#### Code Enforcement Officer

Also, many people do not know if you are tearing down a large structure on your property you should contact the Building Department to get a demolition permit. He is at the Town Hall but; he can not take care of your questions until later in the afternoon on these days.

The New York State Department of Conservation has just announced anyone who is using a crossbow must take a bowhunters course. You can do this by going online or in-person course. You should go to NYSDEC to get your questions answered and to find the on-line course.

We have been hearing of bears around town. To try to deter them please do not put your garbage outside until collection day and please take down your bird feeders. They are getting ready for the winter months by feeding all they can and what better and or easier way than this.

#### **Edinburg Cemetery Fence**

Please be aware the Town of Edinburg has been working with the fence company to get the damaged fence repaired at the front of the Edinburg Cemetery. We were told they were busy through the middle of August; after contacting them in August we are now slated for October 8th, we have been told if they get an opening before that date they will come and repair it. Please be aware we would like to have the fence repaired as well as everyone else, but we are at their mercy. Remember all good things come to those who wait. We had to wait until the snow was gone and we were working with the insurance company. The monument company has been contacted and the monuments are being slated for repair and or replacement we were told this could take up to a year.



Board members of the Friends of the Northville Public Library met recently to review fundraising efforts in 2025 and to make plans for the next year.

The two major fundraisers that took place this past summer — the book sale and the ice cream social and raffle — collectively brought in about \$4,800. A huge thank you is extended to all who supported these fundraising efforts — either through volunteering, donations, purchases or other means of participation.

In turn, the Friends are working with the library to determine how best the money raised can benefit the library.

### The Edinburg Historical Society Board has named Bob Monacchio its 2025 Volunteer of the Year.

Bob's hard work and creativity led to new exhibits at the Edinburg Rural Museum and the award was announced at the Sept. 16 members' meeting.

One of the displays is a miniature model of a barn and farm scene originally constructed by the late Fred Brownell, who built the replica of the 1924 Frendale farm when he was a teenager. He passed away in 2017.

Bob, a longtime member of the historical society, finished rehabbing the model at his home earlier this year and it was brought to the museum before the opening of the touring season. The meticulous work includes farm animals, agricultural machinery and silos — ingeniously constructed using potato chip cans.

Bob also set up Fred Brownell's model train display, which is currently on a shelf above the farm scene.

Volunteerism is vital to the historical society and its mission of educating area residents about our important and interesting past, and we are always looking for new members. 

When you look across the beautiful Sacandaga or up at the surrounding mountains full of the fall colors, recognize God's



#### Edinburg's New Historian

I've realized that I have been very neglectful in giving my readers a good introduction for our new historian, Valerie Kaye—and yes, "Kaye" is her last name.

I had spent 38 years as Edinburg historian and 3 years before that as assistant to Edinburg's first historian, Nellie Tyrrell. I loved the job but decided it was time for someone else to take over the reins as historian and I would stay on for awhile to lend a hand. Therefore, I retired as historian at the end of 2024.

I've known Val for over 20 years when I used to share a church pew on Sunday mornings with Val and her mom at the Presbyterian Church in Northville.

Val was raised just outside the village of Broadalbin, attending and graduating high school from the Broadalbin Central School. She furthered her education at Utica College which is now Utica University majoring in English and History. Her Masters was in K-12 education.

After college she taught for a couple of years then went to work for the Fulton County Social Services Department. After a timeshe moved on to the NYS Social Services Department in Albany. She retired from this office in 2012.

Val had moved to the village of Northville in 2005, spending her spare time taking care of her mom-now deceased.

Her dad and uncle both worked on the Sacandaga Reservoir project in the 1920's. Her uncle was a member of the "boneyard gang", removing bodies from the valley cemeteries to be reburied in cemeteries on higher ground. Her dad was part of the crew that moved the Batchellerville Presbyterian Church to higher ground to escape the high waters of the new reservoir.

Val has many interests including history, painting pictures, photography, the arts and writing. She finds it very important that people are made aware of things that need correcting.

Shortly after I agreed to putting some of my writings into book form for the benefit of the Edinburg Historical Society, Val stepped up and offered a hand. The late Paula Bradt Frasier had spent the summer of 2020 typing up many of my articles that had never been put on a computer. When Paula was finished Val took over the reins, sorting photos, organizing stories and editing everything.

I assure you-if it hadn't been for Val there never would have been a "My Mountains, My People" book to read!

You'll find Val about town—at Edinburg Historical Society events, working with the 4th graders of the Edinburg Common School, grabbing lunch at Shelby's diner or at the Edinburg Town Hall in the historian's office. Stop in and say "Hi". You might even find me wondering around there also.

### **Small Town Adirondacks Life:**

Epitomizing Some Myths and Illustrating New **Distinctions**

#### OF OCTOBER REVELRY AND HAUNTS

If September in the southern Adirondacks envelops a season of leaf-peeping and invigorating hikes, then October perhaps encompasses a tradition of community gatherings centered around Halloween and harvest with a few ghost stories added to the mix.

Halloween traditions stem from as far back as 2,000 years ago when, according to historian Lucas Compan, the Celtic festival of Samhain celebrated the new year on November 1. The date, of course, "marked the end of summer and the end of harvest and the beginning of the dark, cold winter." This celebration included huge bonfires during which "the Celts were costumes, typically consisting of animal heads and skins." Compan adds that eventually, after the conquering of most Celtic territory by the Romans, the celebration became a hybrid of the Celtic tradition blended with the Roman Fevalia traditions - a celebration of the dead - and the Roman Pamona celebration of fruits and trees. The celebration changed again when Christianity spread and introduced All Saint's Day and All Soul's Day, and participants began to don the costumes of saints, angels, and devils.

The American version of All Hallow's Eve initially had very limited participation, for the New England Protestants frowned upon it. Nonetheless, according to Compan, by the second half of the nineteenth century, the flood of new immigrants to the USA revived -- and to some extent, reinvented -- the Halloween tradition, making it less religious and more secular than it had been, and between the 1920s and 1950s, the trick-ortreat customs truly began to take hold. These evolutions have reached the point that today, Compan notes, "Americans spend

an estimated \$6 billion annually on Halloween, making it the second largest commercial holiday after Christmas."


These days, at least in the southern Adirondack Park, with only a few exceptions, communities seem to have returned to an 1800s concept of Halloween: community festivals that include adults and children, fall harvests, parades, and games.

The exceptions encompass a few particularly well-advertised venues: The Haunted Adirondack Trail of the Spirits of the Mountains, the Lake George Haunted History Ghost Tour, and the Double-M Haunted Hayrides and Haunted Houses.

According to travel writer Evie Carrick, a surprising number of Adirondack "unsolved murders, missing persons, and ghost sightings" produce what the Adirondack Wayfinder has curated as The Haunted Adirondack Trail, comprised of "nine truly spooky stops over more than 230 miles." This trail begins with Big Moose Lake, where the supposed spirit of murdered Grace Brown wanders. Carrick explains that the trail includes Inlet; Hotel Saranac; the Lady of the Lake, the Palace Theater, and Stagecoach Inn in Lake Placid; a Lake Champlain witch; and the Rhinelander Estate in Lake Pleasant. Emphasizing stories of the murdered, the lost and possibly murdered, the imprisoned, and the violent, these paranormal adventures summon a host of ghost-seekers, especially in October.

According to AdirondackUSA, other hauntings not included on this trail might incorporate the reportedly haunted Fort Covington, the Faust Lumberjack, the friendly ghost of Santa's Workshop, and the Lake Placid Club's Annie Godfree Dewey's ghost in the rocking chair. ADK Taste notes that Lake George's History Ghost Tour, too, capitalizes on a somewhat "bloody history [... on] a tour with an expert guide through the Fort William Henry Museum's haunted corners."

The engineered variety of ghostly scares and thrills presents itself in the Double-M Hayrides and Haunted Houses in Malta of Saratoga County. A family-owned operation in business since 1991 and managed by 3 generations of the Leo Martin family, the enterprise began as The Original Haunted Hayride. According

to reviewer HauntWorld Magazine, in its current iteration and under its new name, the experience as a "full-blown haunted scream park" includes "a 40-minute haunted hayride, four haunted houses totaling 30 minutes, nine tractor-drawn wagons that each seat 50 people, 150 employees, and 25,000+ customers per season." Leo Martin claims that it grows and changes each season because "A key management team of 10 horror junkies meets throughout the year to develop the upcoming season's attractions." Part of that process involves creating a rough sketch they bring to the annual TransWorld's Halloween and Attractions Show in March to help them decide what to buy for "new costumes, horrific props, multi-motion animations, extreme CGI FX, or anything else." The building starts immediately upon their return. According to Martin, they actually hold a summer job fair and auditions and then require training and rehearsals. In addition, on site, they have one make-up artist, security, and EMS personnel and do active shooter training with the Sheriff's Department. HauntWorld Magazine adds that the Double-M also hosts a "grand finale Extreme Night, an 18+ interactive experience" that closes the season.

The more community-oriented events of the season begin in the very first week of October with Mayfield's Historical Society's Annual Fall Harvest Cruise. According to Mohawk Valley Museums Newsletter, hosted at the Rice Homestead, this venue showcases "antique, hot rod, and vintage vehicles" alongside musical entertainment; refreshments such as hot dogs, cider, doughnuts, and make-your-own-sundaes; farm animals; and locally sourced products such as produce and pumpkins, homey, soaps, and loom-spun products.

Not long after that weekend festival, Gloversville hosts its Fall Fest at Trail Station Park. Geared toward children, according to Gloversville's town website, the festival provides "bounce houses, pumpkin paintings, and jumbo yard games" as well as "potato sack races, three-legged races, and hula hoop contests, with prizes awarded." Last on its agenda is a Halloween costume parade and award ceremony complete with local vendors supplying trick-or-treat goodies.

About a week later, Gloversville also hosts the Spooktacular Craft Fest, an event centered on a Halloween theme and featuring a night of children's games and several craft-making stations. According to 44 Lakes Things to Do in Fulton County, Gloversville sponsors one, additional event: The Haunted Happenings, "a community Halloween party for children, adults, and ghouls alike" and including a haunted house, games, cookie-and pumpkin-decorating, a fortune-teller, and a costume parade.

### A Beginning Beekeepers Journey

As an upstate New York beekeeper, my October is all about preparing my bees for the long, cold winter ahead.

The goldenrod flow is ending, and the temperatures are dropping, so my final actions now will determine if my colonies survive until spring.

As I conduct my hive inspections, I am looking at the colony's overall strength. A strong, healthy hive with a vigorous queen has the best chance of survival.

This time of year, beekeepers consolidate weaker hives, combining them with stronger ones to ensure a robust population for each colony. A full-sized colony needs to have a large enough bee population to generate the heat needed to survive the coldest months.

My main goal is to ensure the bees have enough food. A full-sized colony needs anywhere from 70 to 90 pounds of honey going into winter. The honey provides the essential carbohydrates needed to generate heat and survive the fall and winter.

Beyond being a simple sugar source, the composition of honey includes the components of honey that make this possible.

Carbohydrates: The primary component of honey is a dense mixture of sugars, mainly fructose and glucose. These sugars provide the high-energy fuel necessary for the bees to generate warmth and survive the cold.

Pollen: Pollen, stored separately as "bee bread," is the bees' source of protein, lipids, vitamins, and minerals. While honey provides energy, pollen offers the essential building blocks for the bees' bodies and for raising the new brood in late winter and early spring.

Vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants: Honey contains small quantities of these essential micronutrients, which support the bees' overall health. Antioxidants also help protect bees from oxidative stress.

Water: Honey has a low water content, typically 15–17%, but is a source of hydration for the bees. The low water activity, combined with a naturally acidic pH and the presence of hydrogen peroxide, also gives honey antimicrobial properties that prevent spoilage.

This behavior is crucial for the colony's survival as it allows them to maintain a warm environment despite freezing external conditions. As temperatures drop in the fall, bees



huddle together to form a tight, basketball-sized cluster. This cooperative behavior is essential for conserving heat, as the bees on the outside act as a layer of insulation to trap warmth. The colder it gets, the tighter the cluster becomes. While inside the cluster, the worker bees consume their stored honey to provide energy. They use this energy to vibrate their powerful wing muscles in an uncoupled fashion, meaning they contract the muscles without moving their wings. This isometric contraction creates metabolic heat, similar to how shivering warms mammals. Heat is generated most intensely by the bees in the core of the cluster, where temperatures can reach 80–95°F (27–35°C), even when outside temperatures are well below freezing. The workers constantly rotate between the cooler outer layer and the warmer center of the cluster. This allows all bees to take turns warming up, ensuring the colony's survival.

This behavior is where the term hiveminded

originated.

Imagine a tiny, buzzing collective, where thousands of fuzzy individuals act as one super-organism, all focused on making sure the pantry is perpetually stocked with honey. It's less about individual opinions on the best flower patch and more about a synchronized, vibrating dance-off to determine the most efficient flight path. If a guard bee lets in a freeloading wasp, it's not just a personal slip-up, but a collective "facepalm" felt throughout the hexagonal commune. There are no solo acts, just a unified force of tiny, buzzing collective, where thousands of fuzzy individuals act as one super-organism, all focused on making sure the pantry is perpetually stocked with honey.



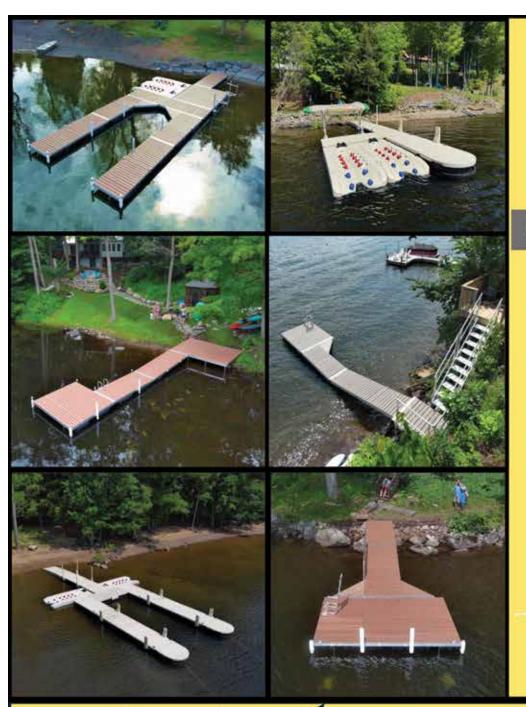

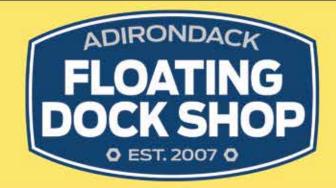

#### WINGS ON ICE AND WATER

We might all think of Great Sacandaga Lake as our floodcontrolling playground, calling us to swim, boat, fish, and dive in the summer or to ice-fish and snow-mobile in the winter, or to 4-wheel in the mud in fall and spring, but our lake also serves as a training ground for a unique branch of the New York State National Guard: the 109th Airlift Wings. We might have heard them on one of their fly-overs to honor essential workers, or we might remember them helping to repair local county storm damage, or maybe we have seen those "109 AW Training This Way" signs but never really knew what they meant. Though according to the Official US Air Force website, the 109th Airlift Wings formed in 1948 "as a fighter unit" and has experienced "11 outstanding commanders, and ever-changing missions [...] deploying statewide, worldwide, and from the North Pole to the South Pole," the 109th is now "the only LC-130 ski unit in the world."

These Lockheed C-130 Hercules turbo-prop transport planes - so called "skibirds" - have made the Stratton Air National Guard Base in Schenectady/Scotia their home since 1977. From there, they have provided air lift support to missions all over the world. For example, according to the Schenectady Military Affairs Council, during 2011-2012 alone, "crews flying six LC-




130H Ski-Herc transports carried out 359 missions between McMurdo Station, Antarctica and eighteen inland Antarctic destinations, transporting more than seven million pounds of cargo and fuel and 1,600 passengers." In writing for the 109th Airlift Wing News Search, Jaclyn Lyons offers another example, stating that from October 2024 through February 2025, the 109th Airlift Wing "moved 1,076 passengers, carried 900 tons of cargo, and transported 120,000 gallons of fuel." In addition, the group has conducted successful medical evacuations, critical supply drops, and infinite numbers of vital equipment drops. They

have deployed at the WTC, in Afghanistan, on the Distant Early Warning (DEW) radar sites in Greenland, on the Polar Ice Cap, on Operation Deep Freeze, and on a host of National Science Foundation scientific research missions at the Arctic and Antarctica.

To accomplish all these tasks, the 109th needs training, some of which it does on Great Sacandaga Lake at the Hudson-River-Black-River Regulation District Field Office, just 30 miles from their home base. Such training involves two, distinct types during two, separate seasons: Polar Camp Ski-Way Team (PCST) training and Water Survival and **Emergency Parachute** Training.

"As the 10th largest lake in New York State, measuring 41.7 square miles, the lake approximates the Arctic wilderness levels well." Major Brian Caldwell says. This training for polar missions on our lake provides members with an opportunity to practice and enhance their skills in creating ice runways for the skibirds. According to a New York National Guard press release. "The team members use specially outfitted snow

mobiles to drag tow-hitched groomers thousands of feet for weeks at a time to prepare the snow and ice to withstand the landing of ski-equipped landing planes." Those planes carry scientists and research equipment. Major Caldwell adds that "During the exercise on the lake, the team sets up a campsite like the one they would erect in the Arctic. They test new grooming equipment and snow mobiles." According to Tech Sergeant Logan Brennan, in the training and the actual missions, "survival is a key element" when they build a polar camp skiway in these remote locations. Success in training translates to "ensuring safe and effective operation in one of the most demanding environments on the planet," according to Colonel Rob Donaldson, and it involves everyone, including pilots, maintenance, and support personnel.

That same level of participation becomes necessary in the Water Survival and Emergency Parachute Training that occurs on the lake, too. Master Sergeant David Gillis states that, "The idea is to make these trainings as realistic as possible. In parachute training, students practice multiple types of malfunctions [. . .] and go over how best to correct any malfunctions that may arise." According to him, one of the most challenging scenarios stems from landing in the water and disentangling from the multiple, tiny parachute lines. Likewise, recovering from getting dragged through the water or covered by a parachute requires skill and ability to quell panic. Students also practice how to deploy a parachute safely on land "in different conditions such as trees, power lines, and in the dark." Again, safety and success in training garners successful missions.

The 109 Airlift Wings look forward to the completion of many successful local, national, and global missions, whether in Canada, Greenland, New Zealand, or anywhere else their special skills can serve. Grateful for Great Sacandaga Lake's provision of realistic training ground so close to their home base, the 109th anticipates returning the required every three years to update their skills.

#### "Reflections on Recent Events"

As I study Scripture in preparation for worship services each week, I am amazed at how relevant the words recorded there over 2,000 years ago are to the events of today. As I reflect on the assignation of Charlie Kirk and the reaction to it, I hear the words of Jesus as he dealt with a world dealing with similar issues.

Jesus lived in a country that was under occupation by the Roman Empire and saw heated divisions in society. The Jewish population and the Samaritans divided over differences on where one could offer sacrifices to God despised one another.


When asked who is my neighbor, Jesus responded with the parable of "The Good Samaritan" where the hero of the story was

not a devote Jew but rather a hated Samaritan making the point that the commandment to love our neighbor included even the hated Samaritans.





#### Carrier pigeon cared for by US

Even the humblest stray carrier pigeon fills a niche in the vast defense program being mapped by Uncle Sam's war department. A pigeon off its course was picked up by G. Y. # Sufficiency and Other Ponderings

Not much looks as useless as dried up old leaves laying around. You might say they are worse than useless, they mean work. But organic gardeners know better. My big ol' pumpkin says so, too. Mother Nature knows what she's doing.

I just grew the biggest pumpkin I've ever grown, starting with a big pile of oak leaves. I moved wet leaves, which pack down better than dry ones, into a knee-deep heap. A few inches of sand on top went to hold them down and then I fed the pile a bucket of chicken manure. The ground under all this was undiggable, laced with roots and blocked with rocks but the pumpkins didn't care. Now I have my first knee-high pumpkin.

Tree roots can reach deep into the ground mining the minerals they need to leaf out and grow. Then, at season's end, all those cast off leaves leave a layer of free nutrients scattered over the ground. A rake and a tarp are two of my favorite kinds of exercise equipment.




#### A KNEE-HIGH PUMPKIN

The same leaves that would smother your lawn can be used to great advantage. One gardener described a wire cage full of leaves he kept out back as a compost bin but also threw in some old wrinkly potatoes one year. By fall he was amazed to discover a very fine crop of volunteer potatoes had been thriving there all summer. A wire bin full of leaves can just be ignored for a couple years or so, even if you don't turn it, and the results will be outstanding topsoil nature's formula.

Nature doesn't waste anything, not even a leaf.

I'd love to go back in time and tell a farmer that a bag of dirt from his garden would one day sell for about as much as the bag of corn he grows. Or you can get it for free, after the leaves come down.



# "Nuggets and News" from the Town of Lake Luzerne

Part 1 of 2...

Upon my request years ago for a story about "Romance at the Ranch," I was gifted with this delightful response. In honor of my heavenly friend and who was a great and grand storyteller, I pass on to you her recollections of employment at the Painted Pony Ranch from 1957-1962 as a teenager.

I started to work @ PPR when I got my working papers at age 14. My brother, Steve, was already working there as a waiter. My first job was as a chambermaid. I worked with Pat Thorpe and Nancy West. Charlie Isaccsan, co-owner lived next door to us so he would bring us to work "bright and early." Charlie would take the laundry from the ranch to the local laundromat on Church Street every morning. Think he went at 4 am as he was finished by 6:30am.

The first year as a chamber maid I cleaned the Annex and the cabins. The second year I worked with Nancy in the Motel and the Hacienda. If there were a lot of linen, the grounds keeper would bring them "up the hill" by truck for us.

Nancy was always singing-if there were people in the unit next to us, I would tell her "Not so loud." She would laugh and say the people wouldn't know which one of us was singing.

As a chamber maid, the most devastating thing that happened to me was the day a woman lost her diamond ring and I was the last person in the room. After rechecking – she found the ring in the sleeve of her sweater. I was happy for her and happy for me.

When I was sixteen, an opening for a waitress was available, so I applied. That was a great job – a lot of work, hours and fun. We had one meal off per week and my paycheck was \$18.32. Had 3 meals a day and tips were usually good so we didn't care.

We ate a round a big table in the kitchen before we served the guests. The cowboys also joined us. It was fun listening to tales from the barn. Don Baxter was head cowboy and others were Ronnie Martin and two brothers. Low Hawk was the head cook and pearl and Doris were helpers. Lou was a wonderful cookmeals were delicious, especially enjoyed the turkey dinners and spaghetti.

In the dining room if you were caught with your elbows on the table, everyone would sing, "Mabel, Mabel, if you are able, get your elbows off the table". That would continue until that person stood on her chair and wiggled." Breakfast was on an individual basis, lunch and dinner were family style. We would refill bowls and platters as needed and remove the dishes. After all was washed we dried and reset the tables for the next meal. We would then have a couple of hours off to relax. The wait staff then was my brother Steve, Jimmy Rosana, Jimmy DePalma and Dave.

During my time off I would check out the gift shoppe which was located next to the motel. Janie Baxter, daughter of Walt and Betty Isaacson ran the shoppe and the office.

I would also hang out with Cookie Eldridge. She was an only child of Dee and George Eldridge from Teaneck, NJ. Cookie would spend the whole summer at PPR. She had a room in the main lodge, where the Isaacson's lived. On Wednesday evenings, the Ranch would have music and a "weenie roast" in front of the lodge. I usually stayed and helped, few folks attended. Also, the ranch provided a horseback ride and picnic at the Towner bridge, a favorite swimming hole on Towner Road. They would take the food up by truck. I didn't ride horses so didn't go!



Friday night was Rodeo night; the rain date was Saturday. Most of the wait staff worked the concession stand. The cowboys would come for hamburgers and drink. Money was never exchanged. They would always say "Don't tell Walt!"

If we weren't too busy, I would go up to watch the rodeo. It was so impressive to see all the cowboys and cowgirls from the ranches ride in with matching outfits, usually satin shirts. After they circled the arena, they would have a square dance on horseback. They would ride so fast, just missing each other. Also enjoyed watching the Rodeo Clown, Skip Graham. Though he was so funny, never realized what a dangerous job he had keeping the horse from the fallen cowboy.

Hub and Eunice Hubbell were always a favorite. Hub would show all the tricks his horse knew – people were amazed. Can't remember what Eunice did – guess I couldn't get past her beautiful western wear and how attractive she was.


