



Cell Service Meeting Held by Assemblyman Stec in Edinburg

Assemblyman Dan Stec has been working on trying to help us get cell phone coverage for the area. He has held several meetings over the last few months with state and county officials. On February 5th he held a meeting at the Edinburg Town Hall to discuss the need for service for public safety as well as communication, economic development and the effect on tourism. A two hour discussion was held identifying needs, the current infrastructure in place and what would need to be added. They are now trying to gather inventory information on where fiber optic cable currently exists so we can tell what exactly what is needed. There may get some grant money available but the guidelines are not yet clear. There were 20 invited attendees that included regional emergency services representatives, Congressional, State and Local elected officials or their representatives as well as

the Saratoga County Chairman of the Board and County Administrator. The hope is to identify the exact needs, a willing carrier and source for federal and state funding.

Recycling Report

John Olmstead has reported that in 2015 Edinburg recycled 96 tons of bulk metal, 20 tons of corrugated cardboard and collected 683.67 tons of garbage. This does not include one to two truckloads of comingled recyclables each week, leaves that were composted and tires. In addition there was a large quantity of goods that went into and out of the reuse area.

Town Beach in 2016

Last summer the town beach and swimming area received minimal use. Many days there were no swimmers at all and the 2 employees had nothing to do and spent the days simply sitting. The lifeguard from last year is entering the military this summer and we would have to find a new lifeguard. The beach was given a waiver by the health department last year for a wading only beach. This year, if we wish to permit the beach, we will have to hire an engineering firm to survey the lake bottom in the swimming area as part of the New York State Department of Health permit requirements. We have checked with the insurance company and we will save approximately \$1213 if we do not have a swimming beach and we properly sign the area as no swimming. The park can remain open without swimming and the park only premium will be \$79.20. Last year we spent \$7374.01 on wages and \$1433.54 on supplies and portajohn rental. Total direct cost to be open for

the season is \$8807.55. In addition we will have to spend several thousands of dollars for the engineering survey of the lake bottom. The Board, after careful thought and discussion has decided to open the park portion as usual, without

an attendant, but have no swimming. The Village of Northville said there is no fee to use their beach; people just have to get a permit from the Village Clerk so there will be an alternative if people wish to swim

Emergency Replacement of Highway Garage Furnaces

One of the two furnaces in the highway garage had a hole in the heat exchanger and was emitting fumes into the building. The furnaces were original equipment and over 40 years old. The situation was unsafe and emergency repairs were needed. We had both furnaces replaced last week.

Highway Department Ten Hour Days

The Highway Department will begin working 4 ten hour days next week for the summer.



*Cabbage is an excellent source of vitamin C. Foods rich in vitamin C help to strengthen the immune system as well as help the body develop resistance to chronic inflammation.

*Cabbage is rich in essential vitamins such as vitamin B5, vitamin B6, and vitamin B1. B vitamins are involved in energy production, functioning of the nervous system and other numerous bodily processes.

*Cabbage contains as adequate amount of minerals, which are important for daily well being and functioning.

*Cabbage is a very good source of vitamin K. Vitamin K gives you healthy bones and has as established role in limiting neuronal brain damage in patients afflicted with Alzheimer's disease.

DID YOU KNOW THAT—

Beecher Creek, part 2

Last month I gave you the origin of Beecher Creek in Tennantville and started the list of businesses which depended on water power for their existence and were located along the creek at various times.

Coming down Tennantville Road I had reached the area behind my home on the "big creek". Here a large sawmill dam and mill pond were built by Aseph Cole. No exact dates are available but Aseph possibly ran the mill from the 1830's to the 1860's. In about 1865 Aseph, a widower, moved to Michigan with his sons and the mill was taken over by his son-in-law Holden Tennant who had married Aseph's daughter, Lura. Holden was the oldest son of Peleg Tennant who had started the large woodenware mill at Tennantville.

As we travel on down Tennantville Road we connect with the Airport Road intersection. A

quarter- mile down Airport we come to the bridgeonce called Barker's Bridge-that crosses over Beecher. Immediately crossing at the bridge-to your left in the bank-is the site of Newman Barker's Broom Handle and Stoneboat mill. Just at the top of the grade stands the big white house-still in use-where Newman and his wife, the former Anna Wadsworth, raised their family.

Newman was the grandson of early Edinburgh settler and Revolutionary War veteran Jesse Barker. He probably established his business in the late 1840's. By 1855 Newman was manufacturing broom handles-a very important commodity long before the days of vacuum cleaners. He had invested \$800. in real estate and another \$100 in tools and machinery. He had 353 basswood logs on hand in the mill yard; annually producing 106,000 broom handles valued at \$1272. Ten years later in 1865 Newman employed 2 men; had invested another \$400 with 4000 ft. basswood logs worth \$500 lying in the mill yard. 70,000 broom handles valued at \$1120. had been produced annually.

By 1870 Newman had \$3000 invested in his

business, employing 3 men with a payroll of \$600. The mill operated 8 months of the year. In 1870 Barker's mill was producing lumber as well as broom handles. The mill operated with 2 water turbines; one 15hp and one 20hp. The mill had four different saws and two lathes. The lathes were used to shape the round broom handles. Raw materials in the yard consisted of 1000 ft. of hemlock logs worth \$1300; 100 ft. basswood logs valued at \$200. Lumber sawn that year produced 25000 ft. of hemlock worth \$2000 and 15000 ft. basswood worth \$240. The mill yard had 25000 ft. of basswood on hand worth \$400 for broom handles with 50000 handles produced worth \$800.

Newman was also well known for making stoneboats at his mill. A stoneboat was like a small wooden, flat bottomed boat on runners that could be pulled behind horses or oxen. The boat was used to clear fields of stone and rocks. The boat would be filled with stone; then towed to a stone wall or stone heap to be disposed of. At one time a Newman Barker stoneboat was on exhibit at the Adirondack Museum in Blue Mountain Lake.



sometime prior to 1875.

The next water-powered mill we find located on Beecher Creek is where the creek flows alongside Pucker Street entering Beecher Hollow. Just above the stone-arched bridge at the North Shore/Military Roads intersection was a mill pond and dam that supplied water power to two different mills downstream. Just below the stone bridge on the south bank of the creek once stood a large building believed to have been built in 1802 by Azariah Ellithorp for a distillery. At some point the business was purchased by Eli Beecher. It continued as a distillery until 1825 when it became the Lyon and Prindle Tannery. After several ownerships the business was purchased in or about 1855 by George F. Cameron. By 1855 Cameron had invested \$800 in real estate and \$100 in tools and machines. He had 1000 hides worth \$1000 in raw materials. He employed one man. His finished product for the year was the tanning of 1000 hides worth \$2000.

For whatever reason the 1865 census does not report the tannery but in 1870 Cameron had \$2500 invested in the business, employed two men and had 3 milling machines; one each for hide, bark and pumping. His raw materials consisted of 35 cord of hemlock bark worth \$175; 6000 hides worth \$540, 60 gal. of oil and \$15 worth of lime and tallow. His production was 2916 ft. of leather worth \$700, 20 furs and 714 shoes worth \$300. The tannery also made shoes and boots. The soles were attached with tiny wooden pegs made at a mill in Batchellerville. Cameron also did some custom tanning that

brought a profit of \$200. This mill also operated 12 months of the year.

One might note that waterpowered mills in the very early days of our town only operated for 8 months of the year due to the icing over of streams in the winter months. Those 4 months were spent gathering the necessary logs and bark to keep the mills running in warmer weather.

Unfortunately many exact dates do not exist but Cameron's Tannery was probably in operation until at least the late 1870's.





HealthLink Littauer's WELLNESS WORDS

We all look forward to a good night's sleep. Sleep allows our body to rest and restore its energy levels. Without enough restful sleep, not only can we become irritable, but also inattentive and more prone to accidents. Like food and water, adequate sleep is essential to good health and quality of life.

Unfortunately, many older adults get less sleep than they need. One reason is that they often have more trouble falling asleep. In a recent study, NIH-Senior Health found that in adults over age 65, at least 36% need more than 30 minutes to fall asleep. Additionally, older people often sleep less deeply and wake more often during the night. There are many possible explanations. As we age we may produce less melatonin, the hormone that promotes sleep. Chronic health conditions, and the medicines used to treat them, can also cause sleep problems.

Not sleeping well can lead to a number of other problems such as depressed mood, attention and

memory issues, excessive daytime fatigue and more nighttime falls. Sleep patterns may change as we age but disturbed sleep and waking up tired daily is not part of normal aging.

- * According to NIH, simple lifestyle changes may relieve many sleep problems. Some of the changes that may help are to:
- * Avoid substances that can cause sleep disturbances such as alcohol and caffeine, and don't consume large amounts of fluids within 2 hours before sleep.
- * Consult your physician or pharmacist for the best time to take prescription drugs so that sleep is not affected. Additionally, have over-the-counter (OTC) drugs checked to be sure they won't cause sleep problems.
- * Try to get some sunlight during the day and avoid long naps. If you need a nap, set an alarm for about 30 minutes.
- * Make your bedroom sleep-friendly. It should be dark, well ventilated and as quiet as possible. Don't use a TV or computer in your bedroom for at least 30 minutes before sleep. According to recent studies, these devices actually disturb your sleep/wake cycle.
- * Adopt bedtime habits that signal your body to get ready for sleep. Such rituals as a warm bath, reading for 20-30 minutes, or writing in a gratitude journal are often helpful.

- * Go to bed around the same time each night and get up the same time each morning. Changing times causes changes in your brain chemistry that can mimic jet lag.
- * If you are often tired during the day and don't feel that you sleep well, you should discuss this with your health care provider. Make sure you inform him/ her of all medications you are taking including OTC drugs. There are many things that can affect sleep. Your health care provider is your best resource to identify issues that may affect your particular sleep problem.

We had a wonderful start to our 2016 garden year with a presentation from Sue Beebe, the Assistant director of Cornell Cooperative Extension in Ballston Spa. Many thanks to our President, Bonnie Desfosse, and her team who find these wonderful gems for us all to enjoy. Any of the presentation we hold at the Northville Public Library are open to the public and gives you a chance to learn something about our gardens and to meet with a great group of people and refreshments! So keep an eye out in this magazine for dates and visit our website at visitsacandaga. com for details.

Sue's presentation was on growing hydrangeas. We're all used to the old fashioned (and still great) mop head hydrangeas but she showed us many new varieties and gave us tips on selecting them and taking care of them throughout the year. She's very knowledgeable and it was a treat to learn from her experience. The hand out she gave us all is now part of my go to garden reference material.

March is a great time to prune the summer blooming shrubs. I say summer blooming because those bloom on new wood so you can prune back quite severely now and it won't affect the blooms. When you prune think about the shape of your shrub and how you want it to fit into your landscape through the summer. Thin it out as more air circulation the better for the health of the shrub and try to work it so that your last cut ends above an outside facing bud so that the new growth will grow outwards not back into the middle. It is not time to prune lilacs, forsythia, azalea or rhododendrons as these are spring bloomers and pruning now will cut off the flowers. You can prune these, if you want and nothing says you have to, after bloom. A good rule of thumb for lilacs and forsythia is to remove one fourth of the oldest wood each year which keeps these plants on the shorter side but doesn't impact the blooms.

If you didn't clean up your garden last year then get a start on it now but watch that you don't trample on the newly emerging bulbs. If you have a compost pile you need to take the brown gold and use that in your gardens for the spring before

adding new material. If you have the space you can start a second pile or make a bin for this year's stuff. An easy way to trim your big grasses is to wrap a string around them and take a serrated knife, or perhaps a chain saw, and cut below the string which you can then use to transport the grasses to your compost area. They will compost better if they are cut into small pieces first or you can use them as mulch in the vegie garden or flower garden. Check the bird houses too, don't want those new little chickies getting sick because of some old material that got moldy.



Have you started any seeds inside yet? Towards the end of the month you can start the warm weather crops such as tomato, pepper and eggplant because they won't go into the garden until the end of May but you can plant the brassicas now, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage and Brussel sprouts. Since they can take the colder weather and after they are hardened off you can transplant them outside sometime in late April.

Indoors, all of your plants will enjoy a light feeding of fertilizer. You can use the granulated or a liquid at half strength. You may need to start watering a bit more frequently now that our days are staying longer. If you have some plants that need repotting now is the time to do it. Look at the bottom of the pot and if roots are coming out then slip the plant out of the pot and if the roots are all over the root ball it needs help. Cut off the tail of roots coming through the hole in the pot and try to loosen the roots around the root ball before potting it into a larger container filled with the same type of soil you had in the original pot. If you don't have room for a larger container you can try to slice off some of the roots from all around the plant. After you report it you will need to watch the plant carefully, do not fertilize or over water and keep it out of direct sun until it recovers. It will help to reduce the foliage too. Check your Christmas Cactus, now is a good time to cut it back, you can break off the 'leaves' back as far as you want to go and two new 'leaves' will sprout from that point.

Now is the time to pot up the tuberous begonias, geraniums, cannas, dahlias and calla lilies you'd

had stored over winter. Keep them in filtered bright light until new shoots start to arrive and gradually transition them to full sun. March and April are wonderful times in the garden but we never know when we have 70 degree weather and then a frost so watch the weather, know your micro climes and dream of those wonderful flowers and fresh veggies.

I have 22 miles of walking under my belt this week. My goal is 31 miles. I do not want to go today, but, once I am into the first mile I can do it for the long haul. We see a lot on our walks and I would share some of our experiences with you.

Selfies- If you are going to take a selfie video to send to your friends, be honest.
