

### HISTORIC EDINBURG FESTIVAL SATURDAY, JULY 9, 10 AM TO 3 PM RURAL MUSEUM AT 11 NORTH SHORE ROAD

Join us for the Historic Edinburg Festival. Edinburg is located 55 miles from Albany, 22 miles from Saratoga and 15 miles from Lake George. Enjoy the free horse and carriage rides by J & D

Percherons. Shop in the arts and crafts booths. Homemade soups, chili and baked goods will be available. View the exhibits on hunting, fishing, maple sugaring, machine shop, weavers, and items of the country kitchen.

The Nellie Tyrrell Museum of Edinburg History is housed in the former one-room Beecher Hollow across the road from the Rural with archival documents such

as photographs, maps, drawings, books, articles, paintings, and public and personal records. Visit the historic Barker's Store believed to be part of the Underground Railroad. See the secret hiding place for slaves that was discovered years



ago when the Robinson's were renovating the store. Introduce yourselves to new owners Katie Tarantelli Fitzgerald and Patrick Fitzgerald and see the antiques and creative wood crafts for sale.

Visit the Saratoga Snowmobilers Club table and talk with members about saving on your snowmobiles registration and pick up the brochure map of trails. Steve Gurzier will demonstrate his blacksmithing. Steve teaches classes at the Adirondack Folk School and where he demonstrates his craft on Open Forge Night. The Volunteer Edinburg Fire Department will have their trucks out to view and are having a raffle basket sale. A Car Show will be held outside Fuller's Store. Tour the historic Edinburg United Methodist Church built in 1836.

Follow North Shore Road a short distance and

visit the Copeland Covered Bridge on Beecher Creek which is the only queenspost truss bridge in NYS. Park and walk across the Batchellerville Bridge over the Great Sacandaga Lake on your way to the festival.




## J and D Percherons

## Cherry Crumb Cake

2 cups sifted flour 1 cup sugar 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup butter one egg 1 (1 lbs. 8 oz.) jar cherry pie filling

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt into bowl.

Cut in butter until crumbly, add egg, mix with fork, press half of crumb mixture into greased 13" x 9" x 2" baking pan.

Spoon cherry filling over first layer. Top with remaining crumbs.

Bake in 350° oven 30 minutes or until golden brown. Cool in pan on rack. Serve warm, topped with whip cream or ice cream if you wish!

Town of Day Historian

#### 1830-1880 The Middle Years

Day's population grows from 758 in 1830 to 1238 in 1880 - which is likely understated due to the number of uncounted itinerant workers, tradesmen, merchants and brokers in town. These workers are instrumental in supporting the primary trades of lumbering, leather tanning and wood product manufacturing.

Conklingville. The 4th largest manufacturing site in Saratoga County with a population of about 300. Was home to a large tannery, two woodenware factories, saw mills, a hotel, 4 stores, 3 churches, 2 schools. Most of the industry and population was on the west side, above the dam.

Day Center/Centre (Day Corners) Had 12 houses, a store, a hotel, a blacksmith, a school, 2 churches, and a sawmill/grist mill on Paul Creek.

Croweville. Home to a tannery, a factory to make tannic acid, 12 houses, and about 90 people.

West Day (Huntsville) Thriving with 20 houses, 2 stores, a blacksmith, a wagon shop, a clothespin factory, the Fraker Hotel, a cooper shop, a school, and a church.

Your safety is our number one priority

From May 12th through June 12th, the Company responded to a total of twelve calls.

Generally each month I review some aspect of home safety. It seems particularly relevant that I briefly discuss firearms safety within the home. There is no point in quoting statistics here, as even one accidental death is one too many. Suffice it to say the numbers are significant and it is often young children who find a loaded gun and end up shooting a friend, sibling, or sometime themselves. How do I know this is true - because it happened to me!

I think I was about twelve years old at the time. I was visiting my Aunt and Uncle in Pueblo, Colorado. They had several firearms in their house and did not have any children. Well, I must be truthful and tell you that I wasn't in their house five minutes. They had left a loaded gun on the coffee table and everyone but me had gone in the kitchen. I picked up that pistol and discharged it into the ceiling, which you can imagine caused a bit of a commotion.

Yes, things really can happen that quickly. Home gun safety needs to be a practiced plan, just like how your family should plan annually to leave your house in the event of an emergency. Home gun safety is sometimes trying to think how a young child might think. Are they curious, have they seen your weapon before. Then yes, most are very curious. How do you address that? It is also about educating your older children. What are your expectations of them? Do not think they don't know where you keep your firearms, they know. And then there are the more common precautions which folks still surprisingly flaunt. Such as; locked gun cabinets, trigger locks, and keeping the ammo in a separate and locked location.

> Perhaps you don't have children in the home any longer. But the grand kids come over, they can sure move fast. Perhaps even faster than you. Or in my case, a twelve year old nephew who had never handled a gun before, until the moment he put a new air vent in the living room ceiling. Gun safety - is no accident.

PS. My Uncle went on to teach me to target shoot with his Remington 22 pump, which is a special keep sake of mine today.





## Ladies Auxiliary Basket Raffle





## Flower Talk

Sally Peck, of the Flower Barn

The rose is one of the most beloved of all flowers and has been revered for centuries. As Shakespeare wrote "What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet." It didn't start with Hallmark or Florists. Rose fossils claimed to be millions of years old were found in Colorado. 5,000 years ago they were grown in China where the red rose originated, while the yellow rose was discovered by accident. The original colors were shades of pink or white.

The sharp spikes on the stem of a rose known as "thorns", are actually called prickles. Roses possess a protective layer petal known as the guard petal which protects the inner flower as they bloom, and when they are cut and handled. Some florists remove the guard petals so the flowers are more appealing.

In ancient Asia Vishnu, god of India, formed his bride, Lakshmi, from 1,116 rose petals. So the early rose became a symbol of beauty.

In Greek mythology: Chloris, the Goddess of flowers created the rose by giving life to lifeless body of a nymph; Aphrodite, the Goddess of love gave her beauty and Dionysus, the God of wine presented her nectar to give her sweet scent; giving her charm, brightness and joy. The rose is associated with both the Greek and Roman goddesses of Love. This is the reason for its popularity with lovers

In Rome a wild rose would be placed on the door of a room where secret matters were discussed. The phrase sub rosa, or "under the rose", means to keep a secret and is derived from this ancient Roman practice. During Roman times, the history of the rose gets a bit ugly. Peasants were required to grow roses instead of food crops in order to satisfy the demands of their rulers. They filled their pools and fountains and rooms with petals as well as a confetti for celebrations, for perfumes and even medicinal purposes.

Cleopatra believed that rose petals were an aphrodisiac, requesting that her servants cover her bed in fresh roses each day. When she held a banquet in 42 B.C. for her lover Mark Anthony, she requested that the floors be covered in 2 feet of rose petals. (That is a lot of roses, thanks to the peasants).

During the fifteenth century, the rose developed its name the "War of the Roses". The white rose symbolized Yorkshire and the red rose Lancaster for the factions fighting to control England.

Emperor Napoleon believed that roses had powers for healing. He ordered that bags of dry rose petals be given to each of his officers. If they suffered a gunshot wound the petals were boiled in white wine and applied to the wound to treat lead poisoning

In 1986 the rose also became the floral emblem of the USA. It is the official flower of New York, Iowa, North Dakota and Georgia.

For the Christians, the rose is one of only three flowers mentioned in the Bible. During Medieval times the five petals of the rose were identified with the five wounds of Christ. The rose later became associated with the Virgin Mary as well as the Rosary, which was originally a string of 150 dried roses.

Roses are in the same family as apples, which is why their

fruits bear such a resemblance to them. Rose hips are the seed pods of roses—the fruit that remains after the blooms fade. Rose hips have a bit of



a tarness of crab apples and are a great source of vitamin C. They are used in supplements, teas, jams and skin care.

Rose petals are most commonly used to flavor dishes in Indian, Chinese and Middle Eastern cuisine. They garnish everything from drinks to cakes. They are added to water or butter, even chocolate to infuse flavors. ( Don't use rose hips or petals from plants that have been treated with pesticides).

The rose has always been a timeless symbol in history, religion, art and literature. While each color expresses love, beauty and balance a little differently, the main message is still always love!







#### Fuel and Boating Safety

The boating season is underway! The boats are on the water and it is time to start looking at a few U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) recommendations.

These include one on gasoline selection which was published in the August 8, 2019 issue of the Boating Magazine and highlighted before Memorial Day by the USCG. The second is a recent Marine Safety Alert (08-22) issued on June 2, 2022 regarding boating near a mix-use waterway such as a launch area.

#### Gasoline Warning (Unleaded 88 or E15)

Sometimes we are barraged by information and it is only later that the information becomes relevant for us. E15 or Unleaded 88 fuel was approved for sale in 2012 but has not been sold until recently between June 1 through September 15.

Now, we fast forward to our current fuel situation. E15 or Unleaded 88 fuel can be purchased at local gas stations throughout the year and we are in a situation where the price of fuel has become a major issue for auto as well as boat 'drivers'!

Let me explain. I first became aware of the potential problem after seeing a USCG safety notice on the Great Lakes which reminded boaters that ".... boat engines do not handle E15 gas well. E15 is short for fuel that has a 15% mix of ethanol. In boat motors, E15 has shown to cause more engine failure, including a higher rate of engine fires. It can also void the engine's warranty."

There is also a reference to an article in the Boating Magazine in 2019 indicating that "... pumping E15 into a boat, motorcycle or lawn mower is a violation of federal law." (https://www.boatingmag. com/e15-gas-is-bad-for-boat-engines/)

In that article, Jeff Wasil, the engineering manager of emissions testing at BRP/Evinrude, noted: "The concern is what happens to the components when the engine is not used for some period of time .... This is when the higher ethanol content can start to do its damage to these fuelsystem components. Remember, ethanol is a harsh solvent, and more ethanol is an even stronger solvent." There are two main concerns ... "One is motors running on E15 for too long, causing them to overheat. The other, motors sitting idle with E15 in the tank and fuel lines."

At this point it is important that boaters be aware of the fuel situation and take steps to ensure that their boating is safe for themselves, their crew, their passengers and their equipment!

Marine Safety Alert 08-22: Slow Down, Look Around and Be Aware of Your Surroundings when Transiting Near Launch Areas

There are few places on the water that are more hectic than launch areas. The launch area is the place where the land meets the water and everyone wants to show their skill in transitioning





effortlessly between the land and the nautical world! This is the spot where the boat skipper and her/his crew is at their finest.

Oh, no! The USCG has just alerted us to another issue with the launch areas which we may have not considered. After you launch your boat, whether is it under sail, powered or paddled, YOU have just entered a world with the chance of being hit by another vessel transiting passed the launch but really not paying too much attention!

The USCG set the scene and described the outcome for the activity which prompted their Marine Safety Alert. (I added my italics and bold print at the end of the quote.)

"While transiting a mixed-use waterway, a motor vessel capsized a kayak in its wake, jettisoning the kayaker into the water. This incident occurred near a known kayak launch and was third such event within a short time span. IN THE MOST RECENT CASE, THE MOTOR VESSEL'S OPERATOR FAILED TO SEE THE KAYAKER IN THE WATER WHILE TRAVELING AT 16 KNOTS WITH CLEAR VISIBILITY." (my italics and bold print)

As the boating season begins, it is important to emphasize that we don't have a 12 month boating season and for some, this is the first time they have ever 'piloted' a boat.

The recommendations made by the USCG are very direct: 1) local authorities should consider enacting speed limits and place buoy markers; 2) vessels are responsible for their wakes and they should avoid 'negatively impacting' docks, activities and other boats; 3) vessels must be operated at a safe speed; 4) maintain a lookout (by sight and hearing); and 5) render assistance without endangering their own vessel and crew or others.

The State of New York does not require onthe-water training for boaters who are applying for a Boater Safety Certificate. Before closing on this topic, I would like to offer a suggestion which worked well when I was introduced to sailing and certainly should be an option worthy of consideration. Boaters are like family and everyone should benefit from the wisdom of individuals who have experience on the water. REMEMBER: the USCG notice clearly stated that the 'incident ... was the same such event within a short time span.'

Boaters always have stories. Before closing, here is one of mine! After shopping for a sailboat, I found what I thought was the perfect purchase. It was easy to transport and set up. The sailboat dealer was fabulous and gave me information about a group of sailors who met on the lake. I traveled to the launch area, set the boat up, pushed it off shore and picked up the wind!

Within an hour, I went head-over-heels on the boat twice and was assisted by members of the fleet on both occasions. When I made it back to shore my new friends told me that the dealer had mentioned that I was coming to the lake. One of the sailors recommended that I sail again the following weekend as crew with him and leave my boat at home!

That was the greatest recommendation I could have received. I had new friends and new mentors all at the same time.

### Operators of Boats without a Motor and the New York State Safe Boating Certificate

New York State has been slowly phasing in a requirement for everyone to complete the New

York State Safe **Boating** Course in order to legally operate a boat on New York State waters. Individuals who were born after January 1, 1988 (34 years of age) must currently hold a valid New York State Boating Certificate. The requirement is crafted to require a certificate for everyone in 2025. 






On April 1, 2022, the Village of Northville welcomed a new Mayor and two new Trustees.





# **Old Glory**

The national flag of the United States of America, often referred to as the American flag or the U.S. flag, consists of thirteen equal horizontal stripes of red alternating with white, with a blue rectangle in the canton (referred to specifically as the "union") bearing fifty small, white, five-pointed stars arranged in nine offset horizontal rows, where rows of six stars (top and bottom) alternate with rows of five stars.

The 50 stars on the flag represent the 50 U.S. states, and the 13 stripes represent the thirteen British colonies that declared independence from the Kingdom of Great Britain, and became the first states in the U.S.

Nicknames for the flag include the Stars and Stripes, Old Glory, and the Star Spangled Banner.

The United States Flag Code outlines certain guidelines for the flag's use, display, and disposal. For example, the flag should never be dipped to any person or thing, unless it is the ensign responding to a salute from a ship of a foreign nation. This tradition may come from the 1908 Summer Olympics in London, where countries were asked to dip their flag to King Edward VII: the American flag bearer did not.

The flag should never be allowed to touch the ground and should be illuminated if flown at night. The flag should be repaired or replaced if the edges



become tattered through wear.

Section 8, entitled "Respect For Flag", states in part: "The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery", and "No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform".

The flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.

> The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.

> The flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.

The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free. Bunting of blue, white, and red, always arranged with the blue above, the white in the

middle, and the red below, should be used for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of the platform, and for decoration in general.

The flag should never be fastened, displayed, used, or stored in such a manner as to permit it to be easily torn, soiled, or damaged in any way.

The flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling.

The flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or





drawing of any nature.

The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.

The flag should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper napkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard. Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halyard from which the flag is flown.

No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform. However, a flag patch may be affixed to the uniform of military personnel, firemen, policemen, and members of patriotic organizations. The flag represents a living country and is itself considered a living thing. Therefore, the lapel flag pin being a replica, should be worn on the left lapel near the heart.


The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

### DANGEROUS ON THE ROAD

Driving down North Shore Road the other day, I was coming home from work about 8:45 PM, when I came up on a side by side driving in my lane at around 15 mph. I slowed to about 35 mph, and after a moment, pulled into the left lane to pass. The moment I was about to pass, the driver decided to turn left, directly in front of my vehicle. I jumped on the brakes, yanked the wheel and headed for the ditch, and laid on the horn. I heard and felt a collision before coming to a stop at the edge of the ditch.

Luckily, the driver and his dog where not harmed. Checking for damage I realized that because of my fast response I only clipped his turned front wheel, leaving scratches and a scuff of rubber on my wheel rim and down the side of my truck.

This could have gone a completely different way. Had he chosen to turn even just a half second before, I would have wiped out the front of his vehicle, possibly seriously injuring him. He claimed he thought maybe he had signaled with his hand, but I never saw it. He apologized

profusely, and offered to pay for the damage to my truck.

Not only was he not paying attention, but these types of vehicles are not even legal to drive on the road. He had no mirrors, no turn signals, no brake lights, and was driving down the center of my lane slowly. As my headlights were on, I can't even fathom how he didn't see I was passing, much less deciding to turn in front of me.

I'm all for partying and enjoying the summer at the lake, but leaving the beach with a dog in your side by side and then driving slowly down the middle of the road at dusk, and being unaware of traffic is just asking for trouble.

I hope this man learned a valuable lesson. I thank God no was injured or killed. It could have been a tragic end to an otherwise beautiful evening.

If you must drive your side by side on the road, USE THE SHOULDER and REMAIN VIGILANT to your surroundings. If you have been drinking, have someone else drive. We don't need any more terrible and senseless accidents on our roads.



# Summer Visitors

Hummingbirds have unusually long lifespans for organisms with such rapid metabolisms. Though many die during their first year of life, especially in the vulnerable period between hatching and fledging, those that survive may occasionally live a decade or more. Among the better-known North American species, the typical lifespan is probably 3 to 5 years.

Hummingbirds are birds native to the Americas and comprise the biological family Trochilidae. With about 361 species and 113 genera, they occur from Alaska to Tierra del Fuego, but the vast majority of the species are found in the tropics. They are small birds, with most species measuring 3-5 inches in length. The smallest extant hummingbird species is the 2.0 in. bee hummingbird, which weighs less than 0.07 oz. The largest hummingbird species is the 9.1 in. giant hummingbird, weighing .63–0.85 oz. They are specialized for feeding on flower nectar, but all species also consume flying insects or spiders.

Most North American hummingbirds migrate southward in fall to spend winter in Mexico, the Caribbean Islands, or Central America.

For nutrition, hummingbirds eat a variety of insects, including mosquitoes, fruit flies, gnats in flight, or aphids on leaves and spiders in their webs. The lower beak of hummingbirds is flexible and can bend as much as 25 degrees when it



widens at the base, making a larger surface for catching insects. Hummingbirds hover within insect swarms in a method called "hover-hawking" to facilitate feeding. Thy also have an enlarged hippocampus, a brain region facilitating spatial memory used to map flowers previously visited during nectar foraging.




# Concerts in the Park


