abner. "Haven't got time. My brother just cut his leg over in the woodlot and I'm on my way to Northville for a doctor."

The alarmed neighbor hurried to the woodlot



and found Abner's brother hale and hearty and busy cutting wood.

One day Abner started to hunt without loading his gun. On the way through the woods near Northville to his favorite hunting grounds he suddenly met up with a black bear. Having no time to load he dropped the gun at the foot of the nearest tree and shinned up to where he hoped was a safe spot of safety. Then the bear lumbered over to the foot of the tree, picked up the shotgun with its front paws, looked it over carefully, reared back on its hind legs, gazed up at Abner and stuck out a paw for the treed man to toss him down a shotgun shell.

Abner always allowed that the winters in Northville were so cold that he had to prop a broom handle under the thermometer so the mercury could fall far enough to tell the truth.

Probably one of the worst experiences Abner ever had when hunting bear happened one day when the bear became pretty upset over Abner's annoying him and it would seem that before it was all over, the very angry bear had torn out much of Abner's insides. This was a very dangerous situation. Abner hurriedly gathered them up,

shoved them back in the long deep incision, holding his hand over his stomach as he hurried home. His wife had just finished killing a sheep when Abner reached their small cabin near Tennantville, and the sheep's innards were still all over the chopping block. As he reached the yard, the pressure was too much for Abner. Gasping, he fell against the block and out came his innards once again. Together Abner and his wife managed to gather them up and sew them inside. It was a close call for Abner but being a strong woodsman, he recovered.

That wasn't the end of the incident however. The following spring, his wife gave birth to twin lambs.



Funding a Fire Company is an extremely expensive proposition. There are extensive regulations we must follow. Each succeeding year things become more complex. The equipment and training we undergo today, would barely be recognizable for someone who entered the fire service forty years ago.

The Edinburg Community is frankly very fortunate to have a group of volunteers willing to make the dedicated commitment required to protect their neighbors. In this report,

I intend to give you are brief snapshot of the current expense to equipment JUST ONE interior level fire fighter.

While there are many duties you could volunteer for in our Fire Company, the job the public is most familiar with, is that of the interior fire fighter. The person assigned to enter into the building, rescue its occupants, and extinguish the blaze. Naturally, these folks require the best

possibly protective gear, as mandated by the State. And this speaks to a very pricey proposition. The following is an itemized list of what the Fire Company must provide, and the associated approximate costs. I think you will really be taken back.

Helmet: \$300 Thermal hood: \$100

Coat: \$2,000 Pants: \$1,500 Boots: \$500 Gloves: \$100

Air pack w/ air cylinder bottle: \$9,000

Two way radio: \$4,500

Total Cost: \$18,000 (per interior fire fighter)

We also have annual expenses regarding mandatory State and Federal trainings. These courses are essential to maintain required certifications.

As much as these figures might be shocking, the really impressive numbers have to do with how much EVFC saves our Community, because we are in fact an all volunteer outfit. The average base line salary for a fire fighter in New York State

according to the job placement service Indeed, is \$62,131. You can see how expensive this quickly becomes if the Community had to support even just ten fire fighters 24 / 7/ 365, which would really only provide for two individuals per shift.

Your support and understanding goes a long way to make the EVFC happen.





## **Flower Talk**

Sally Peck, of the Flower Barn

"If you would be happy for a lifetime, grow Chrysanthemums." (Chinese philosopher)

Chrysanthemums, Mums (as I will refer to them) or chrysanths, are flowering plants in the Asteraceae family. In 1753 Karl Linnaeus, a Swedish botanist, combined the Greek words chrysos (Gold) with anthemon (flower) giving them their name. The earliest illustrations of Mums show them as yellow daisy-like flowers. They are divided into two basic groups, garden hardy and exhibition. Garden hardy are capable of wintering in most northern latitudes with an abundance of small blooms, they withstand the elements and require little assistance. Exhibition varieties are temperamental and require staking

The Mum was first cultivated in China as a


flowering herb and is described in writings from 15th Century BC. Pottery has been found depicting the Mum. As an herb, it was believed to have the power of life. Every part of the plant from the roots to the leaves were used as medicine, tea, a festive drink and herbs. The ancient Chinese name for Mum is "Chu." The Chinese city of Chu-Hsien (which means

Chrysanthemum City) was named to honor the flower. It is a symbol of autumn, the flower of the ninth moon as well as the birth flower for November. People drank Chrysanthemum wine on the ninth day of the ninth lunar month to prolong their lives during the Han dynasty.

Around 400 A.D. the Mum was brought to Japan by Buddhist monks. The emperor loved them so much they sat upon a Mum throne and later adopted the flower (Kikus in Japanese) as the crest and official seal of the Emperor (picture on top left), called "Ichimonjiginu.". (image top left). If you want to celebrate a 'Festival of Happiness', go to Japan on National Chrysanthemum Day.

In 1798 the Mum entered America when Colonel John Stevens imported a cultivated variety known as 'Dark Purple' from England to grow attractions at Elysian Fields (believed to

be the site of the first organized baseball game) in Hoboken, NJ. Now the Mum is the largest commercially produced potted flower due to its

ease of cultivation and capability to bloom on schedule. All this and their artistic allure make mums favored by floral arrangers and are the 2nd most popular flower, next only to the rose. The mum is referred to as "The Queen of Fall Flowers".

Ancient growers wouldn't recognize modern mums. Modern Mums are showier than their wild relatives, though some Mums still resemble daisies a wide range of floral colors, shapes, and sizes have been developed. Mums flower heads are made up of tiny individual flowers called florets. There are two types of florets on Mums—Ray Florets (the petals) are considered imperfect flowers, because they only possess the female parts. The other is Disc Florets (the center of the bloom), they are considered perfect flowers because

they have both male and female parts and can reproduce.

As a landscaping plant, the Mum makes a beautiful Fall display for the garden, providing one

last hoorah before the cold of winter arrives. With skill and artistry, different effects can be achieved, even when only a small growing area is available. Some Mums can be trained into small bonsai style, sculptured shapes or trees- it's really quite amazing. Longwood Gardens (Kennett Square, PA) and the NY Botanical Garden (Bronx) have annual displays demonstrating this. As with all gardening efforts, it's not luck or the 'green thumb' that achieves results, but rather hard work and dirty fingernails.

As for culinary and holistic uses (use organically grown), the Chinese have been using this flower in traditional Chinese medicine for centuries. Yellow or white chrysanthemum flowers (C.morifolium) are boiled to make tea for

sipping, as a relaxant, to help relieve congestion and strengthen the lungs. The leaves are used as greens, especially in Chinese cuisine. The flowers may be added to broth, for example in Snake Meat Soup to enhance the aroma or as a garnish. In Korea, a rice wine flavored with Mums is called gukhwaju.

A healthy fact to benefit everyone is that Mum plants have been shown to reduce indoor air pollution by the NASA Clean Air Study. Also, according to Feng Shui (the idea that our home should represent who we are inside), this flower is believed to bring happiness. So this November, say 'Hail to the Queen' (of flowers that is).





Saturday, September 2nd will also be the last Farmers' Market of the season in the Waterfront


Park. The market will be open 10-2.

Police Chief Rick Richardson reports that the total calls handled by the Village Police Department for July 2023 was 113 (this does not include complaints handled by FCSO and NYSP when NPD Officer's were not on duty). He continues to advance the department forward with renovations being done in the Court house to accommodate the PD and upgrades of necessary equipment. Chief Richardson reported two vehicle thefts and one burglary in the Village and he urged residents to keep their doors locked and to report any suspicious behavior.

The Village finalized and submitted a Department of State (DOS) Local Waterfront Revitalization Program grant application for funding to construct a safe route for pedestrians

and bicyclists at the spillway area on South Main Street. Awards for that grant cycle will be announced toward the end of the year. We will keep you posted as further details become available.

that will be distributed for the event.

At their August meeting, the Village Board began the steps to modify the current Village Code that requires property owners to keep the sidewalks fronting their property free of snow and ice. There is a code in place already but as it was very vague, the Board felt more definition was needed. The recommended changes to the current code would require that the sidewalks be cleared of snow and/or treated for ice within 48 hours after accumulation. Failure to clear the snow and/ or treat ice as required by the law would result in the Village performing the task and billing the property owner. As this is an amendment to the current code, there will be a Public Hearing scheduled in the future for property owners to voice their concerns. It is anticipated that the Public Hearing will be conducted at the October meeting. Public notice will be posted around the community and in the official newspaper of the Village when the hearing is set.

The next meeting of the Board of Trustees will be on September 12th at 7:00 p.m.

#### FRAXTURED FACTS

I was talking to my bird friends today, and I really do mean talking. I've always liked birds and have made it a point to feed them, particularly over the Winter months. Yet during "The COVID Time" this relationship took on a much more important meaning for me. Living alone much of that time, my interactions with others were rather limited. My local visitors were for the most part, feathered. They never once asked as to whether I had all my inoculations. Which of course I did, even rabies (long story). In fact, they asked very little of me, when we briefly spoke. You're thinking now, he must be a bit of a nut if he thinks he can talk with birds. Yet I tell you, you absolutely can, provided you take the time. And during COVID, unlike toilet paper, time was the one thing I had plenty of.

Over a period of several months, every time I put out Sunflower seeds or Suet, I would stay on the deck for several minutes and quickly emit the same five notes, as high up in my register I could consistently go. It was not all that long before





they associated my Call with food and would start showing up in the trees, making all kinds of racket. Yet, as the same thing kept consistently happening, I came to recognize was not racket. They were talking to me!

Over the Summer months they really just visit, not staying too long. This morning I put some food out not having fed them for a few weeks. I heard nothing in the trees beforehand, but decided to let out a few Calls and see what might happen. After maybe thirty seconds I could hear a Nuthatch answering back. We chatted back and forth, and about a minute later it showed up at the feeder. After a few more minutes of Calling a Chickadee flew straight down my driveway and landed in a Pine about eight feet above me. I think it was telling me about how her Summer had gone so far, at least that is what I imagined. I asked about the kids, but got back about the same response. I really have no idea what these birds are saying, yet I seem have collected a bunch of friends to include: Tit Mice, Downy and Hairy Woodpeckers. I sit on my deck call them, and they come and feed next to me. I no longer try to get them to eat out of my hand as I think that is a bit presumptuous.

Some birds are a little more standoffish than others. I have had the same pair of Phoebe Birds nest under my deck for the past three years, two broods a season. Yet they act more like short term renters - very little communication. They like to sit on my furniture in the yard and swoop down to catch bugs, and that's a good thing. Trouble is, they poop on my chairs. So I put a four foot pole up for them to sit on. They immediately took to it. I thought we had reached an understanding. Yet in a few days the Phoebe Birds were back to pooping on my chairs. I have a daughter named Phoebe. You'd think that would of given me an in.t

To my Edinburg Friends:

## **BACKYARD WILDLIFE**

I looked at the large feline, her tiger stripes and mottled fur resembling my pet cats. There was a wild look in her eyes, her body movements in slow

motion never taking her eyes off of mine. I was looking at a wild animal, no doubt about it. Then she was gone in a flash. It wasn't a bobcat, it was a housecat. Over the years a feral stray cat near our home kept having kittens. We ended up with several of them. One little black female never quite tamed and after a scratchy, hissy examination left the veterinarians bloody. She eventually disappeared and like the mama cat lived a hollow existence always spooked and wary. The mama cat would hang under the birdfeeders at night with the grey fox and raccoons eating seeds, spiders, mice and flying squirrels. Like the wildlife around us this feral cat knew well that the

backyard yielded possible nourishment.

You may be wondering why talk about feral cats? They aren't wildlife; even the "experts" say they are not wildlife. Well try to trap or pick one up. You might as well try to pick up a raccoon.

So speaking of feral cats what is the distinction





between feral and stray cats. A wandering cat could just be someone's pet left outdoors. A stray cat is a cat no longer having regular human contact through abandonment or becoming lost and may start to avoid humans.

Eventually that cat will become feral or wild and the kittens born will be feral. Domestic cat kittens need very early human handling to avoid becoming fearful and aloof. Most feral cats will only live 2-4 years as compared to indoor pets which can live over 15 years. To survive in the wild is difficult with constant predation from coyotes, fishers, and birds of prey not to mention disease like rabies and parasites. They are not a native animal to our ecosystem here and are actually considered an invasive species. Unneutered domestic cats have a high birth rate and as nonnative felines do impact the wildlife environment. Studies in other countries are finding feral cats that survive and reproduce are getting larger.

Last year I was examining my field camera shots and I saw a shadow or a difference near a tree, nothing distinct but as I enlarged the image I saw it, a bobcat, the spots running down the legs and a chiseled face barely visible. This past winter there were tracks behind the house and huge leaps



over 8 feet. Bobcats are presently the only native feline in the Adirondacks. They are rarely seen and prefer terrain that is deep forest, rocky with large areas of wild. The lynx is slightly larger and grayer, rare here due to a lack of their primary food source, snowshoe hare. On the even larger side are the occasional sightings of mountain lions. I had mentioned in a past article about an outlier mountain lion that did cross through our area. They say that if raised by humans mountain lions would be no different than our pet cats, that our pet cats are just small mountain lions. So let's love our little mountain lions responsibly understanding that they are best nurtured and cared for as pets and not left to the wild.





# Sun, Sand and Swaying in the Breeze!

I am sitting here feeling sad. Our 1997 Jeep is showing some wear and it is time to get something new. We bought that Jeep after we came back from our first Key West trip. When we went down in 2006 we only had our bicycles with us. While it was fine for a short trip we knew we needed something more! A month after our return, Billy found our little red Jeep at a car dealer in Wilton. It was in great condition , reasonably priced with 46,000 miles on it. We bought a hitch for it and flat towed it, for 15 years, to Key West.

We have had so many adventures in that little Jeep. The one thing we did not realize about Jeep Wranglers, especially the older ones, they are not comfortable for driving long distances or at high rates of speed. It was perfect for the Keys. The speed limit is 25-45 mph with a few passing zones that allow 55 mph for 180 miles. One year we had to head back to NY early to attend a funeral. We could not get a flight out of the Key West

so we drove the RV to a campground, near Fort Lauderdale. We were glad we had the jeep for the 45 minute drive to the airport. Well we had a ride that I will never forget. Getting onto to Interstate 95, in the Jeep, was nothing short of daunting. I felt like we were riding in the Flintstone mobile. Billy had the gas pedal to the floor trying to gain as much speed as we could. Tractor trailers and early morning commuters were driving 70-80 miles per hour. Our little four cylinder engine was not made for that kind of driving. It was one of the scariest rides of our lives and we were thankful to get to the airport safely.

Everyone loved to ride in that jeep. When we pick people up at the airport, they are so happy to climb in and feel the ocean breezes and warm air. Lucas and Acadia love climbing up the rear wheels and jumping onto the back seat. Actually, many of our adult friends do too. Some people , however, did not appreciate our unexpected "adventures". We have been caught in many unexpected rainstorms over the years. Gale force winds and rain hitting you sideways is cold and uncomfortable any time of the year. Some people even disliked the gentle rain and breezes. Billy and I would laugh and say welcome to the Keys where life is always an adventure. We also had a few occasions when someone threw up in the front seat and the vomit went flying onto the passenger in the rear. Big Hoss got sick one day and Acadia





got covered in puke. She was a trooper and took it better than most adults. We have also "frozen" our butts of when our heater decided not to work. Fortunately we rarely needed it. The original radio worked for 16 out of the 17 years. That was amazing since it was rained on many times. A few years ago it started acting up. We never knew if it was going to work or not and if it did what stations we were going to get. Some days we were lucky and all of the stations worked. Sometimes only one or two worked and toward the end we laughed and cheered on the days that it even worked at all. Last winter we finally bought a new radio.

We have met many people who asked about the Jeep over the years. People were always amazed it was a 1997. Moreover, several men were shocked that I could drive a standard. Last year a bird laid an egg on the floor when when we left it overnight in a parking garage. It rolled out when I got in the Jeep. That was a first for us. We have been "ducked" often and I would always pass the duck on! In March we found ourselves stuck, behind a garbage truck, on a side street. Boy was that stinky. When we got to finally move, a man was walking toward us on the street. He asked us to wait for a minute and said he wanted to get something for us from his Jeep. It was worth it because he came back with a little red Jeep that looked exactly like ours. That little toy rode around on the dashboard and no one ever took it.

This week we spent three days looking at used Jeeps. None looked as good as our 1997. We prayed about whether or not we were going to keep the Jeep or look for something new. We handed it over to God which I should have done from the beginning. I admit to being stubborn







A book, however, can be consumed smoothly. A thought-provoking, well chosen book is so worthwhile, a springboard to new ideas, new perspectives and possibilities. That new idea could solve a problem, invigorate a business, inspire or improve a life. It can make you a citizen of new frontiers and broader realms.

One inspiring example is from AMERICA The BEAUTIFUL by Dr. Ben Carson. The doctor wrote about his conversations with a self-made



He said he saw what people had need of and provided it for them. His success was based on his observant nature and willingness to follow through. 

# Patriot Day - United States Holiday

Patriot Day, a holiday observed in the United States on September 11 to commemorate the lives of those who died in the 2001 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City and the Pentagon in Virginia and those who perished when the hijacked United Airlines Flight 93 crashed in Pennsylvania. The holiday also recognizes those who died attempting to rescue people trapped by the attacks.

By a joint resolution of the U.S. Congress on Dec. 18, 2001, September 11 was designated as Patriot Day. The resolution calls for the president of the United States to issue a yearly proclamation requesting that all U.S. flags be flown at half-staff. Further, Americans are asked to honour the dead with a moment of silence beginning at 8:46 am, Eastern Standard Time, the time that the first airplane struck the World Trade Center, and to respect the ceremonies of remembrance when they are conducted. Prior to passage of the resolution, several other names had been proposed for the day, such as the National Day of Remembrance and the National Day of Prayer and Remembrance.





#### Daniel Kenneth "Ken" Johnsen December 24th, 1927 - July 25th, 2023


Ken Johnsen died at the age of  $95 \, \frac{1}{2}$  on July 25th, 2023 at home in the Town of Day, NY with his beloved wife Gail by his side, and family and loved ones nearby.

Ken, the first born child of Norwegian immigrants, was born in Brooklyn, NY. After a few years in Brooklyn, Ken's parents moved their growing family out to Bayport (Long Island), NY where Ken eventually graduated from Bayport High School. Ken went on to graduate from Houghton College, then seminary school in Johnson City, NY, and became a Baptist Missionary and Minister. At Houghton, Ken met and married his first wife Ethel. Ken and Ethel had two children.

Ken spent 17 years working as a missionary in Venezuela, a country and people who became his second home and family. Ken flew his float plane from New York to Venezuela, island hopping through the Caribbean. His float plane allowed him to visit remote villages and towns, often bringing much needed medical and dental assistance and supplies. He built schools, churches, and homes.

Ken helped found and build the First Evangelical Baptist Church of Puerto Ordaz, Venezuela (Primera Iglesia Evangelica Bautista de Puerto Ordaz) in a town of 250 people (founded in 1952), which is a city of over 1,000,000 people now. P.I.E.B.P.O is still an active church and just

celebrated the 60th anniversary of it's founding. Ken developed lifelong friendships in Venezuela that endure to this day.



After returning to the United States (Rochester, NY) in 1967 Ken and Ethel divorced. Ken left mission work and the ministry. He began working on his Masters degree at the University of Rochester, and taught Spanish classes both there and at SUNY Brockport.

During this time he met the love of his life, Gail Perkins, a fellow graduate student and Teaching Assistant at the University of Rochester. Ken and Gail married on March 21st, 1970. Their union produced three sons.

After obtaining his Master's Degree in linguistics, Ken left the University of Rochester to work as an agent for New York Life Insurance Company, a career he had from his early 40's into his early 90's. At the pinnacle of his career with New York Life. Ken was one of their top 100 agents worldwide (out of over 12,000 at the time).

At the age of 90, Ken wrote and published his autobiography, "Coffee In My Sock (and other adventures of a



missionary in Venezuela)". Reading the book is just like sitting around his dinner table, listening to him recount an adventure.

Ken was a person who couldn't sit still. He was an intelligent, hard working, kind, and loving soul. He was always building, or creating, thinking, or planning his next project. He built multiple homes, 2 hovercrafts, numerous boats (motor, sail, and iceboats), furniture, and other fun contraptions. Even in his 90's, Ken would still visit his sons at their jobsites and help put up trusses, hammer some nails, or let them know if something wasn't plumb. He had a lifelong love of flying, of sailing, of iceboating, and of traveling. He loved being surrounded by the many people dear to him.

Ken is pre-deceased by his youngest son Toby, his parents Daniel and Ingebjorg, his brother Roy, and his ex-wife Ethel. He is survived by his sister Sylvia, his wife Gail, his son Mark (Nancy), daughter Becky (Bobby), son Bruce, son Ohi (Hanah), and daughter in law Janet, his granddaughters Chrissy and Shannon, and Ariel, and grandsons Alex and Magnus. Ken was laid to rest in the family plot at Prospect Hill Cemetery in Northville, NY on Friday, July 28th, 2023.

# "Nuggets and News" from the Town of Lake Luzerne

Historian, Pam Morin

For the good will and benefit of all, let me reprint a back story of our Lt. Col. Benjamin C. Butler.

Lawyer, Entrepreneur, Surveyor, Editor, Churchman, Politician, served in the Military—And Lt. Col. Benjamin C. Butler was all of these. Born in 1821 in Oxford, N.Y to James Clapp and Julia Hyde Butler Clapp. His mother died when he was twelve years old. Leaving five children and a very unhappy father he lived with

his grandparents Dr. Benjamin Butler and Hannah Avery Butler. Their only son Benjamin had died in infancy. Dr. Butler wanting an heir adopted his grandson and his name was changed from Benjamin Butler Clapp to Benjamin Clapp Butler in the NY State Legislature. He was educated at Oxford Academy and went to Saratoga and completed his studies in the Legal Profession. For several vears he was editor and proprietor of the Saratoga Sentinel. He came to Luzerne in 1845. Served as Supervisor of the Town of Luzerne, and a member of the New York State Assembly,

organized the Warren County Agricultural Organization H worked diligently to get the Delaware and Hudson Railroad to Hadley.

When the Civil War started, he volunteered and started to raise a regiment and enlisted more than half of the men in the 93rd New York Volunteer and served as a Lt. Col. During the entire War it is reported that he said if he lived thru the War, he would work on building a church. He worked at speaking engagements and received donations from guests of the Wayside Inn toward the building of St. Mary's Church Episcopal

Church. The Church has many beautiful windows including one for the Civil War. Col. Butler loved the beauty of Lake Luzerne and promoted it in many brochures and books. He also had a dream of building a hotel. Much of the land around the lake was owned by the Butlers, Clapps, Newberry's and the Pierponts and also from Summit Place to Pierpont Road. In 1869 he started the building of the Wayside Inn. The main structure was modeled after the architecture of Luzerne. Col Butler died in 1882 in Utica, NY and is buried in the Luzerne Cemetery. - Historian, Bea Evens, 2015



NUGGET: The architect for the St. Mary's Church, Lake Luzerne, NY was Jacob Wrey Mould. In addition, he was one of three architects that were responsible for the early development of our beloved New York City's "Central Park". To this day, Mould's sculptured reliefs, tile work and structures in the Park enthrall visitors. Central Park is of our country's most important works of American art. – Frank R. Kowsky, Architecture Historian

#### "Stones from the Creek"

Anyone in Stony Creek that has tried to dig a hole, plant a garden, put a stake in the ground or anything that has to do with our soil will tell you very quickly why we are called Stony Creek. Some look like little stones, but you quickly realize that it is just the tip of a bigger stone. And others you can pick up from the yard so to be able to mow only to find that more have grown overnight. You get the idea. There are really interesting stones in our town, you just have to dig a little bit, and if you hear a click get the crow bar out, or better yet, ask me and I will do the digging for you.

Let me tell you a little bit about our history:

The town of Stony Creek, about 87 square miles, is in the southwestern corner of Warren County. It

was in the original Town of Thurman, in 1813, The Town of Warrensburg was "split off" and the area left was named Athol. On November 3, 1852, Athol was split into the towns of Stony Creek and Thurman. So, if you are looking for anything prior to 1852 for Stony Creek, census records, land records etc. they will be found in Athol.

Some of our first settlers were James Ferguson, John, George, and William Riley, William and Alexander Murray, Hugh McMillen, (who bought land from the Riley's and he is said to come to America to fight for Burgoyne), and John and James Cameron both coming from Scotland. The Cameron's were one of the earliest families on the river. (James is said to have settled just above the

present Stony Creek-Thurman town line in 1776).

In 1852, when we became the Town of Stony Creek, a man named John P Bowman and his wife Jennie moved here to our town from Vermont. His occupation was a tanner. When he arrived, he found water power, plenty of hemlock bark to use in the tanning process, but few other facilities or conveniences. The town at that time was new and sparsely settled; the land uneven, very stony and not adapted to farming pursuits. After a lot of hard work, Bowman's tannery became one of the best in the state. Its capacity was 40,000 sides of leather a year. Besides the tannery proper, there were extensive bark sheds, storage buildings, a carpenter

and repair shop, a large boarding house and houses for sixteen families. He had also built a pleasant residence, barns and carriage house.

Starting with John Bowman's business enterprise, quite a lot of growth and development occurred in the surrounding area. In fact, a significant village had grown up and now churches, schoolhouses, and stores have been carved out of the unbroken forest that existed when he began operations. The fact is that the tanneries themselves spawned whole hamlets and towns. In 1885, Warren County Historian H.P. Smith observed that "It is a noteworthy fact that Wevertown, North Creek and Creek Center in Stony Creek date the origin of their existence as villages immediately subsequent to the erection of the tanneries that now keep them alive."



Lumbering and allied industries were the main source of income in the early days. As the town grew, other businesses were founded, including: a peg factory, broom handle factory, woodenware factory and cooper's shop. Many residents farmed for their own sustenance. At one time there were 5 churches, 3 post offices and 3 general stores in the town.

Now-So back to the stones, "if you see a stone wall, a stone chimney, stones in a pile, I hope that you think of our little town of Stony Creek."

And like I tell anyone that asks me.... where are you from?.... I say "Stony Creek"....no E in Stony but there are 2 in Creek. Till next time.

#### VIEW FROM THE BOW.....

If there any memories out there anyone would like to share please find "Hadley Historian" on facebook or Town of Hadley website and tell your stories and read other people's recollections.

1973 . I was 11 years old and in 5th grade. That May the new middle school had opened. Brand spankin new! The smell of new carpet and fresh polished gym floor filled the air. Our lockers were orange, the first time 5th graders ever had lockers, and we were just like the big kids. Mine was not far from the new quad, I think #79. I was always so afraid I'd forget my combination over vacations. It was the end of the school year but everything seemed so brand new and we all couldn't wait to come back as 6th graders. But summer was first

I had a new pink bike with a white basket, almost every day I either rode from my house to my Aunt's or to my friend's Amy or Melanie's house, sometimes with my little dog Mitzy riding in the basket. We would all go to playground in the morning and the beach in the afternoon. My sisters and I with all the neighborhood kid's would gather at the beach until 5 o'clock. We would swim out to

the buoys play Marco Polo, sitting on a cute boy's shoulder's and having sandwiches mom had packed for us. She never worried too much, other moms were always around to keep track of us. And the life guards were their swinging their keys keeping us all in line.

The end of July everything changed. All of a sudden there were police cars all over, road blocks set up at the drug store corner at the 4 corners in Hadley. They were stopping cars and searching trunks. You used to have to get out every time to unlock the trunk, check the back seats, no popping the trunk back then! The State Troopers alongside our town cops stood in a solid line with shotguns held across their chests. It was terrifying for all of us in our little town nestled in the mountains where we had felt safe. What had shattered our world?

A murderer was on the loose!! On July 20th a body of a young man, 22 of Massachusetts had been found just off route 8 in Weavertown. His girlfriend, was missing. An intense search began. After a week no leads had been found.

On the 29th another attack was reported. Four college students camping off route 30 in Wells were tied up and held captive for a couple days being terrorized by a mad man named Robert Garrow.



One of the four was dead. The manhunt started after the first murder and intensified after the 29th. Road blocks were set up all over the place. Every main road in the Adirondacks had armed officers stopping cars checking trunks asking anyone for any help. Up to 3000 officers will join this manhunt before it's over.

For twelve days the fear prevailed over the mountains. We were told not to go anywhere alone and we could see real fear in our parent's eyes.

An accused rapists and violent criminal who had been suspected in other disappearance of girls



near Syracuse months before. Now he was in the Adirondacks in between Wells and Speculator. He had managed to elude police in the Speculator Wells area by a lot of lucky breaks on his part. The camp he broke into had a wig and clothing. With the stolen car he drove through a barricade full speed but because of the wig they thought he was some hippie kid with drugs in the car. But it was Garrow. He fled to Mineville where he was later caught.

But that was not the last of him, we would find out 5 years late, 1978.

After his conviction he had lobbied to get transferred to Fishkill in the Catskills. One evening on evening bed check Garrow was discovered missing. The most notorious murderer in New York on the loose again. The road blocks went up. The small towns were again struck with fear. So many questions; could he get away like he almost did last time.

When I went on a babysitting jobs that weekend I didn't go alone my friend Amy came with me. Sean the boy I was watching recalls how frightened we all were. It was unlikely he would be in our area but we were still fearful. There were no 24 hour loops of news with people posting updates. There was no social media, just party lines and the town gossip. Not knowing was as bad as too much information today.

The authorities were eager to resolve this because of the last dragnet he eluded five years earlier. But because there were officers that worked

the last manhunt something was known about how Garrow operates. Staying close to the road, keeping an eye on search. not leaving immediate area too soon. The search intensified close to prison and after 3 days their diligence paid off he was spotted in the brush. He had had a gun, 5 shots were fired, an officer was hit but not fatally. However four of the nineteen shots officers fired, hit their mark, killing the fugitive. Garrows reign of terror finally over.

This defiantly changed how we all thought about our safety. More phone calls to check in when you get to where you're going, don't talk to strangers,

don't walk home alone. Not that a sixteen year old ever listens! I remember calling home from pay phones, one at Hilltop grocery and the other at the Real estate office downtown to let my Aunt know I was on my way .We all began to be afraid just a little bit. Now. We are kept in a constant state of fear by design. Unescapable we are lead to believe, oh wait you don't have to open that app, you can turn that TV off. Go outside, it's not a crime to seek Peace for your mind.


